They were too unacquainted with physiology, and with the art of experiment, to know how to set about transfusion. Not until the middle of the seventeenth century had a preparation been made for such a trial. The experi-ments of Boyle, Graaf and Fracassati. on the injection of various substances into the veins of animals, were crowned by those of Lower, who, in 1605, injected blood into the veins of a dog. Two years later, a bolder attempt was made on man. A French mathematician, Denis, assisted by a surgeon, having repeated with success the experi-ments of Lower, resolved to extend the new
