FREDERICTON.

Fredricton, July 14—(Special)—A meeting of the parishioners of the Episcopal church, St. Marks, was held last night in the Church Hall in Gibson. The meeting was quite largely attended, and was very representative. E. Flewelling of Gibson, president, it was announced, had endeavored to extend a call Rev. J. deWolfe Cowie, now stationed at Sussex. Rev. Mr. Cowie is also recommended by Bishop Kingdon, and it is thought probable that he will accept.

There is a great scarcity of logs, and as a result operations at the Mitchell Boom will be suspended tonight. This is an unprecedented record, it being usually September before rafting operations at the boom are completed. There are cut logs at the Douglas boom to keep them going a couple of weeks longer. FUNERAL OF LATE REV. JOHN READ, IMPRESSIVE SERVICES AND MANY MOURNERS AT ST. STEPHEN TUESDAY. MANY MINISTERS PRESENT. Rev. G. M. Campbell of St. John and Rev. G. W. Fisher Move Many Tears by Their Eloquent Tributes to the Deceased Clergyman.

St. Stephen, July 14—(Special)—The funeral services of the late Rev. John Read were held this afternoon in the Methodist church, which was well filled by sincere mourners. The body of the deceased lay in state inside the church rail which, as well as the gallery, was heavily draped and handsome floral offerings surrounded the casket. The chair of the deceased pastor behind the pulpit remained vacant and heavily draped.

Sydney, N. S., July 15—(Special)—H. M. AN ALL-CANADIAN CABLE SERVICE. Liberal Caucus Agree to Aid Newspapers to Extent of \$15,000.

Ottawa, July 7—(Special)—There was a largely attended caucus of the Liberal party today when Archie Campbell presided. It was generally understood that the Grand Trunk Pacific project would come up for consideration, but as the premier had an engagement and was not able to await to have it discussed it was left over until Thursday next.

The proposition to grant \$500,000 to the shareholders of the Chignecto ship railway was discussed and there was a very strong opinion against it. The matter was not finally disposed of.

The discussion was favorable to the granting of some assistance to the iron and steel industry and aid will be given on the lines already stated in this respect, namely, by means of bonuses.
