An appropriate religious service was held on Friday afternoon, in memory of these departed brethren, conducted by the President of the Conference. The following obituaries were read:

W. D. HUGHSON.

Wentworth D. Hughson was born in 1818 in New Brunswick. At twelve years of age he removed with his father to Upper Canada and settled in the Gore district near Hamilton. In 1836, through the instrumentality of the Rev. Francis Bird of precious memory he was converted to God, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. Soon after his conversion he felt a call to the ministry, and in preparation for it immediately began a special course of study and to undertake religious work, doing all in his power to promote the cause of God. In 1840, he responded to the call of the Church, and was appointed to a circuit under the presiding eldership of the Rev. John Bailey. The following year he was received on trial and stationed on the Howard Circuit, which at that time embraced the greater part of eleven townships. During his early career as a minister he was a veritable "Son of Thunder," whom few would have recognized in the temperate methodical presiding elder of later years. Gracious results followed his preaching from the very beginning. All over the wide domain of his first circuit there were notable revivals. Especially was this the case at Gillespie's, now Tupperville, and at Sherman's Settlement, now Thamesville, memorable from a visit thirty-six years before from the venerable Nathan Bangs. His name is still fragrant in the memory of the children of those early settlers. In 1843, he was admitted by the Conference into full connexion and ordained deacon by Bishop Reynolds. In October of the same year, he was married to Miss Eliza Dobbyn, daughter of an honored pioneer of Euphemia, who, with four of their six sons, survives to mourn his loss. Two years later he was ordained elder by the same bishop, and soon was recognized among his brethren as one of their ablest preachers and most judicious administrators. Cheerfully enduring the many hardships of those early days, willingly going wherever appointed, he was gladly welcomed by every circuit to which he was sent. From Howard he went successively to Malahide, London, Malahide and Southwold, Dumfries, Barton, Yonge Street and Newmarket. In 1851, he was appointed presiding elder of the London District then embracing nearly all the territory included in the present London Conference. Subsequently he was stationed at Vienna, Malahide for the third time, and Florence, and in 1860 he was again presiding elder of London District. At the close of his term in 1864 he rested a year, and then Newbury, Howard, Westminster, Oxford and Dorchester shared in the benefit of his labors, and on all were left fruits of his ministry and witnesses that he walked with God. He was held in esteem and honor by his brethren and was elected to every General Conference of the late Methodist Episcopal Church from the time he became eligible to the last one in 1883. He was not favorable to the union of the various Methodist bodies which was consummated in that year, and when it was accomplished he quietly stepped

aside from the active ranks, and worn with forty years of arduous toil settled down on his farm in Delaware for a well-earned rest. He began to fail in the autumn of last year and continued slowly sinking until March, when it became evident to his family that the end was near. A holy calm rested upon his last days. Repeated assurances were given that he was resting upon Jesus and that all was well. On April 21, 1894, he peacefully drifted beyond the shadows of earth into the cloudless realms of day. His funeral services were attended by immense throngs, no less than sixteen of his ministerial brethren being present. Services at the flouse were conducted by Revs. Dr. Aylesworth and J. H. Andrews, and in the church addresses were given by Revs. Dr. Aylesworth, T. T. George and R. Thompson, and all that was mortal of W. D. Hughson was laid in the quiet grave to await the morning of the resurrection.

#### WILLIAM WATSON EDWARDS.

William Watson Edwards, son of William Edwards (Secretary Ontario Department of Public Works) and Elizabeth Watson, his wife, was born in the city of Toronto, on December 30th, 1844, and baptized by Rev. Mr. Sully, in the old George Street Methodist Church (of which his parents were then members), on March 13th, 1845. His father's first prayer after his birth was that he might grow up and be fitted for, and be accepted by God to preach the Gospel of a risen Saviour to his fellownen. That prayer was answered. His mother died just as he entered his fourth year, but ere he had entered upon his eighth year he came under the loving care and watchfulness of a pious and faithful stepmother; in the interval he had been lovingly cared for by his pious paternal grand-mother and aunts.

Early in life he was converted, and about the time he reached his twentieth year was accepted as a local preacher on the Toronto West Circuit. With a view to entering the ministry he continued to attend the Toronto High School, of which Rev. Dr. Wickson was rector. After the Conference of 1866, Rev. Dr. Jeffers (then co-delegate) sent him to labor on the Harrowsmith Circuit, where he remained until the next Conference, when he was accepted as a probationer, and was appointed to the Bath Circuit, under the superintendency of Rev. Dr. Barrass, but ere the close of that year he was removed to the Erin Circuit, to fill a vacancy caused by the illness of a probationer of the same name.

Three years he served on circuits and two at Victoria College, when, with several other young men, he was ordained by Rev. Dr. W. M. Punshon, in the Montreal St. James' Street Methodist Church. Before entering upon his first appointment as superintendent of the Wallaceburg Circuit, he was united in marriage to Elizabeth Bellamy, daughter of Bro. Samuel Bellamy, of Garafraxa. Here, on his first circuit, he succeeded in having erected a new brick church.

As a scholar in the Richmond Street Church Sunday School, under Bro. W. H. Pearson's superintendency, and with this zealous brother as leader of his church class, he grew in Christian faith and work, and when about fourteen years of age he and a younger brother, his cousins, Rev. James and Richard Woodsworth, Rev. Marmaduke Pearson and a few other lads of like age, established, and for a considerable time, conducted arch, cottage week-night prayer-meetings in St. John's Ward.

As a local preacher he was faithful to his appointments. One Monday

As a local preacher he was faithful to his appointments. One Monday a brother from an outlying circuit met his father on Yonge Street, and taking his hand, said, "Tell your son that we quite excuse him for not being with us yesterday, it was so wet that we could not expect him." The reply he received was, "I don't know whether his appointment was with you or not, but he walked ten miles in the rain yesterday to preach somewhere, and walked home again the same day, as wet as it was." The good man was shocked, and at once admitted that on account of the rain he had not gone to church, and took for granted the preacher had

He died of diabetes in the city of Toronto, on June 8, 1893, where he had gone to spend a few weeks for rest and medical treatment in the parental home. To the question put to him by his father shortly before he died, as to whether he had been able to keep up full communion with his Saviour through his illness, his face brightened up, and he said, "Oh yes, father, I have had a gloriously happy time !!" The nature of his disease induced a great deal of sleep, so that only at intervals could his friends converse with him. He quietly passed away without full consciousness, but into the arms of his loving Saviour. The funeral services were held at his father's residence. Rev. J. F. Ockley, of Trinity Church, announced Charles Wesley's inspiring hymn, "Jesus, lover of my soul," and read Paul's triumphant statement to the Corinthians regarding the resurrection, after which Rev. Dr. Barrass, in an address, said: "I was glad to receive Bro. Edwards as my colleague upon Bath Circuit in 1857, where he remained only five months, having to remove to the Erin Circuit, where a vacancy had occurred. Previously he had travelled a year under the Chairman of the District; yet, though limited in experience, I found him very familiar with Methodist usages. . . . He had been trained in a Methodist home. Our deceased brother was well received, and devoted himself very diligently to all the duties of a Methodist minister. . . . While he always maintained a sturdy independence of thought, he never diverged from the doctrines of Methodism. I greatly loved him. . . . I am glad to know that he has been useful in his labors," etc.

Rev. Dr. Parker, President of Toronto Conference, said: "Circumstances have brought me at different times into special relationship with the Edwards family. During my first appointment to this city I formed the acquaintance of a junior member of the family (uncle of the deceased), an amiable, intelligent, moral man, whom I saw, during his final illness, transformed into a trustful, triumphant Christian. I have just had in Barrie other members of the family, most highly esteemed. Through the principal part of my stay in the London Conference I was favored with the friendship of Rev. W. W. Edwards, whose early demise we to-day mourn. I knew him as a true man of God, and a faithful messenger of the Word of life. To his sorrowing parents, widow, children and other kindred, I would say, while you cannot but deplore your loss, you are to be congratulated upon having such a precious loan to surrender at the call of God."

His remains were borne to the Necropolis, and carried to the grave by

his brothers. A memorial service was held afterwards in the new church, Glencoe, the scene of his last labors, and a sermon preached by Rev. H. McLean to a large and sympathizing congregation on the text, Rev. 20, 13. As a Christian he was a serious, conscientious, spiritual, devout man of prayer. As a Methodist he was thoroughly familiar with every department of our economy, and kept our rules by precept and example. As a preacher, he had a clear, strong grasp of the truths revealed in the Book. As a pastor

and preacher in charge of a Circuit he had no superiors and few equals.

The writer is familiar with his work and his church-building on Dorchester Station, and also at Charing Cross, where he succeeded in the erection of as fine a country church as we have in our Connexion, which is now the centre of the Harwich Circuit; and at Glencoe, where, by the hardest kind of persevering effort on his part, he lived to see the dedication of a church that is a credit to any town. There his health began to fail, and now while he rests from his labors his works do follow him. He was a very valuable Conference man, keen in debate, useful in committee work, and was more than once Secretary of the Conference. He was an extensive reader and fully abreast with the times on all the living issues of the day. He was a trusted friend, and fondly loved by all his intimate friends and

near relatives. They mourn his loss, but "his rest is glorious."

The following are the circuits and stations he occupied: Harrowsmith, Bath, Erin, Listowel, Wallaceburg, Arkona, Thamesville, Wyoming, Harrow, Dorchester Station, Charing Cross and Glencoe. In 1870 and 1871 he attended Victoria College.

## Libert address, said: "I was glad to receive lite.

The subject of this obituary, was born in Cornwall, England, in the year 1841. He was early converted to God, and soon after became a valued local preacher. In the year 1863, he was united in marriage to Louisa Knott, by whom he had four children, two sons and two daughters. Scarcely eight years had passed when his wife died, and left him with the care of a family of small children. After a short time he came to this continent, and after spending a few menths in the State of New York, made his way to Canada, and in 1873, offered himself for the ministry of the Bible Christian Church, with which body he had been connected in the motherland. He was at once accepted, and was stationed on the Cartweight Circuit. At the end of two years he was stationed at Clinton, where four of the most successful years of his life were spent.

From there he went to Chagrin Falls, Ohio, where the Bible Christian Church had a district, of which he was made chairman, which position he occupied with ability till the time of the union in Canada. Preterring the work in this country he came back to the London Conference, and was stationed successively on London (Horton Street), Louisville, Marthaville and Kerwood circuits.

For nineteen years he remained a widower, till all his children were grown and well settled in life; then in the year 1800, he married Miss Mattie Parker, of Chagrin Falls, who became a helpmeet indeed in his work. While at Chagrin Falls he contracted asthma, from which he suffered considerably at times. In consequence of failing health he asked,

### II. SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Board of the Superannuation Fund for the Year ending July 31st, 1893.

The Board is gratified in being able to report that all claims have been paid in full, leaving a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of \$1,719.47.

The balance due Permanent Fund, as per last Annual Statement (principal and interest), amounting to \$1,851.27 and \$500 on commutation, has also been paid.

The receipts are in excess of the previous year: From Circuits, \$2,092.56; from Ministerial Subscriptions, \$480; from Interest on Investments, \$617.51, and from Book Room, \$500, making a total increase for the year of \$3,689.27.

The capital account has been increased by \$2,373 from Ministerial subscriptions, and \$340 from legacies.

On account of the exceptionally large number of ministers who have been superannuated this year, the claims on the Fund for the next year will be increased by about \$3.000.

### CONSTITUTION OF SUSTENTATION FUND.

### I. NAME.

The name of this Fund shall be "The Sustentation Fund of the London Conference of the Methodist Church."

### II. OBJECT

The object of this Fund shall be to secure salaries of not less than \$750 for ordained married ministers; \$400 for ordained unmarried ministers, and \$350 for probationers.

### III. INCOME.

The Fund shall be maintained by annual collections and subscriptions to be taken up in the month of March, in all our congregations on every Circuit and Mission throughout the Conference; also by bequests and donations for this purpose.

### IV. CLAIMANTS.

All ministers on circuits, whose salaries are lower than the following amounts, shall have their claims upon the Fund considered, viz.: Married ministers, \$650, including salary, board and fuel; single ordained ministers, \$250, and probationers, \$200—these amounts to include salary only.

### V. MANAGEMENT.

1. The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each district, appointed by the Annual District Meeting, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Conference on the nomination of the Committee, who shall distribute to the several claimants the funds in hand during the sessions of the Conference.

2. No claim shall be considered by the Committee that has not been recommended by the May District Meeting immediately preceding such distribution, and all Quarterly Boards presenting claims shall declare their utter inability to meet their net deficiencies.

3. The Committee may estimate the prospective aggregate deficiencies on circuits and missions, and suggest the amount desired from each District to meet such deficiencies.

4. The Financial District Meeting shall each year inquire into the financial condition of each Circuit reported as having paid less than \$650 the previous year, and if deemed necessary a special deputation shall be appointed to visit their Quarterly Board, so as, if possible, to develop a more liberal support to their minister.

5. The Financial District Meeting shall, where necessary, appoint deputations to visit the various circuits in the interests of the Fund; and each minister shall bring the matter fairly before his people, and earnestly endeavor to secure for it their liberal support.

 No minister or probationer, who has not taken up collections and solicited subscriptions on behalf of the Fund shall be entitled to any claim upon it.

7. The Committee shall present a report to the Conference annually, including an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions deemed necessary in the interests of the Fund.

### II. WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church.

### DEAR BRETHREN:

The Executive Officers of the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, affiliated to the McGill University, respectfully submit to you the following brief report of the work and general interests of the institution:

The past year has been painfully eventful in the death of the late honored Principal, the Rev. George Douglas, D.D., LL.D., whose name will be perennial in the history of the institution. By the unanimous action of the Board of Governors, the Rev. Prof. Shaw, D.D., LL.D., has been called to the vacancy so created, and Rev. J. Cooper Antliff, M.A., (Edin.) D.D., has been added to the staff. The Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., has been granted leave of absence to pursue in Germany a Post-graduate Course in Semitic Literature, and his place has been filled by the Rev. Prof. Richardson, B.A., B.D., Acting Registrar.

The institution enters upon its new phase of history with the firm determination of its authorities not only to maintain its efficiency, but also to enlarge its work for the Church, and to increase its financial strength.

The number of students registered the past year was seventy-two, including seventeen non-resident. All students in residence attend the McGill University either as undergraduates or partial students. Men whose age and circumstances prove the wisdom of such a course are induced to take the full Arts Curriculum, which requires a residence of four years. At the same time at least equal practical benefit is obtained from the Licentiates' Course, which requires three years of attendance at lectures, and which includes the most valuable part of the University Curriculum, besides a heavy course in Divinity. It has been generally recognized that the College, in carrying so large a number of men beyond the necessarily limited, if not meagre, "Course of study for Probationers," is doing a most valuable educational service for the Ministry of the Methodist Church. After the system of Yale and Drew, and several other leading colleges in America, licentiates completing their course are admitted to the further and higher three years' course for the Degree of B.D.

Financially the condition of the institution is steadily improving. Although a small draft of \$1,600 has been made on the capital, which is sure to be soon replaced, the College may be said to be really out of debt. The Endowment Fund, largely through the successful efforts of the Rev. W. Harris, has been raised to over \$70,000. The income on current accounts the past year was \$6,448.58, and expenditure \$6,487.33. The income and outlay of the Boarding Department are about \$4,000.

There is great need of increased accommodation in both class-rooms, dormitories and Convocation Hall, and the hope is entertained that this want may be supplied without such a delay as may permanently weaken the institution, and that the valuable land held vacant may soon thus be

occupied. The real estate of the College is valued at \$70,000, and is out of debt.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—We are able, through the blessing of a kind Providence, to report a year of considerable prosperity in connection with Albert College.

The year has been one of considerable anxiety owing to changes consequent upon Federation, the pulling up of old stakes and the putting down of new. The affiliated relation of Albert to Victoria during the independent existence of the latter, was alike beneficial to Albert and Victoria.

Over 200 students have been enrolled during the year. Thirty-three candidates for the ministry wrote at the examination held at the College in April last.

There can be no question that Albert, with its well-known thoroughness in the English branches and its special classes in the theological subjects of the Conference preliminary course, offers just the advantages which the young men require.

The College prepares annually candidates for the different grades of teachers' certificates. It has a well-equipped laboratory and museum, and is in every way able to compete successfully in this class of work with the best equipped collegiate institutes.

The departments of Commercial Science, Music, Fine Art and Elocution are thoroughly equipped, and have been well maintained during the year.

The Commercial department offers the very best advantages in Book-keeping, Shorthand, Typewriting, Practical English, etc., and is a

The department of Music has made very great advance during the year under the able management of Prof. Dingle, who is also organist of Bridge Street Methodist Church. The attendance has largely increased, rendering necessary the appointment of assistants for junior work.

The department of Fine Art has been in charge of Miss Emma Clarke during the past seven years, and the number of certificates and medals secured by her pupils has given the most gratifying proof of proficiency.

Prof. Shepard has had charge of the department of Elocution since its organization in 1885, and his pupils at Victoria and elsewhere have, from year to year, captured prizes in Elocution.

The Missionary Societies and the young people's Christian associations of the College have been active in their operations and greatly blessed of God during the year. The young ladies' Missionary Society is maintain-

ing a girl in the Chinese home at Victoria, B.C.

The young men have on hand \$1,200, which has been gathered by their efforts during the last few years, and they expect to bid farewell in the near future to Mr. Livingstone, who, as a graduate in Arts and Medicine, goes as their representative to the missionary work in "the dark continent." They feel that Mr. Livingstone, both physically, mentally and spiritually, is pre-eminently fitted for that work, and they are praying that God may so prosper and bless him as to render it desirable and expedient for the Methodist Church to claim him as their missionary. The young men have recently chosen Mr. Wrinch, now a student at Albert College and preparing for missionary work, as their second representative, and are busily engaged raising money for that purpose.

### IV. ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

To the Members of the London Conference of the Methodist Church.

Dear Fathers and Brethers,—In sending you our annual report of school work, we acknowledge with gratitude that benign Providence which has watched over the lives and preserved the health of students and teachers through the year. The attendance, notwithstanding the stringency of the times, and the financial panic in the United States, has reached 150. Of these, 80 were Methodists; 30, Episcopalians; 24, Presbyterians; 14, Baptists; 1, Friend; and 1, Roman Catholic.

In departments the enrolment was as follows: Preparatory, 18;

1894]

Academic, 22; Collegiate, 43; Fine Art, 31; Elocution, 38; Commercial, 12; Music, 105.

The policy of the Board of Management has been to offer to all young women seeking the higher or secondary education the best advantages of thorough culture at a moderate cost, with home-like surroundings and safeguards, and under distinctive Christian influence and teaching. In carrying out their policy the Board of Management has asked the Church to provide buildings and furnishings only—the school being self-supporting, and receiving no aid from any church fund. That this policy has met a public demand is evinced by the large patronage bestowed upon the College from all denominations, from all parts of the Dominion and the neighboring Republic—the slight decrease in the enrolment this year being chiefly in the list of students from the United States, and accounted for by the financial depression.

The graduating class will number 16: Literary, 2; Fine Art, 3; Music, 6; Elocution, 4; Commercial Science, 1. A class has also been prepared for the examinations for public school teachers' certificates

and will write in a few weeks.

You will be pleased to learn that Alma won three awards in Fine Art at the World's Fair, ope in each subject in which she exhibited, viz., Oil Painting, Water Color Painting and China Painting.

The returns are in from the Provincial Art Examinations, and Alma maintains the high standard of past years in the number of certificates and honors won.

The agency, under the vigorous efforts of the Rev. J. P. Rice, has resulted in an increase of subscriptions to the Relief Fund of \$7,500, between the first of July, 1893, and the first of May, 1894. It is hoped that at least \$9,000 in cash or pledges will be added to the Fund this year.

With pleasure we report that the religious services, such as prayer and class meetings, Bible classes, missionary meetings, etc., have been well attended, and that the Missionary Society and Young Woman's Christian Association have been doing good and effective work. Two more of our students have this year entered the foreign missionary field—one in Japan and one in Africa in connection with Bishop Taylor's work—making six in all who are now engaged in the mission field.

We extend our hearty thanks to the Conference for its interest and cooperation in past years, and for the excellent appointments it has made from year to year of associate members of our Board of Management, and would ask for the usual appointments for the ensuing Conference year.

### V. THE WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

We can assure you, dear brethren, that we are with you heartily in your subline work; we are trying to aid you, and should you direct some of your young friends to these halls, we pledge you to do our utmost to return them to the home, to the Church and to society richer, both in head and heart, than when they came.

### VI. ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

To the London Methodist Conference.

It is with feelings of profound gratitude that we, the directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, at Whitby, present to this Conference our twelfth annual report.

Apart from the large attendance of boarders, the advanced educational work accomplished, and the remarkably good health record, we are pleased to be able to say that the moral and religious atmosphere of the College has been exceedingly gratifying, and it is believed it has been conducive, in many cases, to the formation of sound Christian character.

For many years we have had a laudable ambition to place our College in the foremost position amongst the ladies' colleges of Canada; and we have kept this object steadily in view in the discharge of all our official duties.

We consider ourselves singularly fortunate in having secured such beautiful buildings and grounds, in such a delightful location in close proximity to the city of Toronto. This favorable location has already given us a decided advantage over other competing colleges, and will in future contribute still more largely to the growth and efficiency of our College.

Besides the manifest advantage of securing from the city the best professional talent in music and fine art, and enabling our pupils to hear the great artists that visit Toronto, we have also the privilege of obtaining courses of University lectures from the Professors of Victoria and Toronto Universities, besides participating in entertainments of a social character calculated to train and strengthen our pupils. During the past year a course of six university lectures has been given, besides the popular lectures on Natural Science delivered by the Rev. Dr. Hare, Principal. We expect to double the number next year. Our pupils had the honor of furnishing the musical and elocutionary programme for the students of Victoria University at their annual conversazione in Toronto last December, and subsequently entertaining the Victoria students to a reception in our College.

Whilst not approving of co-education, especially for young students, with its accompanying difficulties and temptations, we do not hesitate to say that we are pleased to be within speaking distance of Victoria, and that an occasional entertainment given by the students of both colleges under the safeguards of culture and religion must be interesting and helpful to all concerned.

Ås to our literary advantages, we are preparing pupils this year for the second year of Toronto University, first year Queen's University, the Junior and Senior Matriculation Toronto University, third, second and first-class teachers' certificates. We question if any other ladies' college in Canada is doing similar work. Last year two of our students graduated in Toronto University, who had taken the first two years of their university course in our College. One of these won the valedictory in Victoria University.

Our Musical Department is on a thorough conservatory basis. It will be strengthened next year by the addition of a Bachelor of Music, who

### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES AS AMENDED AND ACCEPTED BY CONFERENCE.

### I. BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

The annual meeting of the Board of Examiners of London Conference was held in Front Street Church, Strathroy, on April 17th, 18th and 19th,

All the members of the Board were present. Nine candidates presented themselves for the Preliminary Examinations, eight being in the ordinary course and one in the course for graduates in Arts. One failed to secure the necessary percentage. Four secured Third Class Certificates, three Second Class and one a First Class Certificate.

Five probationers and one candidate wrote on subjects in the First Year's Course, but in no case completed the year's work. Six probationers wrote on subjects in the Second Year's Course, one student only taking the entire course and being granted a Third Class Certificate. Two probationers wrote on a few subjects of the Third Year's Course, and one student passed on one subject of the Fourth Year's Work.

A public meeting was held on the evening of the third day, at which the President of the Conference presided. Addresses were given by Rev. W. J. Ford, LL.B., and Rev. J. R. Gundy, and certificates of standing were given to the students.

### IV. SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee, while gratified to note a steady increase in the interest our people are taking in the Sunday School work, would express the conviction that its vast possibilities for the Kingdom of Christ have not yet been approximately reached, and would urge still greater fidelity in this direction.

Assured that a general attendance of the adult members of our societies and congregations at the Sunday School for instruction, would be of great value to the Church, and believing that in this way only can we retain the young people in the Sunday School, we would recommend that vigorous and persistent effort be made all along the line to secure such attendance.

In this connection we would call attention to the fact that with an increase of 741 in the total number of scholars, we have a decrease of 54 in the number of adult scholars.

It is a matter of rejoicing that 1,600 of the scholars are reported as converted during the year, an increase of 380 on the previous year, indicating that much excellent work is done in our schools.

We find that 7,630, or nearly one-quarter, of the scholars are reported as-

members of the Church, an increase of 1,203 upon last year.

Seven thousand six hundred and ninety-five of the scholars are reported as having taken the total abstinence pledge, an increase of 830. This does not represent the aggregate number of scholars that are under total abstinence pledge, as some of the brethren understood that only those be reported who had taken the pledge during the year.

We think it worthy of note that in the face of a decrease of \$685,24 in the total missionary contributions for the Conference, there is an increase of \$135.91 in the amount raised by the Sabbath Schools for missions, indi-

cating the value of this arm of service to the missionary cause. The total number of other publications than those of our own Book Room used in our schools last year was 3,919, a decrease of 557. At this rate of decrease the foreign publications will soon be displaced by our own, and with a view to this, and also in order to insure a largely increased

circulation, we would recommend that our Sunday School papers be furnished to our schools at the actual cost of publication.

We would heartily commend Onward as a paper of many excellent qualities, supplying a felt want in the Church, and urge its more general

introduction into our schools and young people's societies. We rejoice to find that our Sunday School periodicals have reached a circulation in the Connexion of over a quarter of a million, showing an increase for the year of 5,425. Of this increase the London Conference has reported 724.

2. In regard to the communication of the Committee for the organization of a Dominion Convention, we recommend the approval of this Conference, and the appointment of Rev. John Holmes and Mr. C. E. German as members of the Joint Committee for that purpose.

3. We would advise the adoption of the name "Epworth League" as the title for our young people's societies; but also recommend that the present option given to Local Leagues to assume the name "Epworth League of Christian Endeavor" be continued.

4. We believe it to be in the interests of our Epworth Leagues that a paper should be published, devoted solely to their cause, and that it should be issued at a price that would encourage wide circulation.

5. We advise that the attention of our Leagues should be directed to the advantages of purchasing literature and supplies at our own Publishing House.

6. We would request Conference to authorize Chairmen of Districts to appoint committees to perfect district organization.

7. We have noted with satisfaction the increase, reported by our statistics, of twenty-four Leagues and 1,802 of membership, and trust that every possible encouragement will be given to the organization of Epworth Leagues on all our circuits.

8. Having considered the communication of Rev. T. A. Moore, Super-intendent of Junior Work for the Methodist Young People's Association of Ontario, and whereas, we have been informed there are but few such societies in this Conference, we desire again to emphasize the importance of Junior Work, and recommend that all members of this Conference use strenuous efforts to organize Junior Leagues in connection with all our congregations and Sunday Schools.

### VI. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee beg leave to report:

 The increase in our membership is 1,518. We recognize the agency of revivalistic services, of godly evangelists, of faithful pastors and a consecrated membership, and are grateful to God for such evidences of a spiritual awakening among our people.

 There is also a gratifying increase in the returns for ministerial support and circuit purposes. We desire to express our appreciation of the loyalty of the Church to her home interests in a year of financial depression.

3. We notice with some regret the decrease in missionary givings of \$685, and in Educational Fund receipts of \$130, and believe that sufficient information and pleading is not given in all places on these important questions.

4. The column reporting Catechumen Classes leads us to believe there is a deepening interest in the spiritual welfare of the young, and suggests

to us the thought the children should be accorded all the rights and care of members of the Church.

5. We would suggest:

(1) That special attention be given by our ministers in all our congregations to the enforcement of Discipline in regard to the social evils of

card-playing, dancing, theatre-going and horse-racing.

(2) And that, in view of the dissemination of false doctrine, we believe that the ministers ought to be exceedingly careful to examine the literature introduced into Sabbath Schools and Epworth Leagues, and also that evangelists, who are not ministers of the Church, desiring employment within the bounds of our own Conference, should be examined as to their doctrine before a small committee appointed by this Conference, and receive from it a certificate to that effect.

### VII. SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

The Sabbath is a sacred heritage handed down to us by the Church of God, resting for its foundation upon the Divine ordinance, and justifying its existence by its further appeal to human necessity. To the individual and the nation alike it is of priceless value, and its sanctity should be jealously guarded. To this end we welcome the efforts of such men as Mr. John Charlton and others, who, in our legislative halls, are doing noble work along this line.

Your Committee is aware that, while our Canadian Sabbath is comparatively well observed, yet there exists a strong tendency towards its secularization. By many it is looked upon as merely a day for physical recreation, and oftentimes this spirit asserts itself, sometimes boldly, but oftener cloaked in the specious garb of religious interest. We desire to utter our emphatic protest against any Sunday parade that necessitates the use of Sunday trains, boats or livery conveyances. We also strongly disapprove of such parades being allowed to interfere with Sabbath School work.

Sunday funerals ought also to be discouraged whenever other arrangement is possible, and our people should be made to see more clearly the

evil of disarranging the regular Sabbath services.

We recommend also that each minister make it his business to find out the forms of Sabbath-breaking common to his neighborhood, and fearlessly

and frequently to combat them.

Finally, we recommend that special attention be given to the home influence. In the home lie the forces that, for weal or woe, will mould our country's destinies and insure the growth, or make certain the retardation, of the work of God among us. Let us see to it that in our homes the sanctity of the Sabbath is well observed, as we may rest assured if the Sabbath be held sacred in the home it will be safe upon the street, and if the children of to-day are loyal to it, the men of the future will not be otherwise.

#### VIII. MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

#### IX. COMMITTEE ON INWOOD CHURCH.

In pursuance of instructions given by the Conference of 1893, your Committee visited Inwood on March 13th, 1894, and made full inquiry into the financial condition of the Church. The building originally cost \$1,200, and is now in a good state of repair. When opened there was a debt of \$1,000. By aid of the Conference this was reduced in 1890 to \$572.68, but was allowed by accumulation of interest to increase in February, 1894, to \$722.60. At this writing (May 1st), but since our visit, this has been reduced by \$75, leaving the present indebtedness, \$647.60. The annual expense of caretaking is \$35; the annual income from weekly collections, \$18; the annual interest on \$647.60, \$45.33; the annual rental supposed to be \$50, leaving a balance to apply on interest or caretaking, \$4.67. There is due on rent (at the rate of \$50 per annum) on June 1, 1894, \$100. There has been paid the caretaker for his services and for light and fuel from the rent the sum of \$40. This amount is not now available to be applied on interest or principal.

Expecting the rent will be paid by June 1st, and hoping the Superintendent may be able to collect enough to reduce the debt with this rental to, say, \$500, there is then an annual expense of interest of \$35, and for caretaking of \$35, being a total of \$70. If the money now in the Conference's possession could be applied to further reduce the debt, we think the congregation could manage it, and by yearly paying something on principal, in addition to invariably paying interest, could ultimately extinguish it.

The usual congregation ranges from thirty to fifty persons, and there is a membership of only fifteen. All the facts convince us that the conditions imposed by the Conference of 1893, by which the \$150 now in the Conference Treasurer's hands may be available for reduction of debt, cannot be met by the congregation. We therefore ask whether they should be enforced.

In view of the positive decisions of last Conference, your Committee hesitate to recommend contrary to them, but they suggest the relaxing of these conditions so as to make available the \$150 now in hand, by the Conference for reduction of debt, on the Superintendent of the Mis-

## X. REPORT OF COMMITTEE RE THE DEFICIENCIES RE-PORTED BY THE CONFERENCE TREASURER OF THE SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Your Committee beg leave to present the following report:

Whereas, no one has appeared before your Committee to show cause for the West Lorne deficiency, we refer the same back to the Circuit for early payment

The Alvinston minister having already paid the deficiency for his circuit, we would express the hope that the Circuit will see that the amount be

duly paid to their pastor.

A part of the Amherstburg Circuit has failed to raise its share of the Superannuation Fund. We refer the case, through the Superintendent, to the Circuit, with respectful request that the amount be met as soon as possible.

The Rutherford and Moraviantown deficiencies being very small, we

hope that they be paid at once.

We exceedingly regret the failure on the part of the Wyoming Circuit to meet the part allotted to them, and we respectfully suggest the importance of an earnest effort on the part of the Circuit, in co-operation with their Minister, to raise the amount of their deficiency.

Whereas, the pastor of the Corunna Circuit has forwarded a portion of their deficiency, we would kindly urge upon the Circuit the wisdom and fairness of a determined effort to place in the hands of their Pastor the

entire amount of their allotment, without further delay.

#### XI. TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

The past year has been one of great and successful agitation in our Province on the subject of Temperance. The Plebiscite has brought to light the important fact that a majority of over 81,000 voters of this, the largest and most wealthy, Province of our Dominion is in favor of the destruction of the liquor traffic.

This vote speaks in the most unmistakable language the desire and determination of our people to secure, as speedily as possible, entire prohibition. No political party can ignore the significance of the declaration, and we note with satisfaction that both parties are becoming greatly interested in and favorably disposed toward the movement. Indications of growing temperance sentiment are noticeable in many directions. The

The canteen system has been abolished by the Department of Militia, so our volunteers will be less subject to temptation when attending their annual drill. In our Public Schools there is increased attention being paid to the subject, and we trust the time is not far distant when all our children will be thoroughly instructed in the injurious effects of intoxicating liquors on the physical, mental, and moral system.

The number of licenses issued each year is decreasing, and, as a natural result, drunkenness is growing less. Three other provinces have given large majorities in favor of prohibition, so there is a very favorable outlook

for the cause in our Dominion.

But there must be no relaxation of effort—hard work and vigilance are as necessary as ever, for the foe aroused by opposition and inspired by greed and base appetite, is working with tireless energy to defeat the purposes of moral reform. We cannot condemn in words too forcible the absurdity of the so-called Royal Commission. The delay in beginning its work, the time consumed in the discharge of its duties, the partiality shown in the witnesses examined, and the present seeming determination not to report to the House, point it out as the most expensive delusion our country ever endured. The bar still flourishing in the House of Commons, corrupting as it must the legislators, and intrenching still more strongly the liquor traffic, should be at once and forever abolished. We take the liberty to make a few practical suggestions.

(1) Let our Sabbath School teachers be more diligent in getting the

children in their classes to sign the total abstinence pledge.

(2) In our young people's societies the Temperance Committee should be a real active force, adopting such means as will tend to increase the

enthusiasm of our young people in the work. (3) In the present political campaign we should urge our people to attend the nominations, and exact a pledge from the candidates to sustain prohibitory measures independent of party considerations, and also declare it a duty of the Christian electorate to support only such candidates as will thus pledge themselves.

(4) This Conference expresses its satisfaction with the pronounced attitude of the Premier of this province on this question in response to the very large deputation which waited on him immediately after the

plebiscite vote.

(5) We most heartily commend the conduct of Mayor Kennedy for the manly and Christian stand he took in refusing to officially receive and welcome the liquor dealers, who met in Toronto last winter to devise

means to defeat the strongly expressed wish of the people.

(6) At the request of the Dominion Alliance we recommend the appointment of five delegates to the great convention to be held in Montreal in July, and would nominate the following brethren as delegates, viz.: Rev. G. W. Henderson, Rev. T. R. McNair, Rev. J. C. Antliff, D.D., and Messrs. W. Bowman and E. E. Parrott.

(7) The Temperance Committee has noticed for several years that the Conference temperance meeting has been held at a time when the laymen could not attend. We, therefore, direct the attention of the Conference Programme Committee of next year to arrange the date of this meeting so that the laymen can be present.

# XII. COMMITTEE ON GENERAL CONFERENCE LEGISLATION.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:

1. Concerning the resolution presented by Dr. Maxwell, proposing an examination, by written paper, of probationers, immediately before reception into full connection, to test the soundness of their theological views, we recommend it to the General Conference for favorable consideration.

2. Re the resolution introduced by Rev. J. W. Annis, M.A., proposing certain changes in the constitution of the Educational Society, your Committee recommend that such regulations should be adopted as would ensure that probationers from different Conferences should be aided according to a uniform scale.

3. Resolution of Dundas Centre Quarterly Board, London, recommending the appointment of a Committee on Temperance at the financial district meetings: we advise that this be sent forward to the General Conference without expression of opinion.

4. Resolution submitted by Dr. Maxwell at Windsor District Meeting, memorializing the General Conference for many changes on questions relating to conditions of Church membership: we recommend that this memorial be passed on to General Conference without expression of opinion.

5. Concerning resolution by Rev. J. Morrison through Strathroy District Meeting, we refer it to the Annual Conference for adjudication.

6. Memorial from Colborne Street Church, London, expressing disapproval of exemption from taxation now allowed to churches: we are of the opinion that no recommendation is necessary.

7. Re memorial from Windsor District Meeting and Aylmer Official Board asking for annual card to be substituted for present quarterly ticket, the Committee does not consider such change expedient.

8. Memorial from St. Thomas District, re change in Discipline relating to building of churches: your Committee are of opinion that present provisions of Discipline are sufficient.

9. Resolution of Mr. J. B. Harrison and Mr. J. W. Torrance, in Strath-roy District Meeting, and passed on by said meeting without expression of opinion, proposing equal lay representation in the Stationing Committee; your Committee recommend that this be passed on to General Conference without expression of opinion.

To. Resolutions respecting changes in the constitution of the Superannuation Fund:

(a) We disapprove of the provision making the superannuation assessment a first charge on the funds of the Circuit.

(b) And also of the provision requiring the Quarterly Official Board to determine how said fund shall be raised.

(c) Your Committee recommend the retention of the provision making the Superintendent, with his colleague, responsible for the amount the Circuit should pay in proportion to their respective salaries.

12. Memorials from Amherstburg Quarterly Board :

(a) Requesting the limitations of Chairmen of Districts to two years. This being in the judgment of the Committee a constitutional question, no action was recommended.

(b) The election of Annual Conference representatives by Quarterly Boards. This being addressed to the General Conference, we recommend its transmission.

13. Resolution of London District Meeting approving of report of Commission of Conference Boundaries: your Committee endorse this view.

14. Recommendations from the Statistical Committee respecting proposed change in tabulating returns: your Committee deem these changes inadvisable, inasmuch as the Discipline now suitably provides for the matters involved.

15. Resolution of Rev. J. Holmes, through Exeter District Meeting: as this relates to Conference arrangements, we refer it to this Conference for action.

16. Memorial from Dundas Centre Church, London, (a) respecting equal lay representation on committees of Annual Conference: we recommend this to be sent on to the General Conference without expression of opinion; (b) respecting election of lay delegates to General Conference: we recommend this also sent on to the General Conference without comment; (c) respecting number on General Board of Missions: we recommend that the Board be made as small as may be consistent with efficiency; (d) we disapprove of the proposal to impose a penalty for non-payment, inasmuch as the general provisions of the Discipline provide for penalties for non-compliance with the requirements of Discipline; (e) we recommend that the annual subscription of each minister and probationer in the active work shall be equal to a sum of at least two and a half per cent. of his salary, as reported in the Minutes of the previous year, for "salary, board and fuel;" (f) in relation to the proposal to make the amount of salary exclusive of connexional funds the basis of assessments, and to impose a scale of ten per cent. on all above \$250, we think this needs further consideration by the Commission, and we recommend that the proposal be referred to the Commission for favorable consideration; (g) on the question of what is known as circuit assessment, being opposed to the voluntary principle, which it is believed should prevail, your Committee is unable to see any violation of this principle, inasmuch as every person is free to pay as he pleases, and we are persuaded that this distribution of the needs of the Fund is necessary to secure full payment; (h) relating to composition of Annual District Meeting, we approve of this proposal; (i) concerning pastoral term, your Committee have expressed opinion on this question, as found in No. 11 of this Report; (1) regarding Section of Discipline 174, Sub-Section 8, we recommend that there be added to said section, after word "Superintendent," second line, the words: "Or on request of five members of said Board, the Superintendent shall hold a meeting;" (k) relating to the question of "transfers," we recommend

2. In the case of the Rev. James Kennedy for restoration to the active work if a circuit suitable to him in his feebleness of health can be given him, we find he is not capable of performing the work required, and we therefore recommend that his superannuated relation be continued.

3. In the matter of the time of Rev. M. Pickard's entering the work, and the number of years for which he should pay the ministerial subscription, we find he was received into full connection with the Conference in 1889, and should pay from four years previous to that date.

4. Also that the request of Rev. James Gundy for superannuation for one year be granted.

# THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

# OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

"Grace be to you, and peace, from God our Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ. Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ: According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love."

The assembling of our Annual Conference for 1894 gives us another opportunity of addressing you in words of good cheer and holy counsel.

And, first of all, we feel bound to give thanks to the great Head of the Church for the abundant blessings vouchsafed during the year that has passed since we last addressed you. The earnest and consecrated labors of both pastors and people have had the blessing of Him who giveth the increase. Our Conference has had an increase during the year of 1,542 members, and there have been received on trial 4,159. Our present membership is 30,243. We have peace and prosperity within our borders, and conditions are favorable for a blessed outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon our Churches. Let us work and pray for a revival in every Circuit. Though our connexional funds, in some cases, show a decrease as compared with last year's returns, yet we are grateful that the depressed state of business has not more seriously affected us, and we trust that, as trade revives, our funds will show that it is lack of means and not of liberality that accounts for the temporary decrease. Humbly and gratefully we lay at the Master's feet the results of the work and benevolence of the year, and ask His acceptance of it.

In the Conference address of last year, special attention was called to the approaching plebiscite vote in Ontario for the prohibition of the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages, and you were exhorted to vote in the interests of temperance. We congratulate you, and all the friends of sobriety and morality, on the results of the vote, which showed that a very large majority of the voters desired that intoxicating liquors, the occasion of so much wretchedness and sin, should be put away from the people. We may fairly expect that the question of "prohition" will keep to the front in politics, and we venture to hope that mere party politics will not be permitted to draw any of you aside from doing what in you lies to have the matter settled by whatever authority is competent to give this boon to the country. The old motto must still be honored: "Total abstinence for the individual, and total prohibition for the State." To this end we need to keep on educating the public conscience, and to strive by all legitimate methods to get the temperance sentiment of the country embodied in law. When we consider the great advance in public opinion that has marked the past quarter of a century, we find cause for a reasonable hope that the days of the drink

traffic in this fair land are numbered; and the Methodists may, without boasting, claim at least some credit for the prospect, for our pulpits, Sabbath schools and press have been persistently endeavoring to spread information, and to excite the public conscience to put away the drink curse from the community.

Turning from this subject of general interest to one that more especially concerns our own people, we wish to emphasize the value and power of our connexional literature, and affectionately ask you to give it your patronage. The Christian Guardian has, on some large and important circuits, a very small circulation, and this for many reasons is to be regretted. If our people are to have an intelligent and comprehensive knowlege of the progress of God's work in general, and of the work of our Church in particular, they will do well to welcome this valuable paper week by week into their homes. Methodist parents will find that their children will become more attached to the Church of their fathers by reading our own connexional periodicals, and the Christian Guardian and Magazine in their discussion of the vital problems of the age, will tend to edify their readers and conserve the truths most surely believed among us. Our Sabbath School papers, in their various grades, are adapted to all ages of our scholars, and their price is within the reach of all. Connexional loyalty demands that the preference be given them, even if their excellence was not fully equal to the best published by other houses, but we are persuaded that our periodicals will not suffer by any comparison with any published in this or other countries.

We also desire to call your attention to the educational work of our Church. From the beginning, Methodism has sought to

"Unite the pair so long disjoined, Knowledge and vital piety."

We need to take care of the lambs, both in our homes and schools. The duty of having our children baptized into Christ is acknowledged by you, and after baptism there needs teaching in the doctrines and precepts of our holy religion. The general use of our catechisms, both in the home and Sabbath School, we are persuaded, would be a great blessing in establishing our young people in the faith and enabling them to give a reason for the hope that is in them. We rejoice in the good work being accomplished by our Epworth Leagues and young people's societies, and trust that they will unceasingly become centres of holy light and influence. Let them not become merely gatherings for social pleasure or means of raising money for objects however worthy; rather let them be gatherings seeking the edification of their members and for the deepening of the spiritual life. We also bespeak your sympathy with our institutions established in the interests of higher education. We rejoice that Alma College, which is a connexional institution within the bonds of our Conference, has had a fair share of patronage, and is likely to close the academic year with a clear balance-sheet so far as current expenses are concerned. The appointment of the Rev. J. P. Rice last year, as its financial and educational secretary, has been justified by the results of his canvass, which has realized about \$7,500 toward the reduction of the debt on the c the Coll burdens, daughter more coi is now fa of conne of our pe that Can been, be have moi it is conf the proph the traini

Parents who, while professing Protestantism, send their daughters to Roman Catholic institutions, because they are cheaper or more convenient, expose them to very serious risks. Victoria University is now fairly launched in its work, and it appeals not only on the ground of connexional loyalty, but on that of educational merit, for the patronage of our people whose sons and daughters are seeking the highest education that Canada affords. The Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, has been bereft of its distinguished principal, and all Canadian Methodists have mourned the loss of the most brilliant preacher of our Church; but it is confidently believed that the College will continue to be "a school of the prophets," worthy the affection and confidence of those interested in the training of our young ministers.

Our Missionary Society still goes forward "looking forth as the morning, fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners." This society lies very near the heart of the Connexion; but though on the part of some of our people it is evident that their gifts involve self-denial, it may be questioned whether as yet the majority have risen to a due appreciation of their privilege and responsibility in being workers together with God in bringing a lost world to the feet of Him

"Whose soul was once an offering made For every soul of man."

Let each solemnly ask the question: "Am I doing all that I can and that I ought, as a good steward of the manifold grace of God?"

Turning from this brief reference to some of our connexional interests, we wish to urge you, as often has been done before in our addresses, to cultivate deep personal piety. If we fail to advance in the Divine life, it matters little that our connexional institutions have financial prosperity, and that as a Church we have the respect of the sister Churches of our land. The great mission of Methodism was set forth by its venerable founder as being to spread scriptural holiness throughout the land; and cannot be effected without our members maintaining a high standard of holy living. With the increase or wealth, education and social position we need to retain the simplicity that is in Christ, and this can only be done by attending to private devotion and by regular and frequent attendance on those means of grace that in the past have been so graciously owned of God in developing the highest type of Christian character. While new and so-called progressive methods may be found useful in some degree, let not the old, well-tried and successful methods be despised. We cannot afford to relegate the class-meeting to the list of effete and useless institutions, we still need the fellowship it affords, and those who prize it most, will, we are sure, be found to be not the least spiritual and useful of our people. We beseech you, beloved, to be regularly found in its hallowed circle. We would also affectionately exhort you to maintain in your home the time-honored institution of family worship. In these days of business competition and rush, there is danger that the family altar may be cast down. Day by day, and not alone on the Sabbath day, let your family gather for worship. This will sweeten and sanctify domestic

life, and in the years to come the precious memories of the exercises of worship under the old roof-tree will be a benediction to your children, who will rise up to call you blessed, because you, like Abraham, "remembered the charge of the Lord." In conclusion, we remind you that before our next Annual Conference the General Conference will meet in London. Many matters of the highest importance will be discussed and great interests are involved in the decisions arrived at. We request you to remember this Conference in your prayers, that the spirit of wisdom and discretion may be poured upon the delegates, so that whatever is done may be according to the mind of the Spirit; and that all may tend to conserve and enlarge the prosperity of our beloved Church.

And now, beloved brethren, "we commend you to God, and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up and to give you an inheritance among them that are sanctified."
