OTTAWA, Jan. 11—Canada's exports to the United Kingdom in Note wember last were more than four times as great as her imports therefrom. The latest summary of trade shows that the Dominion sent the United Kingdom goods to the value of \$55,524,454 in that mouth, while imports totalled that mouth, while imports totalled \$15,005, of which eleven millions were dutlable goods.

The principal imports were fibres and textiles and agricultural and vegetable products. The greater part of the exports were products of the farm, which totalled \$41,203,916, and animal products accounted for \$9,004,694 of the imports.

In the 12-month period ended November 30 last, imports from the United Kingdom totalled \$160,674,262 and exports \$456,031,749.



Causes for recurrent unrest were found to include the company's opposition to the United Mine Workers, the activities of the Communists, and friction within the union.



IN 1874 a 16-year-old lad from Belgrade, Michael Pupin, came to America as an immigrant steerage passenger. Today he is a professor of electro-mechanics at Columbia University and the incoming president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. Pupin arrived in the United States with but five cents in his pocket and one suit of clothes. His job was driving a team of mules on a Delaware farm. He was graduated from Columbia University After further independent study he decided to go to Germany to perfect himself for a scientific career.

When a department of engineering was opened at Columbia, Dr. Pupin was put in charge. While a member of the Columbia faculty he has had several important inventions in the electrical field to his credit. The first X-ray photos to be made in America were the work of the man who used to drive a mule team.

ADDRESSES DELIVERED.

"Sir Henry met the deputation in company with a number of his executives. Addresses were delivered by F. A. Heywood, president of the Montreal Corn Exchange; Bert Clare, of Thompson and Earle Co., and A. A. Wright, of Toronto. For Halifax, D. R. Turnbull, W. A. Black, M.P., G. W. Hensley and H. R. Silver were the speakers. Saint John spokesmen were Thomas Bell, M.P., and Dr. Murray MacLaren, M.P., J. D. McKenna and F. Maclure Sclanders, commissioner of the Saint John Board of Trade.

DISCUSSION MOST FRANK.

"The discussion was most frank and the Maritime delegates impressed upon meeting the broad national significance of the questions under consideration. They called attention to the fact that in the speech from the throne at Ottawa, it was suggested that the whole issue be referred to the Itailway Commission with power to take necessary steps to ensure use of Canadian ports for Canadian traffic.

"Sir Henry pledged himself and his staff to work earnestly for Canadian port development, to provide additional facilities to enable the ports satisfactorily to handle traffic offering, and to provide ample ocean tonnage. The heartiest co-operation of grain shippers was pledged in support of the principle of using Canadian ports and the delegates present, in turn, promised to do their utmost to bring about a satisfactory solution of the problems covered by the discussions.

Delegates Feel Importance Of Maritime Ports, Issue Gtes Attention It Merits

MONTREAL, Jan. 10.—Delegates from the Saint John and Halifax Boards of Trade, who met Sir Henry Thornton here Saturday, in company with W. A. Black, M.P., Halifax, and Thomas Bell and Dr. Murray MacLaren, M.P., Saint John, left the conference feeling that at last the importance of the great issue of transportation of Canadian commodities through Canadian ports had ben given that earnest consideration which it merits. Delegates from the East were busy and kept that way. Even the luncheon period was utilized to discuss the situation and exchange ideas. At no time in the conference was there a single suggestion of difference in outlook between the delegates from the two cities.

There was an unanimity that was impressive and throughout the

There was an unanimity that was impressive and throughout the deliberatons, those speaking for Canadian ports held to the broad view that it was a question affecting the whole of Canada. Both the Halifax and Saint John representatives expresed regret that Quebec City had not been asked to take part in the deliberations and it was pointed out, both the Maritime cities felt that their interests were identical with those of Quebec. It was a day of hard work. The meeting opened at 10.30 a.m. and it was after 5 o'clock before the last word had been said.

The program was carefully prepared. F. A. Heywood, President of the Montreal Corn Exchange, and Bert Clare, of Thomas & Earle Company, Spoke at length on the difficulties which attended the routing of grain and outlined the transportation scheme, which, in their opinion, regulates the flow of grain. While there were many obstacles to a greater Canadian routing presented at the morning session, the afternoon brought a different aspect of the case to the front. Messrs. Heywood and Clare both expressed their desire to use Canadian ports to a greater extent and they pressed their desire to use Canadian ports to a greater extent and they gave the meeting some sound advice as to how grain should be handled, pointing out some of the pitfalls to be avoided. Both pledged themselves to work in the interests of Canadian ports and every possible personal assistance was promised to the delegates by them.

CIR HENRY THORNTON definitely stated that he and his associates would do everything within their power to insure the development of Canadian ports and he asked that he be given credit for a desire to get behind any Canadian policy which might be suggested.

Categorically he promised more freight, additional facilities at Canadian ports and ample tonnage to handle traffic offering.

Sir Henry asked that he have the necessary co-operation from Halifax and Saint John. This was promised. Delegates from Halifax discussed very fully some of the neded additional equipment at that port and were assured of Sir Henry's backing. Saint John's problems were also mentioned and impressed upon the C. N. R. President.

Reference to the provison in the Speech from the Throne at Ottawa, in which the Railway Commission is instructed to devise ways and means to increase Canadian freight through Canadian ports was brought to Sir Henry's attention. There was the utmost frankness indulged in during the discussion. Those from the East plainly indicated that they were present to listen to suggestions. They felt that they were not in any way empowered to speak for the Maritime Province or Canada, and as a result, the questions under discussion were never allawed to get into a narrow grove, but were maintained on the high plain of national interest. Altogether it was quite a unique conference. There was no effort made to dominate the gathering.

It was the consensus of opinion of the delegates that the work of over a year has borne fruit and that, having succeeded in arousing Canada-wide interest in their case, the Maritime Provinces have at last forced the issue to the point where it canont be ignored.

The delegation issued to the Canadian Press a statement supplementing the one given out by Sir Henry Thornton.

It may be truthfully said that the delegation feel that they know Sir Henry better as a result of the trip and Sir Henry, in their opinion, knows them better and through them how important and pressing have become the issues submitted to him, not from the Maritime standpoint, but from the National outlook.

The delegation expressed their appreciation of the invitation to talk over with Sir Henry the question of Canadian ports, and the C. N. R. President thanked those present for the interest manifested.
