DETAILS OF VICTORY LOAN 1918

The following interesting tables show in detail the work of the Victory Loan committee of Carleton County. The figures are supplied by Chairman Miller and comprise the official report to canvass ers. At first Mr. Miller was somewhat down cast that his effort failed to put the county over the top, but prominent business men all over the county and province consider that Carleton County did decidedly well. She was simply assessed more money than was in the county. The parish of Brighton subscribed a larger amount than the whole county of Madawaska. The epidemic in Kent and Wicklow was most severe and accounts for the low figures in those parishes. In several instances the canvassers were themselves ill and could do but little work. On the whole Carleton did splendidly and under the circumstances it would not have been humanly possible to produce higher figures.






