Under this clause all except Canadian born citizens, if found guilty of violation of law or agitation against the state may after enquiry by the immigration department be deported. 

Gilbert the necessity of experimentation was overlooked. Hard thinking was frequently regarded as the sole requisite for scientific discovery. The University of Glasgow in Scotland lavs claim and rightly so, to the first laboratory in Chemistry as it is also the first institution to give laboratory instruction in Physics. In 1845 Lord Kelvin invited some of his students to aid him in his original researches. The Physical Laboratory used for a gerat many years was a disused wine cellar in the old University buildings. 





Magistrate Discusses Evidence and Reserves Judgment-Says Strap is Too

punished by Reverdy Steeves, pricipal of the Aberdeen school. He said he found five bruises in all, the most serious being a cut about three-quarters of an inch long under the eye.
