



Comedie Francaise Star Wants Caricature Destroyed and Demands Damages.

Paris, April 19.—Have people in the public eye the right to resent or try to prevent caricatures? That is the ques-tion that is interesting the artistic world in Paris. The question has been raised by the demand of the well-known Com-edie Francisce star, Ceell Sorel, that a caricature of her by an artist named Bib shown in an exhibition of humorous il-lustrators, be forthwith destroyed and that the artist pay her 10,000 france damages into the bargain. After having seen the picture an un-prejudiced observer is inclined to feel that the actress is justified in her com-plaint; if ever all the least desirable fe-male qualities were depicted in a human countenance, it is on this canvas, which bears Mile. Sorel's name in big letters. On the other hand, a court decision in her favor could not fall to be a prece-dent for further infringement of the rights of criticism which have already been greatly reduced by a recent judg-ment in a dispute between a theatre and a dramatic critic. Meanwhile M. Bib professes himself delighted by the threatened suit and has announced that he will send the actress a lavish gift of flowers in return for the lavish advertisements she has give.. The picture has been sold to ex-Min-ister DeMonzie, who lives at 7 Quai Voltaire, in the same apartment house as Mile. Sorel.



ROBBERS' VICTIM STARVED.
Body of Aged Man Found Gagged and Bound to Bed.
Washington, April 19—A world agree-ment of metal workers to prevent war by refusing to manufacture munitions is urged in a letter by William H. John-ston, president of the International As-sociation of Machinists, addressed to the Federation of Metal Workers at Berne, Switzerland. The Federation was urged to call a world conference for that purpose in accordance with a resolution adopted last September by the machin-ists' convention at Rochester.
"The League of Nations has been scrapped", Mr. Johnston said, "and it now devolves upon an agreement among the men of all nations who work in fac-tories producing materials of war to cease such manufacture to bring about an as-surance of permanent peace."

AMERICAN GIVES GATE TO VERDUN

Verdun, April 1.--(A. P., by mail.)-An impressive bronze gate will so added to the Rand memorial monu-over the famous "Trench of Bayo at Verdun. The gate has been des at Verdun. The gate has been designed by Andre Ventre, the Paris architect and now is on exhibition in Paris. Like the memorial itself, the gate is the gift of the late George F. Rand of Buffalo, N. Y. The gate will be erected at the en-trance of the historic trench about fifty feet from the memorial which covers the bodies of the French soldiers who were killed in the trench leaving their bayonets exposed above the ground. The gate is of thick bronze, about twelve by eight feet. A massive sword entwined with bronze leaves extends from the top to the bottom of the door. On each side of the entrance will be two bronze tablets, giving the name of the donor and a brief history of the trench. The memorial is of concrete construc-tion and is being given a smooth finish.




