BABY-KILLERS.

Forty of the Victims' Bodies Recovered

from the Thames. London, April 15 .- The alleged baby murderess with the suggestive name of Dyer, attempted to commit suicide at tying them into the same knot and putting it under the left ear precisely as in the case of each strangled infant found in the Thames. The woman is now watched so closely that in the recrimatory petition brought suicide is impossible. 


DIED AT DANNEMORA.

Joseph Zlamel Electrocuted for Killing His Sweetheart.



Crown Prosecutor Clute acceded to the request of his lordship, who directed the jury to bring in a verdict of not guilty. The prisoners were then discharged. Dr. Fischer says further that sleep in this new position "will always be intellectual, because more profound, the entire nervous system ameliorated, while people inclined to lung and kidney trouble will be vastly benefited by sleeping in this position. To prevent any inconvenience by too sudden a change the pillows should be gradually reduced and finally placed under the feet.

The Spider Tree of Africa Travelers who visited or passed the Cape Negro country of Africa often

heard from the natives of a plant that was part spider, and that, growing, threw its legs about in continual struggles to escape. It was the good fortune of Dr. Welwitsch to discover the origin of the legend. Strolling along through a wind-swept tableland country, he came upon a plant that rested low upon the ground, but had two enormous leaves that blew and twisted about in the wind like serpents —in fact, it looked, as the natives had said, like a gigantic spider. Its stem was four feet across and but a foot high. It had but two leaves in reality, that were six or eight feet long, and split up by the wind so that they resembled ribbons. This is probably the most extraordinary known. It grows for nearly if not quite a century, but never upward beyond but a foot, simply expanding until it reaches the diameter given, looking in its adult state like a singular stool on the plain from ten to eight-

een feet in circumference. When the wind came rushing in from the sea, lifting the curious ribbon-like leaves and tossing them about, it almost seemed to the discoverer that the strange plant had suddenly become imbued with life and was struggling to escape. When a description and picture of the plant were sent to England, it was, like many other discoveries, discredited, but soon the itself was received, and now Welwitschia mirabilis is well known to bot anists.

Condemnation of the Disgraceful Exhibition at Ottawa.

Montreal Ministers on Schools in Quebe and in Manitoha

Montreal, April 15 .- When the Montreal Protestant Ministerial Association protested a fortnight ago against the passage of the Remedial Bill, the members were denounced by the Gazeute as uncharitable, unchristian and unpatriotic, and told that they did not represent the Protestant clergy of Montreal. The association this morning replied to the attack in the following vigorous resolutions: "That we hereby put on record our sense of same and sorrow at the disgraceful conduct of certain members of the House of Commons during the debate in committee on the Remedial Bill us reported in the public press. The presence of intoxicated members in the House, the utterance of blasphemous language, the ridicule and sarcasm with which the word of God was treated, all speak of a depth of degradation which crimsons with shame the cheek of every self-respecting citizen of our beloved Dominion and fills with sorrow and humiliation the heart of every Christian. That while no excuse can exonerate the individual members of the House who have thus disgraced themselves and humiliated the people whom they represent, yet it is selfevident that the physical and menta; strain inseparable from an enforced session of a week's duration without interruption, with the exception of a daily intermission of two hours for dinner, together with an open bar for the sale of intoxicants, are the aggravating causes of the unhappy occurrence which today holds up our young Dominion to the pity, if not the scorn, of the civilized world; and we hereby call upon the leader of the Government in the House, who is a medical doctor and fully aware of the consequences of such a violation of natural law, to limit the daily sessions of the committee and the House to a period of time compatible with the laws of health and with the mental conditions essential to the enactment of wise legislation; that we reiterate our protest against the passage of the proposed Remedia Bill for the reasons assigned in our re-solutions of March 30." The Minis-terial Association further reaffirms its position in opposing the Manitoba co-ercion bill. It asserts that "the Protestant dissentient schools of this Province are absolutely unsectarian. Will anyone say that the schools of the proposed Remedial Bill are unsectarian?
