(Amherst News) Gypsum quarrying has been suspended ed at Nappan until next year and the leighty men who were so employed will have to seek service elsewhere. Resump-tion of operations is promised for next spring and not before, because of the fire that in January demolished the New York refining plant of the Maritime Gypsum Company. In last year's opperations at the quar-ries thirty thousand tons of gypsum were cut away, carried to Amherst Point by private railroad and there loaded into steamers for New York. Two Norwe-gian steamers were under charter for his purpose throughout the season of navigation. It is six years since the Maritime Gypsum company started this industry. Most of the eighty men employed were transient residents who lived in boarding houses. A few came from Am-herst.




