



ALGER HAD A POOR

Backbone

The Deceased Senator Had Several Times Offered to Resign From the Cabinet But President Would Not Consent.

that he would quit the presidency first. General Alger said that the resignation was later accepted because the President was "embarrassed" and "annoyed" because of Alger's alleged alliance with Governor Pingree, in a plan to elect Alger to the United States Senate, McMillan having promised to give way to General Alger after his (McMillan's term was up. General Alger said that McKinley lacked backbone.

After telling of the arrangement with Governor Pingree and other Michigan politicians, that he run for the Senate to succeed James McMillan who agreed to withdraw in General Alger's favor at the end of his term, General Alger continues that on his return to Washington he was informed by a newspaper man that President McKinley was annoyed because he (General Alger) had formed with a man hostile to the President (meaning Governor Pingree) an alliance against a firm supporter of the administration (Senator McMillan).

General Alger piaced no credence in the report. Later, 'however, when in New York he received a telegram from Vice President Hobart, asking him to run down to west end, Long Branch. There he was informed by Mr. Hobart that the President was embarrassed because General Alger had formed an alliance with Pingree.

Continuing General Alger said:

"Hobart and I said little or nothing morea bout the matter, but when I returned to Washington I went to the president and asked him why, inasmuch as I had always dealt frankly and directly with him, he had not spoken to me instead of troubling poor Hobart about the matter. I asked the president if I had really embarrassed him.

"'Yes,' he said, 'you have embarrassed me and I am annoyed.'

"I told him that I could readily relieve his embarrassment by resigning from his cabinet.

"'I have not asked you to resign,' he

"I told nim that I count readily relieve his embarrassment by resigning from his cabinet.

"I have not asked you to resign." he said, 'I shall never ask you to resign.'
"But I wrote out my resignation and sent it to the president. In the meantime McMillan had announced his candidacy for re-election to the senate, a most dishonorable thing to do in view of his promise to me and many others. Before I had resigned as secretary of war, even before I had seen the president regarding Hobart's massage to me, I had decided, in order to prevent a fight among the Republicans of Michigan (a fight I should have won, however) to withdraw as a candidate for the senate. I did not tell the president so. The option he meant to give me, you see, was to abandon the fight against McMillan, in order to save my place in the cabinet. I resigned as secretary of war and in a few days I received from the president has written acceptance of my resignation. Then I went to the president and I told him that when I had accepted a place in his cabinet I had not surrendered my citizenship."



> SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by, any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the tollowing plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent

WINNIPEG, Jan. 24.—The Dominion government is bringing pressure upon the Doukhobors to induce them to become British subpects, and to occupy and cultivate their lands individually, like other citizens. Circulars printed in both Russian and English have been sent to the elders and people of every village. The circular says in part: "Doukhobors who make entry within three months, either with the commission who will visit your village, or at the land office, must state, when making re-entry, whether they intend to live on the land or in the village, and must state their intention of becoming British subjects. If the land is within three miles of the village in which they reside, they will be able to hold the land by cultivating it for their own use while living in the village. BUT SAID NOTHING German Centrist Leader Makes Bad Terrific Struggle With Maniac Who Was

BERLIN, Jan. 24.—The electioneering campaign opened this week with a distinct score for the government against the Centre. It will be remembered that the government declared that it had shown the Centrist leader, Spahn, on Dec. 12, in the Reichstag, the despatch of General Deimling, the commander-in-chief in Southwest Africa, in which he said that, even if the Boncelwarks surrendered, the German forces could not be immediately reduced.

The despatch was evidently handed to Spain with the intention that he show it to the other Centrist deputies, thus perhaps causing them to refrain from voting against the government, and consequently saving the Reichstag from dissolution. Dr. Spahn has now been heard on the matter. He admits that the despatch was shown to him, but he asserts that he read only one sentence, and handed it back to the government official who had given it to him, as he clid not think he ought to read further.



of potatoes. They grow these chiefly from force of habit, for the small profits now received are scarcely to be regarded as a strong inducement, and indeed are not sufficient to persuade the sons to remain at home. The quantities of farm products held on the land are sufficient to furnish heavy freights for two dally steamers during the entire winter, and if communication were at all certain the offerings from other branches of industry would tax the transportation facilities of the island to their utmost.

SOME INSTANCES.

To illustrate: For years Harold Jenkins of Charlottetown handled large consignments of frozen smelts for the American markets. He struggled against adverse conditions and finally was forced to the conclusion that he was beaten. But he determined to persist for one year longer, and in the winter of 1904-05 sent a carload of smelts to Georgetown. They were held up so long that the odor from the car became sickening. Still the fish were carried to New York, and there used as fertilizer. Mr. Jenkins' loss was upwards of \$2,500, which amount would represent the profit on a season's business. He has not shipped any more fish. This is one instance out of scores, and the outcome is only what was to be expected—the frozen fish industry has dwindled away until now it practically does not exist. Hundreds of men—thousands perhaps—who had been in the habit of earning fair wages during the winter are now idle, and smelt fishing is carried on only by little boys sitting on the wharves.

Charlottetown, Summerside and many of the smaller towns are during the summer months centres of activity. They are populated by enterprising and energetic merchants, many of whom have remained in their native towns rather than move abroad, actuated solely by a feeling of interest in the welfare of their province. But they are discouraged. They see absolutely no prospect for improved trade conditions, they are paying out money for living expenses and are taking in next to nothing. During the present season these sometime busy towns are painfully dull and slow, the streets are deserted, there is no evidence of activity in any line. Visit one of the
