PRESTON CHURCH,

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 1974.

THE Association met with the First Preston Church, pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order by the Rev. James, Thomas, Chairman. After singing, prayer was offered by the Rev. James Wilmot; the Rev. James Thomas read the Third Epistle of John and commented briefly upon the same.

The Committee made the following Report:

That there be three services to morrow, Sunday, viz.: At 11 o'clock, a. m., and 3 and 7 o'clock, p. m.

That a collection be taken after each service for the benefit of the Association.

That the times of meeting be as follows :---

Morning Sessions from 9 o'clock, a. m. to 1, p. m.

Afternoon " " 3, p. m. to 5, p. m.

Evening " " 7 to 10 o'clock.

Moved by Deacon John Brooks, seconded by Brother Daniel Goffican, and

Resolved:—That the Report of the Committee on Arrangemants be received and adopted.

The Rev. James Thomas gave an account of the requests submitted to the Council, for the Ordination to the Ministry of Brethren George Carvery of First Preston Church, and Samuel R. Walls of Cornwallis Church, and after some discussion upon the same it was—

Resolved :—That these brethren be examined by the Ministering Brethren, and afterwards in public, and if the questions as to their religious sentiments are answered satisfactorily, and in accordance with our Faith and Order, then said brethren to be publicly ordained in accordance with the requests of the Churches above named, to-morrow, at 3 oclock, p. m.

Voted: That all meetings be opened and closed with prayer.

At 11 o'clock, a. m.—Preaching by brother Samuel R. Walls, and George Carvery, Licentiate.

At 3 o'clock, p. m.—Preaching by the Rev. James Wilmot and Rev. Alexander Bailey.

At 7 o'clock, p. m.—Preaching by Rev. J. R. Thomas and others.

10 O'CLOCK, A. M.

Preaching by Brother Samuel R. Walls, from Proverbs xiv. 32; followed by Brother Geo. Carvery.

3 O'CLOCK, P. M.

Preaching by the Rev. James Wilmot, followed by the Rev. Alexander Bailey; after which the Candidates for Ordination, Brethren George Carvery and Samuel R. Walls, were examined publicly (they having been previously examined by the Brethren in the Ministry), as to their religious sentiments of our Faith and Order, and gave sufficient satisfaction as to the same. The Rev. James Thomas offered the imposing ceremony prayer (after the laying on of hands). The Right-hand of Fellowship was given by the Rev. Jas. Wilmot on behalf of the Churches, and on behalf of the Association by Rev. J. R. Thomas. The Charge to the Candidates and Churches by the Rev. James Thomas.

7 O'CLOCK, P. M.

Preaching by Rev. J. R. Thomas from Hebrews ix. 13, 14; followed by Revs. S. R. Walls, James Wilmot, Brother John Smith and others. Singing, speaking and praying until eleven o'clock, when the anxious Congregation was dismissed.

MONDAY MORNING SESSION.,

SEPTEMBER 28: 9 O'CLOCK, A. M.

Prayer by Brother James Downey, Licentiate.

The Minutes of the previous session read and approved.

Voted: That the Brethren from sister Churches be invited to a seat in Council with us.

The following Committees were then appointed : viz. :--

FINANCE AND AUDIT: -- Revs. A. Bailey, S. R. Walls; Deacons John Brooks, Riehard Simons; Brethren William Johnston, Joseph Flint.

Voted : That the Secretary read the letters.

Adjourned for ten minutes. Met pursuant to adjournment.

The Rev. James Wilmot preached the Introductory Sermon from Kirst Corinthians xiv. 8: "For if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself to the battle."

Prayer by Brother John Smith. Adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

3 O'CLOCK, P. M.

The Minutes of previous Session read, corrected. and approved.

• The Committee appointed to Examine the Letters from the Churches Reported as follows :---

That they have performed the duty assigned them, and recommend that the letters be read publicly.

The Report of the Committee was adopted, and the Letters were then read: many of them containing valuable information respecting the 'Missionary services performed by the Rev. James Thomas and other Brethren, and asking the Association to continue the same among the Churches.—The Rev. James Wilmot reported in reference to the Bear River Church, which he had visited, and that he had received an application 'from eight of the members of said Church to ask this Association to continue their recognition of them, as they did not wish to withdraw themselves from our connection.—It was thereupon

Rssolved: That the request of the Brethren from Bear River

Voted : That the Rev. J. R. Thomas write the Circular Letter.

Voted. That we procure 200 copies of the Minutes, and that 15 copies be reserved for the use of the Association.

Voted: That the Secretary superintend the printing of the Minutes.

Voted: That the Rev. J. R. Thomas preach the Introductory Sermon, and that Rev. S. R. Walls be his alternate.

Voled: That the Association be held next year (D. V.) with the Cornwallis Church, by request.

Preaching by the Rev. Alexander Bailey, from St. Luke xv. 18: followed by Brethren George Brown, John Williamson, and James Downey, Licentiates; and others.

The Rev. S. R. Walls offered the following preamble and Resolution in reference to the alteration of time of holding the Annual Session. The same was seconded by Brother John Williamson, and, after some discussion as to the advisability of such a change, was adopted :—

Believing that it will tend to the further opening up of the resources of this Association, by allowing those who are now hindered from attending our sessions, owing to the season the same are now holden, being inconvenient, especially to the farmers, therefore,—

Resolved:—That this Association now alter their present stated times of meeting to that of the last Saturday in August.

Moved, seconded and

Resolved:—That the thanks of this Association be tendered to the members and well-wishers of the First Preston Church, for their kind hospitality, in so generously entertaining the Ministers and Delegates.

The Secretary thereupon communicated the same to the Rev. George Carvery, Pastor of the Church, in a short speech, Brother Carvery responding in a very pleasing manner.

Resolved:—That the thanks of this Association be tendered to our Chairman, for the zealous and ardent manner in which he so ably conducted the proceedings of this present Session.
