TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Twentieth Annual Meeting was held at the Home, 21 St. Mary Street, on Friday, 25th of October.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor presided. A letter from Mayor Kennedy, regretting his unavoidable absence was read.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. John Pearson, and after a few opening remarks by the Chairman, the Managers' Report was read by the Acting Secretary, Mrs. Alfred Hoskin, the adoption of which was moved by Rural Dean Sweeney. The Treasurer, Mrs. Boulton, presented her annual statement.

The following gentlemen moved and seconded the various reports:—Sir William Howland, Mr. Herbert Mason, Rev. Mr. Milligan, Mr. Thomas Hodgins, Q.C., Prof. Mavor, Mr. Hoyles, Q.C., and Dr. Palmer.

After closing prayer by the Rev. Mr. Drummond, the meeting adjourned to afford an opportunity of inspecting the Home, and to partake of refreshments provided by the Managers.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

This, the Twentieth Annual Report of The Infants' Home and Infirmary, will seem very crude when compared with those prepared for us in the past; for with very great regret we

were compelled in July to accept the resignation of Mrs. A. E. Williamson, who, for seven years had been our faithful and most able Secretary. In looking over the Report presented by Mrs. Williamson in 1894, it seems to us, that with great thoughtfulness she must have prepared it as our reference for the future, it is so comprehensive, entering so fully into the origin, needs and working of this Home from its very incorporation, that we may call it THE Report of the Infants' Home and Infirmary; merely supplementing it with details of the passing years.

The number of inmates in this Home on October 1st, 1895, was 84, 60 infants and 24 women, an increase of 27 on the corresponding date in 1894. During the year 73 women and 157 children have been admitted, a total of 230. Our monthly average of 80 may not appear very large, nor the proportion of children too great, until the ages are considered; the infants, many only a few days old, with so frail a hold upon life that each one requires (could it be given), the entire care of Nurse Young. Then, the so-called women, many of them only girls, irresponsible, ignorant, knowing very little how to care for themselves, and certainly, still less of how the little life they are responsible for, should be cared for and guarded, they are, in fact, only older children, to be watched, trained and guided. A grave responsibility, and we cannot express too strongly, how greatly our anxiety for the well-being and well-doing of these our charges, is lessened by our safe reliance upon the wise judgment, and the constant kindly care shown to each one by our Superintendent and her Assistants.

Of the many causes we have had for thankfulness during the past year we may mention one or two. Our freedom from any serious epidemic, our comparatively healthy house-

hold and the support we still continue to receive from our many friends and the general public, notwithstanding the depression that still hangs heavily over the city.

We have been so fortunate as to have adopted into good homes four of our motherless ones, for it is only from the ranks of those little ones, that we allow our adoptions to be made, and it has been very cheering to us to receive from time to time letters telling of the satisfaction and happiness existing between the adopted parents and children.

Through the kind interest of Mr. J. K. Macdonald we have obtained a share, with other Charitable Institutions, in a ward in the General Hospital for infectious diseases such as not already provided for, as in diphtheria and scarlet fever cases.

During the year attention was called by our Advisory Board, to certain discrepancies existing between the original Charter, and the Constitution as printed. Acting under their advice amendments have been made and clauses inserted. The Constitution thus amended will be the one printed in future Reports.

To the Clergy of St. Luke's Church, for their Sunday Service, to the Rev. John Pearson, of Holy Trinity, who attends monthly to baptize our little nameless ones, to our most efficient House Staff and Medical Staff, to the ladies in charge of the Work-room and of the Woman's Bible Class, and to our Treasurer, we would wish to record here, our sincere thanks and gratitude to them, one and all, for their regular and untiring service in behalf of this Home and its inmates.

MEDICAL REPORT.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—We have much pleasure in submitting to you the Report of the Medical Staff of the Infants' Home for the year ending 30th September, 1895.

The year has been a very encouraging one. Starting with 36 children there were 121 admitted during the twelve months, making a total of 157 little ones. Out of this large number we have had only 26 deaths, or a death rate of barely 17 per cent. Last year the death rate was considerably higher than this.

A death loss of 17 out of every hundred children admitted during a period of 12 months and drawn from all sources, some healthy, robust, and of respectable parentage, but many of them neglected, forsaken and starved, often diseased and of unhealthy parentage, speaks strongly in favor of such a Home and of the manner in which it is conducted. Its success in saving the life of the helpless babe regardless of where it comes from or what have been its surroundings, apart altogether from its further usefulness in developing its physical and moral health, is alone sufficient to commend such an Institution to the favorable notice of the charitably inclined.

The Home has not been free from threatenings of infectious diseases. We had one case of diphtheria which necessitated the whole house being placed in quarantine for three weeks. The afflicted child was sent to the Isolation Hospital where it died. This same child came to us from the Children's Aid Society and almost immediately upon entering developed chicken pox which spread in spite of care and isolation until we had 56 cases none of whom died.

There were 36 children vaccinated during the year. These were all satisfactory with one exception, that of a delicate diseased child.

During the intensely cold spell in February last we had several cases of dysentery from which we lost some four or five.

Cancrum Oris, a somewhat rare affection, accounted for the death of one little inmate.

We closed the year with 60 children, babies, in fact, for there are only some twelve out of the number walking, yet they are mostly in good shape and thriving well.

Amongst some of the features which tend towards the good health and success of the Home and upon which the Board are to be congratulated are : the almost complete system of isolation when necessary, the now good sanitary condition of the building, the securing of efficient as well as increased supervision both of nurses and children and the encouragement of even a more liberal and a more varied dietary than heretofore.

CÓNSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary of Toronto."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for the children of wet nurses, the daily charge of infants whose parents labor away from home, the charge of destitute children under two years of age, entrusted to its care by any municipality in Ontario, and the care, medical attention, and nursing of sickly and dying infants.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money the matter shall be dealt with at the discretion of the Committee.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and twenty-five other ladies, who shall be assisted by an Advisory Board of three gentlemen.

V.

The officers and other members of the Board of Managers shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting of the Society.

VI.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society, provided one month's notice be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the Advisory Board.

VII.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Board. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,—especially in the investment of funds.

VIII.

In case any vacancy shall occur by the death or resignation of any officer, member of the Board, or Advisory Board, before the expiry of the term of office, the Board of Managers shall thereupon elect a person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired period of the term.

IX.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, and other means.

X.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a chartered bank in the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet-nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet-nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the Board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A Committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, consisting of the President (or Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The Committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and

Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This Committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the General Committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each Manager taking his duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the Weekly Committee.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHERLESS CHILDREN.

Application for the admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission. Children from outside municipalities double fee.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES WITH CHILDREN.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services to the Institution for as long as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and infant, and before any woman is permitted to leave the Home the particulars of her case shall be laid before the Board by the Superintendent.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the Visiting Physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, etc., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her firstborn.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is deemed satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection from such children as are deserted and dependent on charity, and not visited by parents or friends, then the necessary papers will be filled in ready for their signatures.
