PROTEST IS MADE

Paper Sees Grave Situation in Statement of Navy Secretary.

(By United Press.) Osaka, Japan, Nov. 7.—War between the United States and apan will be inevitable if th U. S. navy manoeuvres, pla for January, bring the Pa fleet into the Hawaiian Islands in fighting trim, according to a preg editorial in the Cons vative vernacular newspaper,

"The purpose of the man-oeuvre doubtless is to study how to fight Japan," the Mainichi says. "The only point differentiating the manoeuvres from actual warfare is that the fleet does not proceed to Hawaii direct from the Philippines. If the fleet should do this, the manoeuvre would be regarded as one of open hostility to Japan from

the tactical point of view.

"Japanese suspicion toward the United States already is at a climax and the untimely navy manoeuvers make the matter worse.

Preparation of the American navy in the Pacific last summer were detrimental to the strained relations between the two countries."

The Malnichi refers to the speech of Secretary Wilbur of the Navy Department, who recently declared that cold steel would cool hot passions.

After detailing the preparations being made for the occupation of Hawaii by the American fleet, the Mainichi declares:



# IS FOUND DEAD IN AUTOMOBILE

Robert Simpson of Barnesville Discovered by Companions Last Night.

Robert Simpson, aged about 48 years, postmaster, storekeeper and farmer at Barnesville, Kings county, was found dead in an automobile which was parked on the north side of King Square about 11.20 o'clock last nihgt by two companions, William S. Rogers, of Barnesville, and Medley J. Reed, of Sussex, who had been with him earlier in the evening.

The two men notified Police Constable Alex Chisholm and the officer conveyed the body in the automobile to police headquarters. Coroner William Warwick was summoned, viewed the body and gave permission for its removal to Chamberlain's undertaking rooms, Mill street.

Mr. Simpson leaves, besides a wife, two sons, the oldest being about 21 years old, at Barnesville, and one sister, Mrs. Lesile J. Jones, 28 Leinster street. The sister was notified of her brother's death and her husband drove to Barnesville early this morning to the deceased.

According to the story told by William S. Rogers last night, he accompanied Mr. Simpson in an automobile he sold to local merchants. While in the city they met Medley J. Reed, of Sussex, who was in their company for a time. The automobile was parked in the north side of King Square, opposite the Park Hotel and when Messrs. Rogers and Reed left to have something to eat and requested Mr. Simpson to accompany them, he refused, stating that he did not want anything to eat but would remain in the car.

Found Dead in Car.

The two men partook of an evening meal and then went about the city for on few hours and when they arrived at the car about 11.20 o'clock last night they were surprised to find Mr. Simpson lying on the floor of the car, dead. # **MORE CLERGYMEN** THAN DOCTORS NOW

Members of Legal Profession are Third on List in U. S. Census.


New York, Nov. 7—The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, in a report on legal education in the United States, offers some interesting statistics based on the zensus returns of 1920 concerning the supply of physicians, elergymen and lawyers in the United States. Commenting, on these statistics, the Journal of the American Medical Association says that, according to the census reports, in 1920 there were 164,781 physicians, 165,846 elergymen and 182,590 lawyers. Incidentally, the figures for physicians, asys the writer, included 14,774 nondescript healers and 5,080 osteopaths; the figures for clergymen included 14,078 religious and charity workers, and the figures for lawyers included 10,071 judges, Justices, magistrates, abstracters, notaries and justices of the peace. An analysis of the figures in comparison with those off preceding decades shows a 4.3 per cent. increase in lawyers. 




