MINIMUM SCALE OF PRICES IN FOODSTUFFS URGED BY LABOR MEN

Quebec, Sept. 13.—At this aftermoon's session of the convention of the Canadian Federation of Labor, a number of important resolutions were recommended by the committee on resolution stated that the federation dealt with was the provision of suitable employment for wounded soldiers returning from the front, and a resolution stated that the federation urgently approved the establishment of technical schools for the wounded soldiers. Saloniki, via London, Sept. 13.—The erbian official communication issued FRONT BUT NO GREAT CHANGES — BRITISH MAKE NO FURTHER EFFORTS TO ADVANCE IN STRUMA REGION.

> The French troops to the north of Peronne are holding tenaciously to the salient they have driven into the German line eastward of the Bethune-Peronne road near Bouchavesnes. They also hold intact the town of Bouchavesnes and other points along the line captured in the offensive which they started Tuesday. In addition a powerfully organized German trench system south of the Lepriez Farm, near the road running west from Rancourt to Combles, has been captured, placing Combles in further jeopardy.

> The fighting in the region of Bouchavesnes has been of sanguir ary character. Finding that the French had cut their line of con nication from Peronne northward, the Germans threw violent attacks against L'Abbe Wood and Hill 76, south of Bouchavesnes, and succeeded in recapturing both places. The French, however, returned vicious ly to the attack, and after hard fighting, some of it hand-to-hand, final ly drove out the Germans and kept the ground they had won.

> In the two days' fighting more than 2,300 Germans were taken prisoner, and a large number of guns and machine guns captured.

FIERCE FIGHTING IN MACEDONIA.

On that part of the Somme front held by the British the situation remains unchanged. South of the Somme, heavy artillery duels between the French and the Germans continue in the region of Verman dovillers and Chaulnes. A repulse of a German attack near Fleury, in the Verdun sector, is reported by Paris.

All along the Macedonian front heavy fighting continues, but no portant changes in positions have been reported. The Italians have joined in the fray west of the Vardar river. Near Lake Butkovo they are declared by Rome to have driven Bulgarian detachments beyond the Demir Hissar-Doiran road. A Bulgarian official report, however, says the Italians were dispersed in this region with a loss of thirty

The British, who are across the Struma river, south of Lake Takinos, have made no further efforts to advance and in that region there have been no new developments.

Amsterdam, via London, Sept. 14.—
The German newspapers attach profound importance to the conference to now taking place at German eastern headquarters. 








Figure 1. Specifications and blank form of Contract may be seen on and after Monday, August 28th, at the Office of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Raliways & Canals, Ottawa; at the Office of the Chief Engineer, Moncton, N. B.; at the Office of the Chief Engineer, Moncton, N. B.; at the Office of the Chief Engineer, Moncton, N. B.; at the Office of the Terminal Agent, St. John, N. B., and at the Office of the John S. Metcalfe Company, Limited, Engineers, Montreal, P. Q.
