Destruction Fire at Kingsport

A bad fire occurred at Kingsport on Monday afternoon resulting in the total destruction of the fine residence belonging to L. N. Cox, a native of the town. There was no insurance on the property. The blaze commenced about two o'clock and before any effort to check it could be made, the whole building was enveloped in flames. All attempts to subdue the fire were unavailing and within an hour the residence, out buildings and barn were a mass of ruins. Mr. Cox has for many years conducted a private hotel for tourists in the summer months. His building was regarded as one of the finest in Kingsport and was exceedingly patronized by these travellers. In the course of the season two or three hundred tourists were accommodated at the hotel and its destruction will be a loss to Kingsport in many ways. Deep sympathy is expressed for the loss suffered by Mr. Cox who has for some time been in ill-health. The fire broke out a few minutes before the D. A. R. train left Kingsport for Kentville and the train was held for a short time, the crew and passengers assisting in the attempts to quell the flames. It was soon seen there was no hope for the building, all directed their efforts towards saving the nearby house belonging to Conductor Dickey, which was several times in danger. This they accomplished after a hard struggle. Everything in Mr. Cox's house was burned, including the furniture and general household effects. A valuable horse belonging to Conductor Dickey was also destroyed.

The demand for local securities continues fair, and strictly investment issues are being well taken.

This is particularly true of the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal debenture stock which is now being offered. The very strong position of this stock as regards security and earnings is evidently appealing to a class of investors who are not attracted by the usual industrial offerings. In view of average annual earnings applicable to the debenture stock of over four times the amount required and surplus assets equal to five times the debenture stock issued, it is not surprising that conservative investors are looking with favor on this offering.

WOLFVILLE OPERA HOUSE, JUNE 5th.

Thursday night, June 5th, will be a date long remembered by those who are fortunate enough to be at the Opera House to hear "Faust" sung and acted by the noted stars of the Boston Opera Company, who are on their first annual tour of the Maritime Provinces. They first played in St. John, on the 19th, 20th, and 21st, and the first three days of this week they played to capacity audiences at the Academy of Music in Halifax. Never in the history of the Provinces has there been a tour as important as this one, or one which holds out so much hope in the future. The management announced before they arrived in Canada that if the event this year was as much of a success as they anticipated, the playing of the towns which showed proper appreciation would be a regular thing each year. The stars were royally welcomed in St. John, in Fredericton, Moncton and Amherst, Halifax turned out en masse, and all three of the operas sung there were enthusiastically received. It is now up to Wolfville to show whether or not she wants to see and hear the best in the future, and the attendance from such towns as Kentville will show whether or not there are enough music lovers in the region to warrant any further operatic plans.

"Faust" was chosen for the best opera to be sung in Wolfville, both because of its wide appeal through popular knowledge of the story, and the fact that the glorious music permits Mme. Maria De Gabbi, the dramatic prima donna soprano in the role of "Marguerite," to shine so brightly. "Faust," which is sung in a condensed version will be preceded by an excerpt from the grand opera "Martha," and a scene from "Madame Butterfly." This is the first time that "Butterfly" has been heard in the provinces, and the welcome everywhere accorded to the beautiful Puccini composition is a fair criterion of its musical worth. It would be hard to select a more suitable program than this one, and every indication points to a very warm reception by local music lovers to the visiting artists who make this date next to their last in Canada. Playing here on Thursday, they sing in Yarmouth on Friday night, and on Saturday start home to Boston on the boat. So far every town visited has proved a triumph, and it is hoped that public support will be great enough to assure us of an annual visit. See Halifax papers, of May 27th, 28th, and 29th.
