First Provincial Election Shows Good Majority

BENNETT DEFEATED

Calgary, Nov. 9.—The election to the first Legislature of the province of Alberta took place today and resulted in the administration of Mr. Rutherford being sustained by a large majority.

There are altogether 25 constituencies, in two of which, St. Albert and Athabasca, government supporters were returned by acclamation.

The returns so far indicate the success of twenty government supporters and oppositionists. Reports from Innisfail, Lacombe, Pincher Creek and Ponoka are incomplete. Members stated to be elected include all the ministers.

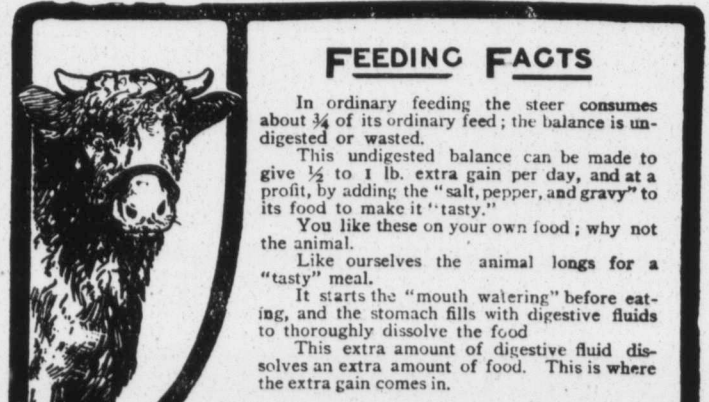

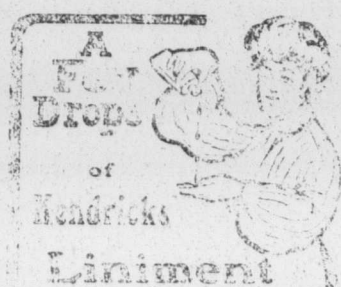

PURE WATER.

What a blessing the people of Newcastle enjoy in a pure water supply that notwithstanding the extremely dry weather seems exhaustless.

While St John and Frederic are suffering from an epidemic of typhoid fever caused by impure water and other towns are complaining from a scarcity our service is just as pure and plentiful as at any time.

Do our citizens appreciate this? We are afraid not all, otherwise more who depend on private wells, which are subject to contamination, would have the town's pure water in their homes, and thus not only have a steady supply, but help bear the expense of keeping up the system.

LOYALTY.

We do not know who wrote the following advice, but it is good at any rate and worthy of close reading and of being inwardly digested. Every citizen should be loyal to his town, but loyalty to a town consists of more than a disposition to throw your hat in favor of everything and to try to uphold all kinds of conduct. The loyal citizen is the one who scorns the idea of giving sanction to anything having a lowering or debasing influence. Carousing, drunkenness and all kinds of debauchery are frowned down by the loyal citizen. It is his duty to aid in curtailing all immoral practices and to uphold right principles, no matter where they may happen to be found. The man who stands up for right may get hard knocks from doers of wrong, but unflinching persistency will hold the respect of the better classes and we believe, ultimately will win the respect of those who may profess antiquity. The inconsistent moralist is the one who is sure soon to lose the confidence of everybody, and the world is not slow to size up a man at his true value. To be loyal to a town then, is to uphold every good measure and try to make it better. He who keeps on fault finding constantly has something in himself that is not just right and even should he make noise enough to blow off his head, his influence will extend only to those of his own calibre.

CANADIANS AND AMERICANS

Writing in the November Canadian Magazine on the great northward movement of the American farmer. Valancey E. Fuller, editor of the American Agriculturist, says:

The question has often been asked me, "What influence will the American immigration into the Canadian Northwest have on the political future of the country? Will it incite a desire for annexation with this country? My answer has been, "None whatever." The American settler will find the economic conditions very similar to those of his own country; he will find the school system even more liberal; the laws more fairly and impartially administered; the laws relating to the liquor question liberal, yet conserving temperance; a people of social habits, imbued with a sense of justice, a high regard for the laws of the land, and with so great a respect for them that they are not only prepared to themselves obey, but to see to it that others do likewise. In a word, the American immigrant will be so well pleased with his material conditions, with the laws of the land, the customs of the people and the future of his children, that he will as soon as he can, become citizens of a country which guards his rights, his property, and his well-being in a way to command his respect and esteem.

There is a warning and a lesson for Canada in these facts, and that is to raise the standard of those taking the oath of allegiance and to keep the Canadian Northwest for the Anglo-Saxon race if you wish to avoid many of the grave social and political questions some of them full of menace, which now confront the United States; and which may be attributed to the fact that this country is no longer, as stated above, ruled by the votes of its own people, but by those of foreigners. Canadians have a grand heritage in the great Northwest, and it is their duty to see to it that it is peopled by those worthy of it; those who, by association, will become their people, respecting their laws and adding to the prosperity and honour of the Dominion.
