The traction situation in London seems to be attracting not a little attention of late. The prospective sale of the South western Traction Company has led

outsiders to take an interest in local conditions, and there is as a result much speculation as to the future of more than one road. As mentioned some time ago, there is a local syndicate ready to take over the Southwestern Traction Company next month

Local Men Want Road. The members are at the present time framing their offer, and it will be made on the day of the sale.

It now appears that several other local capitalists are looking into the situation, and it is possible that they may make an offer for the concern. Last week a gentleman from the United States visited the city, and made inquiries regarding the Southwestern Traction Company, the land Counties Railway, the London and .Western Railway, and the London

Centre in London.

These roads all run out of London in different ways, and would centre here. The gentleman was the representative of a large American financial house, it was stated, and it is understood that he was looking into the situation as a possible field for investment of American money. The idea is to amaigamate all the lines running out of the city under one management, and run them in conjuction with the London street rail-

Many Inquiries.

Several gentlemen interested in traction matters admitted today that the number of inquiries regarding the local traction situation had been many and had been diversified. The inquiries came not only from many parts of Canada, but also from the United States. The sale of the Southwestern will attract great interest,

\$600,000 Is Reserve Price. The up-set price has not been ma de public, but it is understood that it will reach the sum of \$600,000.

If that sum is not bid for the road, the bond-holders will take hold of the proposition and run it themselves It is thought by competent railro ad men that at that figure the concern

FAMILY OF SIX MURDERED

Bluefield, W. Va., Sept. 23.—An entire family of six persons were murdered, and the bodies of all btu one of the victims were burned with their home at Hurley, Buchanan County, early yesterday.

The motive was evidently robbery, as the owner of the house, an old woman known as "Aunty Betty" Justis, was generally supposed to have large sum of money about the place. Mrs. Justis, her son-in-law, George Meadows, his wife and three children, were the victims. Meadows' body, badly mutilated, was found lying in the yard of the destroyed home. Two bullet holes were found in the body, and a wound, which almost severed the head from the body, gave the discoverers their first evidence of the extent of the tragedy.

A search of the ruins of the house disclosed a sickening spectacle. The blackened masses of half-burned flesh and charred bones of the two women and the three children were found beneath the debris, each body bearing the evidences of murder committed before the house was burned, for the purpose of

A woman's skull wasfound some distance from the remainder of her half-burned body, amid the smoldering ruins. Another daughter of Mrs. Justis told the police that her mother had a large sum of money buried under the sill of the house, and they started digging up \$650 in gold and silver. The murderers are supposed to have secured the \$600 which

"Aunt Betty" always carried on her person. Bloodhounds were rushed to the scene, and in a short time took up the trail of the murderers.
