#### France Labors On Reconstruction On Third Armistice Anniversary

PARIS. Nov. 11.—France worked today, the third anniversary of the armistice which ended hostilities between the Germans and the victorious allied armies. There were a few scattered ceremonies incident to the day, but the formal holiday had been postponed by Government proclamation until Sunday, as a demonstration to the world that the nation is in earnest in its work of reconstruction.

Early this week the Chamber of Deputies voted to make Armistice Day a public holiday but the Senate rejected the bill, insisting that no new holidays should be added in view of the present period of economic depression.

The foreign representatives here, however, together with delegations The foreign representatives here, nowever, together with delegations from the French societies of war veterans, held to their custom of visiting the grave of the unknown poilu at the Armistice De Triomphe, which they massed with poppies and other flowers. 





## GERMAN HOUSING SITUATION SERIOUS

through lack of a proper means of solv-

More Than 1,000,000 Dwellings Needed To Relieve Shortage.

BERLIN, Nov. 10 .- More than 1,000-000 dwellers, apartments, or rooms are nousing shortage which has steadily increasing for the last six months, especially in the eastern cities which are crowded with Russian refugees, says an official statement of

the housing office.

In Prussia alone, 585,000 rooms are in demand, an increase of 50,000 in three months. three months, and reports from every large city in the republic declare the housing situation is growing serious with the advance of the winter. The need in 62 of the larger cities is des-

cribed as urgent.

The government had indicated its ntention of abandoning the "rationintention of abandoning the Tationing" of rooms within a short time, but the fact that building operations, abandoned during the war, have not caught up with the demands, has necessitated a continuance of control of dwelling space. Families, as well that the continuance of control of the co as individuals, are permitted to occupy only such rooms as are absolutely es-

sential. This regulation has forced many This regulation has forced mainly families with large houses to take in lodgers. In such cases the families are permitted to choose their lodgers, fix the charge and make such "living" regulations as are deemed essential. regulations as are deemed essential. The space, however, must be occupied, and so it has come about that homeowners have invited relatives, friends, or acquaintances to share their houses, many being averse to give accommodations to strangers. many being averse to give accommodations to strangers.

house owners, formerly wealthy, have found the increasing cost of living so burdensome that they are making an active effort to secure foreign tenants, particularly Americans, English, Holanders and Scandinavians, who are

ble to pay well.

#### King Declares "Housecleaning" Essential To Lower Cost of Living.

PORT ARTHUR, Nov. 10 .- That during 1917, 1918 and 1919 the Riordon company had declared dividends of 10 per cent, and at the same time it had been allowed to pay its federal taxes in promissory notes was the further charge made during this evening's meeting in the armories here by Hon. 



of \$6 a day.

Ford believed there were many employees of the company that were engaged in useless work, and that most of those who were engaged in useful work were loafing on the job. The axe was swung right and left. Under the new scale, pay of engineers
