HUMAN NATURE.
An Interesting Study at the World's Fair.

The Human Interrogation Point To Be Observed All Over the Grounds and Buildings—Do Not Be Backward About Asking Questions When Your Curiosity Is Aroused.
WORLD'S FAIR, May 18.—[Special.]—No part of the big show is more interesting than the crowds that visit it. You read in the papers that there were thirty, forty or fifty thousand paid admissions to the fair on a given day; you must not imagine that these figures convey an idea of the size of the multitude to be seen wandering about the grounds and buildings. In addition to the paid admissions there are all the time fifty to seventy-five thousand persons within the gates who do not pay. They are the exhibitors and their assistants, watchmen, workmen, newspaper representatives, the guards, firemen, guides and selling-chair men, etc., etc., and their families. Even on the duller days we have a fair of 100,000 human beings within the enclosure. But there is no crowding. The great exposition and its mammoth buildings are so arranged as to be a field of corn takes in the batteries which are attracted by its green and glistening fragrance.

It is curious to watch these crowds as they go on their sight-seeing rounds. If you want to study human nature this is a pretty place in which to do it. You hold here not only representatives of all races and countries, but also as great a variety of human animals as it is possible to get together in any one spot on the earth's surface. The throng presents one characteristic which stands out strongly above all others. It is such a conspicuous thing that after a day passed on the grounds one goes away with a vivid recollection of having seen a large number of humanity in a certain posture. The posture is that of an interrogator. It is a specimen of that which we all see as we long leaning forward, a look of expectancy upon his face, the work of inquiry troubling his mind. This is the posture which is seen on the face of the visitor as he looks at the exhibits, and among them are the many of the world's great men and women.
