New York, May 17.—Embarking June 21 on a "friendship trip" through Europe, 20 American boys will constitute the first group of this kind to advance international amity in accordance with a resolutinn adopted by the League of Nations Assembly. The tour, which will occupy ten weeks, will be under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Associations of North America

Europeans to Tour.

The itinerary includes, besides the Norwegian cruise, trips to England, France, Belgium, Holland, Sweden and Denmark. Outstanding features will be visits to Oxford, Stratford-on-Avon and the British Empire Exhibition in England, the Olympic games in France, and the International Boy Scout Jamboree which is to be held in Copenhagen from August 15 to 20.

Future similar tours are planned if this summer's experience is successful. At present it is expected that there will be two optional tours offered for 1925, one taking in northern Europe, and the other the principal countries of southern Europe.

Other plans under consideration call for an educational "friendship trip" of older boys to Japan and the Far East, tours in the United States for European boys, and a possible cruise around the world occupying an entire year.

Visit To St. John Recalls War Days



SCHOONER HITS ON "MAHOGANY"

Vilda A., From Parrsboro, is Freed and Towed Into Harbor.

The two-masted schooner Vilda A., bound from Parrsboro, N. S. for New Haven with lumber, struck on a reef off Manawagonish Island about three miles west of St. John in a dense fog at about 11 o'clock last night and was with difficulty pulled off this morning by the tug Neptune and towed to the Market Slip here with decks awash and a decided list to port. Captain Claude Winters of Parrsboro was unable to say to what extent his 98-ton schooner had been damaged. A survey will be made on Monday and provided authority is received from her owner, Oliver Allen of Port Greville, N. S., Captain Winters says he will have repairs effected here and proceed to New Haven with the lumber cargo, which is consigned to the Blanchard Lumber Company there.

LOCAL NEWS

In addition to Captain Winters, the other members of the crew are William Lake of Port Greville, N. S., Gus Olsen of Parrsboro and Lester Bliss of Five Islands, N. S. The crew had a trying experience soon after the schooner struck, says Captain Winters. "I heard the fog alarm on Partridge Island, but the fog was so dense you could hardly see your hand before you. We drifted in a channel between two islands but we were half way through before we saw either one. I immediately dropped my anchor. There was a strong tide running and the anchor did not check us. The schooner struck heavily, leaving from the mainmast to the stern in deep water." Had the schooner slid up on the ledge another five feet, it would have turned over and Captain Winters believes the tug would have been unable to pull her off the ledge.
