RUSHING BUSINESS

OTTAWA, Ap. 30.—With prorogation announced for Wednesday next, the talk-weary members of the commonsense yesterday made rapid progress in clearing off from the order paper a considerable number of government bills, most of which had been previously discussed and which were put through the final stages with only a final demurral debate.

The new time-saving rules of the house were put through in the morning session and in the afternoon and evening Mr. Oliver's bill to amend the volunteer bounty act by extending the time for the location of land grants until the end of 1911; Hon. Mr. Graham's bill to amend the railway act in several minor particulars; and several amendments to the common law bills were disposed of.

The house wound up with a consideration of the remaining unconsidered clauses of the insurance bill, no important alterations of the bill, as received from the senate, being introduced. The bill was given third reading.

Hon. Geo. P. Graham has given notice of a bill to amend the government railway act so as to bring the inter-colonial under the general provisions of the railway act in respect to damage to private property through fire occasioned by the operation of the railway.

The pall bearers were Messrs. Andrew, John, Robert and Edmund Almond, and George and Percy Young. Deceased was 37 years of age and leaves three children, the eldest being 12 years old and the youngest eight months.

WHY YOU SHOULD STOP BRUSH FIRES

**Fire Injures the Community
More Than the Owner of
the Timber.**

HOW IT WORKS OUT

Timber makes pay checks. Timber burned up pays no wages. Moral—Do your best to prevent fires. Would you not, if any man's house, in your own town.

If you saw his house afire would you pass by without doing anything? Do you realize that timber is quite as valuable to the owners and much more so to the community and to you? He can build a new house but not a new forest.

The owner of the timber destroyed may suffer a loss of \$1 a thousand feet if his timber is readily accessible. If that timber was marketed there would be paid for the logging and the driving an average of about \$1 a thousand feet. Four-fifths of this would be for labor and supplies which would be disbursed on the ground and a large part returned to the owner and landowners in the immediate vicinity from which the individual would benefit directly or indirectly.

In the timber manufacture of logs into lumber an additional \$2 to \$3 would be spent at some point not far distant. This likewise would be spent for labor and supplies that would go toward the upbuilding of towns and cities and furnish markets for the homesteaders or farmers at some distance. Furthermore, the profits of logging and saw milling largely would be returned to the community.

In the transportation of the lumber to the markets of the world from \$2 to \$5 would be expended. If by water, this would operate towards the creation of a merchant marine that would render more valuable the agricultural lands tributary to our seaports; would create markets for farm products and in their wider distribution. If by rail, it would involve more capital and more railroads to our province; and every increase in the transportation of the lumber industry of the province renders more valuable every foot of land with its borders regardless of location. The interest of the community in every foot of standing timber in this province is far greater than that of the individual owner, and it is the interest which when once crystallized into public opinion and enacted into laws, will demand the thorough and adequate protection of our forests.

GREATER PRINCE RUPERT

Mail advices to the Traffic Department of the Grand Trunk Pacific this week, show that there is great activity, both in new building operations and in the advance in real estate in Prince Rupert, which in another two months will complete its first year of existence. It is nothing unusual for a million feet of lumber to be delivered at Prince Rupert in a single week, and it melts away as fast as men and teams can handle it. A number of leaseholders are starting to build wharves and the concrete wharf of the British Columbia Government will also be under way at once. The Grand Trunk Pacific is planning further large additions to its already extensive wharves. The British Columbia legislature late in the season, which has just closed, gave Prince Rupert a charter as a town with special privileges and rights as to the control of municipal water and lighting privileges not enjoyed by other cities in British Columbia. The population of Prince Rupert believes that the inauguration of their own municipal government instead of being administered by commissioners, will mean a further stimulus to the already phenomenal if not magical growth of the town.

RAILWAY TO GASPE BY NEXT XMAS

Orders From Other Side are to Rush Completion of Work.

A BIG WHARF

MONTEREAL, May 2.—Instructions have been received from the other side to the effect that the railway from Port Daniel to the Port of Gaspé, 200 miles from Campbellton, must be completed by the end of the year.

The line will be completed to Grand River fifty miles from Gaspé by the first of July and on the remaining fifty miles most of the grading and bridging has been completed, so if there is not too much delay on the steel superstructure, the line will be finished to Gaspé Basin by Christmas.

At the harbor of Gaspé a terminal wharf is to be built by Dussault of Quebec at a cost of \$200,000, which will be six hundred feet long and giving forty feet of water for the largest steamships.

ANOTHER MURDER IN ONTARIO

Husband Said to Have Choked Wife

SMITH'S FALLS, Ont. May 2.—Murder was committed here Saturday morning in a little frame house on Main St. when Mrs. Rufus Woodmark was choked to death by her husband. The crime is the result of an unhappy domestic life extending over a number of years in which drinking, jealousy and quarrelling seem to have been almost a daily portion.

Woodmark is about fifty two years of age and has a large and respected family connection in this vicinity. He is a laborer but for the last few years he has lived a very irregular life, and it is said, drank very heavily. His wife was a hard working woman and went out to work to support the family. Woodmark admitted the crime after his arrest, saying it was a good job.

BRITAIN ADDS MORE TERRITORY TO THE EMPIRE

DURHAM, ACTION, April 30.—Advices received here state that Her Majesty's Government have decided to annex the island in the South Indian Ocean, which was annexed on behalf of Great Britain on March 24, by a party aboard the Durham whaler, Mangora.

A cabin was erected supporting the island, under which the declaration of annexation was signed.

Heard's Island is a desolate spot, covering for the greater part with ice and glaciers. ANNUAL REPORT OF ELECTRIC LIGHT DEPARTMENT

Council Chambers, Campbellton, N. B.
To the Town Council of the Town of Campbellton.
Gentlemen:—We beg leave to submit the following synoptical report of the operation of the Electric Light Department, for the fiscal year ending December 31st, 1909.

During the year the commercial and street lighting transmission and distribution circuits were extended as follows:—

500 feet on Water Street.

700 feet on Pleasant Street.

300 feet on Albert Street.

400 feet on Prince William Street.

These extensions required eight poles, 1000 feet of transmission wiring, and 2500 feet of distributing wiring.

Six new five kilo-watt transformers were purchased. These were put in service as follows: Two to replace those which had been burned out, or had been rendered inefficient by age; two on new lines and new business extensions, and two spars.

During the year the 32 candle power street lamps were replaced, with 100 watt tungsten lamps. While these lamps are a great improvement over the 32 candle power carbon filament lamps, both in efficiency and illumination, we find that where they are exposed to the wind, the breakage is very marked, which makes the cost of renewals very high. Until some less rigid form of bracket is placed on the market, street lighting and individual tungsten lamps will not prove very satisfactory. However, we are of the opinion that the tungsten arc lamp, both in efficiency and maintenance, for with the same method of suspension as the arc lamp, the cost of maintenance and repairs will not exceed that of the arc lamp.

The regenerative flame arc lamp which has been placed on the market during the last year, offers another improvement in the method of street illumination, which, with but slight increase in current consumption over the ordinary arc lamp, produces four times more light. The only disadvantage to this type of lamp, is the cost of carbon renewals, which for this lamp alone, is equal to the cost of carbons for all the other lamps on the street lighting circuit. The cost of attendance is also quite an item as this type of lamp requires almost daily attention. However, if the cost of maintenance and trimming can be brought to within a reasonably comparative limit of the ordinary arc lamp, this type will no doubt greatly change the present system of street illumination.

During the year the work of securing new business was pushed vigorously onward, and thirty four new services were added, making upwards of 500 services now installed in town to date. The department made an effort to secure some new business in the way of electric sign lighting, but as by-law number twenty, paragraph twenty seven, prohibits the use of the projecting signs, nothing of any consequence can be developed along this line.

Seventy five new meters were purchased during the year. One thousand pounds of copper line wire, also eight hundred tons of coal. The purchase this year was not as large as last year, owing to about four hundred tons being left over from last year. The total receipts for the year for the sale of electric current were \$9003.75, expenditures, \$6534.19, leaving a surplus of \$2469.56. We find that year by year the surplus has been accumulating, till it has reached the total of \$16242.49 for the eleven years of operation. As this represents almost half of the present bonded indebtedness of the Electric Light System, we think some move should be made to have this surplus set aside for the redemption of these bonds at maturity.

Owing to the very general use of electric current, the generation capacity of the system has become greatly taxed beyond its rated capacity. We have found it necessary to either make addition to the present generating capacity, or to erect a new and improved Electric Light and Power Generating Station. Negotiations towards this end are now being carried on by the manager of the Electric Light System, and we will soon be in a position to have plans ready for submission to the Council for consideration. We expect to have a system, when completed, much superior to the present in efficiency and cost of maintenance.

In conclusion, we wish to congratulate the Staff of the Department for the successful manner in which the system has been operated during the past year, not a single break or interruption of service having occurred.
