GERMAN TRENCH; PREGRESS ELSEWHERE

Fighting Very Severe and British Have Had to Overcome Great Obstacles—Enemy's Only Success is Temporary Regaining of Small Piece of Ground

London, July 7—Capture by the British of a German trench on a front of 1,000 yards east of Laboliselle, in the Somme region was announced officially today.

The British resumed the offensive on certain sectors east of Albert at dawn today. At the same time the Germans launched heavy attacks on the British trenches near the Ancre, violent fighting is now in progress. In the vicinity of Ovillers and Containaison, as well as near Laboliselle, the British made progress. In the region of Thipevall, the Germans regained a section of lost ground.





Shelburne, N. S., July 8—With ship-yards and boat shops handling more work than ever before and in several instances with orders standing by waiting labor and material, this town is enjoying a period of etxceptional good times.

Did Not Start Poor But Had Some Millions Left to Her; Lawyers Have Been Her Great Trouble

Hetty Green, who died in New York this week, was the world's most remarkable mistress of finance. The fortune she has left is close to \$100,000,000. The richest woman in America, she lived almost as frugally as a shop-girl. Her home was wherever she chose for a time to hang her little black cape and bonnet, often in the hall bediroom of some cheap boarding house or in some remote and modest flat around New York.

Her eccentric extremes of economy led to a popular misconception of her as a "self-made woman." As a matter of fact she was horn rich. In 1865 she inherited some \$1,000,000 which accumulated upon itself until in fifty years it had multiplied nearly ten times. She also inherited family traditions which she was anxious to perpetuate in her children.

She was born in New Bedford, Mass, in November, 1834, about the 20th, according to her testimony at one time in court. She was a descendant on her mother's side of Henry Howland, brother of Pligrim John Howland of the Mayflower. In succeeding generations the Howland family became famous in the whaling industry and shipping trade with China, and had an irreproachable social standing. 



JELLICOE'S REPORT ON JUTLAND FIGHT

London, July 6—"Be pleased to inform the lords commissioners of the admiralty that the German high sea fleet was brought to action on the 31st of May, 1916, to the westward of Jutland bank, off the coast of Denmark."

In these words Vice-Admiral Sir John R. Jellicoe, commander-in-chief of the home fleets, opens his report to the admiralty on the battle over which there has been so much discussion.
