

CIRCULAR.

THE MOUNT ALLISON LADIES' COLLEGE was opened for the reception of students on Thursday, the 17th of August, 1854. The edifice was planned and finished for the express purpose of affording a pleasant, healthy, and in every respect desirable residence for Young Ladies requiring a course of liberal educational training. The main building is 160 feet long by 50 feet wide, three stories high, with a French roof. It is heated throughout with steam, each room being provided with one or more Nason's Radiators, fitted with valves, by which the temperature may be regulated at pleasure. The apartments are exceedingly commodious, and are all tastefully and comfortably furnished, so as to present a most inviting home for a large number of resident students. It is designed to be, in every respect, equal to any public institution devoted to the advancement of female education in the Dominion. The eminence on which the College is situated commands an extensive view of a rich and beautiful stretch of country. The surrounding grounds are well adapted for exercise and pleasant walks, secluded from public observation. The locality is specially noted for its healthfulness.

The constant object of all the Officers of Instruction is to impart an education which regards not accomplishments merely, but one which will modify the character and bestow the power of self control; one which will enable the possessor to enrich the genial atmosphere of home with calm and elevated enjoyments,—an education which shall prepare the daughter, the sister, and the mother, to exert a moral influence, the stronger always for being associated with intellectual vigor.

The family and class organizations of the Ladies' College are entirely distinct from those of the neighboring

Academy and University, with this exception - that young women, as soon as they are prepared, are admitted to the regular University classes and lectures, and may claim all the advantages, honors, and degrees of the University on the same conditions as students of the other sex. Hence a course of study ranging from the elementary English branches to and through a full curriculum for the Baccalaureate Degree may be pursued at these Institutions by young ladies under the most favorable circumstances, surrounded by social safeguards, and amid social advantages quite unusual to school life.

The department of Reading and Elocution has been placed in charge of a graduate of the Monroe College of Oratory, of Boston, Mass. The system of voice training followed, being that of the school above named, is designed to give fulness, volume, great range, smoothness, evenness, flexibility, sympa-

thy and power.

The ornamental Branches, though regarded only as the accessories and embellishments of learning - not its substitute - are given due prominence in our courses of study. The tendency of the study of the Fine Arts to cultivate the taste and refine the manners is fully recognized. Hence adequate provision is made for a thorough and extended course of instruction in Vocal and Instrumental Music and in Drawing and Painting.

Recognizing the supreme importance of bodily health, increasing attention has been given during the past years to calisthenics and light gymnastics. In the erection of the New Conservatory of Music, a large and commodious room for a gymnasium has been reserved; and, with our improved facilities, we propose to give our pupils the advantages of a still more thorough and comprehensive course in physical

culture.



Terms, Courses of Study, Eta

The Collegiate year is divided into two Terms; the first Term, sixteen weeks long, begins on Thursday, the 4th of September, and ends on the Wednesday before Christmas; the second Term, twenty-one weeks long, begins on the first Thursday after the first of January, and ends the first Wednesday in June.

The Institution provides seven Courses of Study:

- 1. The Primary Department.
- 2. The University Preparatory Course.
- 3. The Graduating Course for the title of M.L.A.
- 4. The Regular Course for the Degree of B.A.
- 5. Courses in Shorthand and Typewriting.
- The Courses of Instrumental Music (Piano, Organ or Violin), and Wocal Culture.
- 7. The Course in Drawing and Painting.

The Primary Department.

This Course of Study embraces Arithmetic, Eng. Grammar, History, Reading, Spelling, Penmanship, Geography, Book-Keeping, etc., and is designed for pupils who may not be prepared to enter the classes in the higher departments.

The University Preparatory.

This Course of Study is designed to secure to the student thorough preparation for University matriculation. The

subjects are English Grammar and Analysis, History, Latin, Greek, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, and Natural Philosophy.

Collegiate Bepartment:

Students in this department desiring to take the M.L.A. Degree will be required to pass preliminary examinations in the following subjects: English History, Canadian History, Geography, Arithmetic, English Grammar and Analysis.

Every student who completes the above course of study, and passes the required examinations, will be entitled to receive a Diploma conferring the title and degree of M. L. A., or Mistress of Liberal Arts.

A student who takes only a partial or elective course of study may, upon being regularly dismissed, receive a Certificate to indicate the extent of such a course.

Regular Course for the Degree of A. B.

The University of Mount Allison College, with all its privileges and honors, is open to Young Ladies attending the College. The degree of Bachelor of Arts is conferred upon those who complete the prescribed course of study and pass satisfactorily the required examinations.

The Courses in Shorthand and Typewriting are designed to meet the needs of those who wish to fit themselves for employment in business offices.

Department of Prawing, Painting, Etc.

. The method of Instruction in this Department is that employed in the best European schools. Copying, under the eye of a skilful teacher, is regarded as the first means of acquiring correct ideas of the Art; but from the beginning the pupil will be taught that nature is her ultimate guide, and as early as possible will be accustomed to make studies and sketches from natural forms.

Pupils will be entitled to Diplomas upon completion of the following

COURSE OF STDUY.

Pencil Drawing.—Object Drawing from Flat Copies; Shading and Drawing from Models.

*SECOND YEAR.

Charcoal and Crayon Drawing from Flat Copies; Object Drawing from Antique Models; Enlarging from Photographs.

THIRD YEAR.

Oil Painting .- Copying and Painting from Still Life, -Flowers, Fruit and Landscape.

FOURTH YEAR.

Oil Painting from Life; Designing and Composition; China Modelling and Decorative Work.

*Water Colors may be substituted for Charcoal and Crayon Drawing.

Pomestic Arrangements, Etc.

The Principal and his family, as well as the Preceptress and other Teachers, live in constant and immediate connection with the Collegiate family.

The Young Ladies are not allowed to associate with the students of the University or Male Academy, except in accordance with well considered and established regulations under official direction.

Parents and guardians of young ladies may be assured that while the most stenuous efforts will be made to secure the development and strengthing of the mental powers, and to form correct general habits and a high principled Christian character, due attention will also be given to the preservation of health, and the cultivation of refined taste

and lady-like manners. With this object in view, familiar Conversational Lectures will be given by the Preceptress or by other teachers, on the Personal, Domestic, and Social Proprieties of Life. These Lectures will embrace such tropics as private personal habits, - as to exercise, exposure, eating, sleeping, and sitting, walking, dress, and room; domestic manners; table manners; school-room manners; hotel and railroad manners; street manners; manners in public assemblies, - as in church, concert, parties, and parlors; manners towards kindred and friends; manners in intercourse with other ladies; manners and intercourse with gentlemen. In short, no pains will be spared by these lecturers, and by private hints and suggestions, as occasion shall require, so as to regulate the daily deportment of each pupil, as to make easy and habitual all the graces and proprieties of refined and accomplished womanhood.

Receptions.

Drawing room entertainments are given frequently, to which all the officers and students of the University and Academies are invited. These Receptions, enlivened by music and pleasant conversational intercourse, are found to exert a very beneficial influence on the manners of the students, and to promote a healthy development of the social

Correspondence, Disits, Etc.

Students are allowed to correspond with the home circle without any supervision; but correspondence beyond the home circle is not allowed without special permission; and, without such permission, letters may be destroyed by the Principal, or forwarded to the parents, as he may judge best.

Students, unless accompanied by a teacher, will not be permitted to visit families in the vicinity without the written request of parents or guardians to the Principal authorizing him to grant such permission; and parents and guardians are earnestly advised not to allow their children or wards to be absent during Term-time for the purpose of visiting at home or elsewhere. Visitors will be expected to present proper letters of introduction before being permitted to call on any of the young ladies.

Dress.

It is especially desired that the dress of students shall be simple and inexpensive.

Each student will be provided with thick boots, Indiarubber over-shoes, a water-proof cloak, and a loose dress to be worn while taking gymnastic or other active exercise.

Times of Payment.

An advance payment of Fifty Dollars is strictly required at the beginning of each term.

The balance of the First Term's account is payable on the fifteenth day of November; and of the Second Term's account on the first day of May in each year.

No deduction is made for absence during Terms unless it is rendered necessary by sickness or other unavoidable cause, and exceeds two weeks.

The Institution will be closed during vacations. Christmas special arrangements will be made for the accommodation of students who are unable to reach their homes.

Miscellaneous Remarks.

ALL who design to become students of the Institution should enter, if at all possible, at the commencement of the Term, as the regular classes are then organized; pupils, however, will be received at any time. The only pre-requisites for admission into the Primary Department are a good moral character, ability to read and spell, and age sufficient to enable the pupil to prepare regularly for recitation.

Students in good standing can receive an honorable dismissal from the Institution at the close of any Term, and at

no other time, except in special cases.

Parents and guardians are respectfully requested to write to the Principal, should they find it necessary to recall a student in Term-time.

Persons who may not wish to pursue either Course regularly, will be allowed to enter any of the Classes for which they are qualified; but where there is no inclination or desire on the part of the parents or guardians of the youthful students, dictating a modified course, they will be examined, and have their places assigned in the Department which they may be prepared to join, and they will be required to pursue the regular Course, as above given, while they continue in the Institution.

Parents are particularly requested to send every article of

clothing marked with the name of the pupil in full.

If parents wish to aid us in our efforts to promote the health of their daughters, they will do well to heed our earnest request that no eatables, except perhaps fresh fruit, be sent to those under our care. Our table is abundantly supplied with every needful variety of wholesome food. A large part of the little sicknesses among students is directly traceable to the "boxes from home." We suggest also that spending money, beyond actual needs, is injurious in its influence on students, and should not be furnished.

Library, Apparatus, Etc.

The Library, containing a large number of well-selected volumes, is for the use of all the students.

The Recitation Room, Laboratory, and Lecture Rooms are furnished with Geological and Astronomical Maps and Globes, and Philosophical, Astronomical and Chemical Apparatus.

A full supply of all the Text Books, Music, Stationery, Materials for Drawing, Painting, etc., needed by students, possible prices.

Situation, Buildings, Etc.

Sackville is situated on the line of the Intercolonial Railway, midway between Halifax and Saint John. Four express trains connecting these cities pass daily, as well as accommodation trains from nearer points. The various branches and extensive connection of the Intercolonial bring Sackville into direct railway or steamboat communication with all parts of the Maritime Provinces, as well as with the Western Provinces of the Dominion and the United States.

The College Buildings are elegant, spacious, and comfortable, and delightfully situated upon an elevation of ground so that they command one of the richest and most extensive views in the Dominion.





Conservatory of Music.

A talented and experienced Professor of Music, educated in Germany, and three well trained and accomplished Lady Teachers devote their attention exclusively to Pianoforte Instruction. The Vocal Culture is under the direction of a Lady who has studied under some of the best vocalists of Germany and New York. The Violin Department, recently added, is already one of the most popular in the Institution. The Professor, who is a pupil of Franz Kneisel, leader of Boston Symphony Orchestra, is an accomplished musician. The Courses of Instruction embrace a thorough training in Instrumental Music (Pianoforte, Organ and

Violin), Vocal Culture, Class Singing (according to Tonic Sol Fa System), Harmony, Counterpart, Analysis and Composition. A class will be organized this year for the study of such Subjects as can receive but limited attention in the ordinary Course of Instruction; such as Musical History and Terminology, Elementary Harmony, etc The Institution is fully supplied with Superior Pianoforers, and the arrangements are such that the Students while practising, are under the supervision of the Professors and Teachers. It is confidently believed that no greater facilities can be found elsewhere for securing a thorough knowledge of Music, both Vocal and Instrumental.

Diplomas, under the College Seal, will be awarded to Students who shall have satisfactorily completed either the Pianoforte or Violin Courses.

All resident music pupils are required to take at least two subjects in the literary department.



SPECIAL CIRCUBAR.

New Conservatory.

The Musical Faculty wish particularly at this time to call the attention of the public to the new Conservatory of Music, now in course of erection, which will be open to students at the commencement of the second Term, January 8, 1891. This handsome and commodious building will contain on the ground floor an Assembly Room and Gymnasium, separated by sliding doors, which can be opened out, thus throwing the whole floor into one large room as occasion may require for musical recitals and calisthenic exhibitions. The second and third floors will contain thirty-five rooms for the use of teachers and pupils for instruction and practise.

The whole building will be suitably finished and furnished with all modern appliances for the comfort and

convenience of teachers and pupils.

The music rooms will be supplied throughout with new pianos of the best makers. The organ in Lingley Hall and the new vocalion, which will be placed in the Assembly Room of the Conservatory, will furnish special facilities for pupils wishing instruction on the pipe organ.

These improvements, taken in connection with the present equipment of this department, will enable the Faculty to offer facilities for a musical education unexcelled by any institution in the Dominion of Canada. It is the design of the Faculty to make it unnecessary for persons wishing to obtain a thorough and complete musical education, or to prepare themselves to teach music, to go outside of the Maritime Provinces.

Musical Library.

During the past year the foundation has been laid for a library of interesting literature on musical subjects. This will be added to from year to year. These books will be accessible to all students.

Recitals.

These are given at regular intervals throughout the year, and all pupils who can creditably do so have the privilege of appearing in them. These opportunities for playing in public are given to secure for the pupils ease and self-reliance, and are regarded as an essential part of a musical education.

Musical History.

Classes in Musical History and Elementary Harmony, upon which all students are expected to attend, will be conducted free of charge.

Orchestra.

All students of the Violin are organized into an Orchestra for the practice of ensemble playing, studying and performing selections, and accompanying the singing class in recitals and other public performances.
