HELPFUL HINTS FOR

BUSY HOUSEWIVES CLEANING AND RENOVATING To clean a table pad, dissolve half a bar

To clean a table pad, dissolve half a bar of some good white soap and add two tablespoonfuls of gasoline when cool. Add this mixture to enough warm water to cover the pad and then allow it to soak for two or three hours. Then wash in a solution the same as above and rinse thoroughly. This is especially good for re-moving spots made by cream, and it leaves the pad clean and white. The most convenient scrub bucket is made of galvanized tin with a flaring top It is very light. This bucket should be fitted with a wire soap tray on the out-side for the soap is wasted when allowed to foat on the water. Holes can be punc-tured in the sides of the vessel and the tray fastened with a heavy cord. When a wooden bucket is used a small wooden box can be fastened on for a soap tray.
