BRITISH MAKING SECURE

SOME PRISONERS TAKEN

German Raiding Parties Are Driven Off in Four Different Attempts.

London Sept. 10—Field Marshal Haig, in his official report of today, says that the British troops last night consolidated the positions captured during the day southeast of Hargicourt, on the Somme front, in France. At several parts of the front German raiding parties were dispersed. The text of the statement reads:
"During the night the positions cap-'During the night the positions captured by us yesterday southeast of Hagricourt were successfully consoli-dated in spite of some bomb fighting on our new front. An enemy raiding party was driven away last night east of Loos, Other raiding parties three times attacked our positions east of Armenattacked our positions east of Armentieres, but were successfully beaten off tieres, but were successivily beaten in in every case.

"We took a number of prisoners in the course of the night in patrol en counters north of Langemarck an northeast of Monchy-le-Preux."

TRENCHES TAKEN. TRENCHES TAKEN.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—The official communication from British headquarters in France tonight reads:

"In successful operations today south of Hargicour, the Northumberland troops attacked and captured 600 yards of German trenches south of the positions we gained in this area on August 26. We also captured 52 prisoners and two trench mortars.

"At the same time we attacked a small portion or a hostile trench required to round off our line east of Malakoff farm, and captured it after heavy fighting, in which considerable casualties were inflicted on the enemy. "During the night hostile raiding parties attacked two of our positions south of Hollebeke. After sharp fighting, with heavy enemy casualties the raiders succeeded in entering one posts, from which three of our men are missing. The attack on the second post was Form which three of our men are missing. The attack on the second post was driven off with enemy loss.

"Early in the morning the enemy also attacked our trenches in Inverness Copse, but was repulsed, leaving twelve prisoners in our hands.

400,000 POLES IN CHICAGO PLEDGED TO FREE HOMELAND

Wire French President Promising Their Support.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 10.—A telegram was sent to President Poincare today pledging the support of 400,000 Poles in Chicago in the effort to face Poland. Henry Franklin Boulton, head of the French commission, told a mass meeting of Poles that an army of Poles was now being formed in France, which will operate independently of the French army. Its purpose will be to achieve the freedom of Poland.

Berlin, via London, Sept. 10 .- President Wilson can bring immediate peace if he will prove by acts the faith in the German people he has expressed in words. Philip Scheidemann, leader of the German Socialist majority party, declared today in an exclusive interview with the United Press.

'Further bloodshed is now unnecessary if America believes in and does not under-estimate the Reichstag's power and the strength of the German movement, which pushes irresistibly toward democratization of the entire public life," Scheidemann asserted. "It is pushing on, although as in America, war offers the worst chance for further development of democratic institutions.

'The German advance will be quicker the sooner the obstacles of war are removed.

Special significance attaches to Scheidemann's views. The German Socialist majority leader is now at the head of a special committee charged by the kaiser with investigating Germany's constitutional system and reforms. 'For one generation after the war,' he added, "the

people will be unable to commence another war, and peace will be guaranteed automatically by the law of 'During this time, the cause of democracy and so-

MICHAELIS' NEW TERMS OF PEACE **WILL MENTION** FRENCH DESIRE

Considered, But Not Decided.

Pavements cost money, but they Disarmament and International Police Mentioned in Unofficial Forecast.

> LONDON, Sept. 9 .- Germany will shortly be able to publish her peace terms, according to Dr. George Michaelis, the German chancellor. Dr. Michaells. in an Interview, said he had so informed the Reichstag main committee, an Exchange Tele-graph dispatch from Copenhagen to-

"The main committee," said Dr. Michaelis in an interview, "tried to make final arrangements regarding peace conditions and the question of Alsace-Lorraine, but no decision has yet been taken. The question, however, was eagerly discussed, and Germany soon will be able to publish her peace terms."

TO DRAFT REPLY TODAY.

Desperate Counter - Attacks Fail to Loosen Grip on Positions.

800 PRISONERS OVER

|More Than 1,000 German Dead Counted in One Sector.

PARIS, Sept. 9 .- Violent counter-ata tacks were made last night by the Germans on the positions taken yesterday by French troops in the Verdun region. After a hard struggle, in which the French artillery played a telling part, and in which the infantry surged forward again wherever temporarily driven back, the French positions were left intact.

The text of the statement reads: "During the night our detachments executed various surprise attacks into the German lines, notably near La Royere farm, east of Rheims, and in the region of Maisons-de-Champagne. We captured some material and a certain

number of prisoners.

Germans Fail to Regain.

"On the right bank of the (northeast of Verdun) the Germans launched violent counter-attacks upon the positions we conquered yesterday in the sector of the Boise-des-Fosses, and the Bois-des-Caurieres. The enemy cattacks were hopken by our fire which and the Bois-des-Caurieres. The enemy attacks were broken by our fire, which inflicted heavy losses upon the assailants. At some points on the front of the attack fierce fighting took place. Our troops resisted energetically, and after alternating advances and retirements maintained their positions. "The number of prisoners which we took on September 8 numbers about 800, including fifteen officers, Our reconnocitering parties, which pushed

800, including fifteen officers. Our reconnoitering parties, which pushed out in front of the Bois-des-Fosses, counted nearly a thousand enemy dead before our lines in this region. On the left bank of the Meuse there was great artillery activity on both sides, without infantry attacks."

The French war office Saturday evening isued the following statement: "Between St. Hilaire and St. Souplet our detachments penetrated a German trench, destroyed a number of shelters, and brought back material and about twenty prisoners, including three officers.

HUNDREDS ATTEMPT TO KEEP LONDON PRIEST OUT OF CHURCH; POLICE CLEAR PATH AT FORD

Parishioners Riot and Hurl Missiles, and Mayor Reads Riot Act Before Crowd Disperses-Militia Details Are Summoned To Restore Order.

WINDSOR, Sept. 9.-Amid a shower of bricks, stones, chairs, shovels and other missiles thrown by "conscientious objectors" of Our Lady of the Lake Church, Ford, Rev. Father Francois Xavier Laurendeau, assisted by fourteen police officers took possession of the church presbytery late Saturday afternoon.

Even after the priest and his bodyguard had forced their way through a crowd of more than 200 men in front of church property they found their entrance blocked by perhaps three score women and children of the parish who had been stationed there by the men as a reserve force to prevent the priest rom taking possession.

RIOT ACT READ BY MAYOR. So threatening did the situation become at one time that Mayor Charles Montreuil of Ford, attempting to pacify the rioters, was compelled to read the riot act, before the crowd would disperse. Several police officers were slightly injured by missiles hurled from the crowd.

Twelve ricters were arrested, but were later released on orders of Crown-Attorney Rodd, after they had promised to remain away from the church. Father Laurendeau, accompanied by Father O'Connor, vicar-general of the London diocese, arrived in the city at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon, with written instructions from Bishop M. S. Fallon, to take possession of the Ford church, in spite of the announcement by members that any such effort would meet with resistance. Chief of Police Maisonville assembled thirteen policemen from Windsor, Walkerville, and Ford, and accompanied Fathers Laurendeau and O'Connor.

PARISHIONERS ANSWER ALARM.

At 4 o'clock word reached the guards at the church that the officers were on their way to take possession. Immediately the guards rang the church bell, apparently a pre-arranged signal in the event of trouble. 




