



#### Tuberculosis Rapidly Increasing Among Children of Belgium and Northern France.

More Food Urgently Needed to Keep up Their Strength

An interview with Mr. W. L. Honnold, American Director of the Belgian Relief Commission, brings to light a new danger threatening the population of the territory occupied by Germany.

Mr. Honnold reports that about 5,000,000 wholly or partially destitute people, who have been dependent on the Commission, generally show diminished vitality. The effects are most apparent among the older children, particularly those in the adolescent stage. Among these there is an alarming increase of tuberculosis, due to the lower power of resistance consequent on

To overcome this serious danger, the Commission appeals for extra contributions so that a special meal can be served every day in the schools. Efforts are also being made to provide as far as possible for children outside the schools.

# Labor Leader is

Eight young men enlisted in the navy

after listening to stirring patriotic addresses at the naval recruiting meeting which was held in Loew's Theatre last night. Twenty-eight men have enlisted with the fleet since the beginning of the month and five more are expected from Hamilton.

Hamilton.

"Compulsory service, in making every man bear an equal share of his country's burden, is the very fundamental spirit of democracy," said Sam Landers, Hamilton labor leader, addressing the large crowd at Loew's. He broke away from the labor attitude toward conscription, and made a strong appeal for compulsory military service in Canada. He did not believe that the Canadian had done enough: it was the English. Scottish and enough; it was the English, Scottish and Irish born residents of the Dominion who had made the big sacrifices in the

war.

"I expect to be ostracized by the labor movement for what I say," declared Mr. Landers. "But I am British first and I tell you that the basic principle of trade unionism is conscription.

"Labor unions may appeal against a "man being driven to do anything he does not want to do, but the entire system of trade unionism revolves on the basis of compulsion. The worker who is not a unionist is driven out of employment by the unionists. He must join forces with them or they will not tolerate him."

The speaker continued with an at-

tolerate him."

The speaker continued with an attack upon the government because it had not enforced conscription. He accused the government of being leaderless, but said that the opposition was similarly afflicted.

'We need a Lloyd George in this

country," he said. "When the trades unionists in England held great meetings to oppose conscription, Lloyd George shook his fist in their faces and said, "You'll have it and you'll submit to it."

B. A. Gould, an American resident in Toronto, declared that the people of Canada were doing things that he wished the people of the United States were even feeling. He spoke of "the high cost of living," not the bread, butter, meat and eggs cost of living, "though heaven knows that's bad enough," but the high cost of living a craven; blind to duty, without self-respect and the respect of friends.

Rev. C. E. Sharp told of life in the rades and Lieut. Col. Percy Guthrie made a fervent appeal to al young Canadians. Lieut. Ellis, R. N., gave an interesting lecture illustrated with slides of British warships, and Lieut. E. Toulmin, R. N. V. R., also spoke. Commodore Aemilius Jarvise, neval recruiting officer for Ontario, presided. A number of British blue-jackets were on the platform.

"Rev. F. S. Porter resigned from the board in March, as he was appointed a chaplain to the 104th overseas battalion. He is much missed as he was always a very interested member.


