PRODUCE PRICES

The Christmas market is locally well supplied but many ordinary wage earners will have to forego the pleasure of fowl for dinner. Much poultry is being shipped to St. John and elsewhere. Today King Turkey is bringing 50 to 60 cents a pound. A Middle Simonds producer received \$9.50 for one bird. Chickens bring 30 to 35 cents; ducks 35 cents; geese, 40 cents; pork, 14 cents; lamb, 13 cents; beef, 7 cents. The scarcity of eggs continues and for direct transactions from hen to the breakfast table 50 cents is paid. Store keepers pay 45 cents. Butter brings 32 to 35 cents.

The potato market is dull—in fact there is no market at all. Dealers will pay 90 cents rather than see the farmer take his load back home. The final survey of the United States crop shows 451,000,000 bushels as against 361,659,000 last year. Potatoes will not be higher in the American market this season. Hay is in good demand at \$8, and oats bring 35 cents.

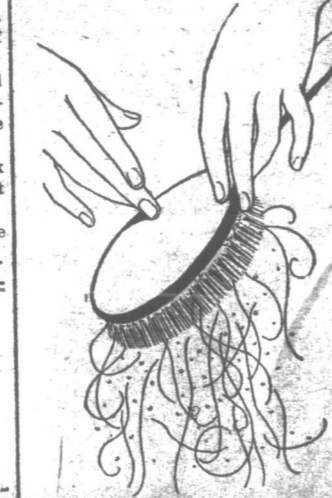
met with Mrs. Edward Rogers Tuesday afternoon.
