LONDON, Nov. 2.—As showing the seri-pusness of the election rioting at Cork, it is stated that no fewer than 325 cases were treated at the different hospitals and infirmaries in that city during the election riot. There were four cases treated on Sunday. Concurrently with the froth and fury the humdrum election work proceeds steadily, and the canvassing of voters confirms the belief that the worthy butter dealer Flavin, who carries the true Nationalist flag, will be elected by a triumphant majority. The tactics of the Fory managers are suspicious. They have been holding hole and corner indoor meet-ings, not daring to show themselves in the light of day, and each gathering has passed a resolution of confidence in the Governmentand in the Tory candidate Sarsfield; but the whisper of some sudden change of strategy on the eve of election has become louder and more persistent. It is said that the leaders have lost control of the rank and file, and that Sarsfield may retire at any moment. The meaning of this, of course, is that the Tories, knowing they cannot return their own man, want to vote for the Parnellite candidate, in order, at any cost, to defeat the moderate Nationallst, and thereby give heart to their natural allies, the extremists, all over Ireland. That this desire is real is proved by the fact that at a Tory meeting in the assembly rooms Saturday night all the speakers referred to it, and implored those present to resist the temptation. The present to resist the temptation. The danger would be serious if the Parnellites were as strong as they profess to be; but those best qualified to form an opinion declare that Flavin's voters will outnumber by at least 500 the combined poil of the Tory and extremist candidates. # 24,000 Victims!

Terrible Results of the Earthquake in Japan.

Twenty-Three Thousand Houses in Ruins.

Fire and Shipwreck Swell the Awful Death Roll,

Which is Estimated to Include 24,000

London, Oct. 31.—Dispatches from Hiogo, Japan, say the terrible earthquake which occurred in that country Wednesday night destroyed the towns of Nagoya, Gifu and Ogaki. All the public buildings and most of the smaller structures in those places were thrown down. A fire which started among the wrecked buildings in Nagoya completed the work of destruction in the most crowded quarter of the town.

THREE THOUSAND VICTIMS.

It is estimated the total number of persons who lost their life by disaster exceeds 3,000.

Many vessels are reported to have been wrecked in the vicinity of Hiogo, and during the disturbance the waters of the lakes in the surrounding country were violently agitated. A Big Schooner Goes Down During a Hurricane.

No Chance to Save a Single Life-Evi-dences of Another Wreck.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 31.—Another captain and crew of a Nova Scotian vessel have evidently met with a watery grave. Twelve days ago the four-masted schooner Uruguary, Captain Parsons, left Windsor bound to New York with a cargo of plaster, and no tidings of her having reached her destination have been received. Yesterday the owners were informed that a vessel had arrived in Boston, and reported having seen a vessel answering the description of the Uruguary turn bottom up during a hurricane. A fuller dispatch states that the schooner Seraphine had passed a four-masted schooner while a terrible blow was on. The vessel labored heavily and finally disappeared beneath the billows. While those on board the Seraphine were completing preparations to rescue the poor fellows a large wave struck the big schooner, and the cries of the men were hushed forever as the vessel went down within 300 yards of the Seraphine. The captain of the Seraphine in his report stated that a British flag was seen at one of the mastheads of the ill-fated vessel just before she disappeared. As the Uruguary is the only British four-master in these waters, the Messrs. Dimock feel sure the vessel referred to by the captain of the Seraphine is none other than their own.

The Uruguary had a crew or captain and nemen, viz.: Captain, Parsons; mates, Elias Cochrane and James Morris; cook, Robert Henrys; seamen, Herbert Hunter and four unknown foreigners. In addition to the above there was a New Yorker on board named Edward Slosson, a passenger bound home. Cochrane, Morris, Parsons, Henry and Hunter belonged to Windsor. The vessel was insured for \$20,000. She was owned by Shubael Dimock, of Windsor, N. S.





ODESSA, Oct. 31.—During the recent anti-Senetic riots at Starodub five young unmarried Jewesses were so barbarously outraged and malireated that they have since died. Twenty Jews in all were killed during the disturbances. Rioting similar to that at Starodub is reported from Balta, in Russian Poland.

POLITICAL POINTS.

Ne New Developments in the Cabinet
Crisis—Statement by J. L
Tarte, M. P.

The Cabinet crisis is in precisely the same condition in which it was three days ago. Neither Premier Abbott nor Mr. Chapleau has yielded an inch of ground.

In the Supreme Court at Ottawa on Friday argument in the Stanstead election case was toncluded. The argument in the Glengary election case—McLelan vs. Chisholm—was opened.

Mr. J. I. Tarte, M. P., writes in Le Canadien as follows: "It would be an error to believe that Mr. Chapleau has resigned about a simple questisn of a portfolio. The difference has more serious causes, which are not perhaps without remedy. The insolence of the Toronto Empire and the veiled threats of the Montreal Gazette have contributed very much to the actual crisis. The French-Canadian element in the Conservative party will not consent to be ruled and put in tutelage by their allies of the other Provinces."

The Montreal Star has the following from its Ottawa correspondent: "Senator Pelletier, who is here, states that he was definitely told during the session that Mr. Chapleau had approached Mr. Laurier, not personally, but through his friends, and that the reply was to the effect that an adversary who joined the party on the eve of battle and insured the victory would deserve some reward. On being asked if that meant Mr. Chapleau's being given office under a Liberal Government, Mr. Pelletier stald, 'Certainly not. Chapleau would not be taken into any Cabinet formed by Hon. Wilfrid Laurier."

### THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK

In the United States and Canada—Pointers from Bradstreet's Review.

New York, Oct. 31.—There is no real improvement in the general condition of business in the United States. The reports from the different industrial and business centers, while referring to trade as of fair proportions, state that the movement is smaller than was the case a few weeks ago. Extremely mild weather in most parts of the continent has checked very largely the demand for seasonable goods, while in other directions the autumn business is said to be over. Reports from the different parts of Canada as to the present condition and prospects of business are favorable.

Exports of wheat (including flour as wheat) from both coasts of the United States and Canada this week, as reported in Bradstreet's, equal 3,597,204 bushels, as compared with 3,783,178 bushels the week before, and with 4,305,309 bushels in the week preceding, Wool is lower all along the line and dull.

IN CANADA.

General trade reports from the Dominion

General trade reports from the Dominion of Canada are quite favorable. Toronto sends word that there is some activity in general lines, with large dealings in peas. Montreal advices tate that while business is fair the weather is too mild. Here, too, peas and oats are in active request. Bank clearings in four cities aggregate \$18,426, 226 this week, a decrease of 8.6 per cent. compared with last week. The Dominion reports 37 business failures this week, against 53 last week, and 30 this week last year. The total number Jan. 1 to date is 1,514, against 1,336 last year. IN CANADA.






