Power, and Vicar-General Hamal, Rector of Laval, and fifty other clergymen were present. Archbishop O'Brien preached from the Acts of the Apostles, chapter xx, verse xxviii. He spoke of the duties and power of the episcopal office and the spread of religion as proof of the divine mission of the Church and paid a glorious tribute to Bishops Rogers and McIntyre. The service closed by singing the Te Deum. At the conclusion Lieut. Governor McDonald read an address on behalf of the congregation to Bishop McIntyre and presented him with a purse. Replying to the address His Lordship said that any success achieved was owing to having zealous priests and generous people. This afternoon there will be a levee and banquet, and this evening a torchlight procession and an illumination.
