There has been a great hurrying and scurrying in certain quarters of late over the prospect of the approaching civic elections. At all hours of the day and for seven days of the week, the faithful have gathered in secret conclaves—and yet there is no actual occasion for such apparent anxiety. What we need is the election of four good, straight, honest business men to take up the work of the town government, and in conjunction with those who remain as members of the board carry on the public business in an honest, careful and efficient manner for the ensuing year. There is no issue before us requiring other than the usual qualifications—men in whom the community have entire confidence, and who do not require to be watched at all stages. There is no danger save in the election of an individual or individuals who have selfish ends to serve or who are the nominees of such interests. We place a sufficiently high estimate upon the intelligence of the citizens of this town to believe they will not allow themselves to be led astray by an imaginary issue, and we believe we have men in our town, life-long residents of proved integrity, in whom the electors have every confidence, and who will give their services without hope of personal profit. Let there be no panic.

Canada, a Climate.

The English paper, Canada, a publication devoted to making this country better known on the other side, is amused at the fears which are entertained by some that the Canadian winter is a thing not to be discussed on the ground that it might be detrimental to immigration, and it contrasts the efforts which are sometimes put forth to conceal our climatic conditions, with those adopted in Switzerland, where the cold winter is recognized as a valuable asset. Editorially, Canada says: "We who have enjoyed the delights of a Canadian winter, and are filled with regret that we must spend the season in the muggy atmosphere of London, yearn for the bright, dry cold that characterizes the climate of Canada in the winter months. Winter in England, with its fogs and changeable temperature, and generally damp atmosphere, is notoriously trying to those accustomed to the far colder climates. Those with delicate lungs must leave for some more healthy clime. And where do the doctors send them? To the warmest of southern countries? No. To Switzerland, that land of ice and snow, where with a bright sun shining overhead the thermometer shows a temperature that sounds terrible, where everybody enjoys open air life, where the keen winter atmosphere is bracing and invigorating—because it is dry. A Great Nova Scotian.

The proprietors of the Morning Chronicle of Halifax, N. S., of which paper he was for many years the editor, have in course of publication and will shortly issue a new and complete edition of the speeches and public letters of the noted Nova Scotian publicist, Joseph Howe. In this edition will be included the material contained in the edition published by Hon. Mr. Anson in 1853 and also all the important speeches and letters delivered and written by Joseph Howe between 1828 and the time of his death in 1872.

The editor of the new edition, Joseph A. Chisholm, K. C., has for many years been diligently collecting all the writing of the famous Nova Scotian, and he has carefully compiled the same for publication in the forthcoming work.

There is No Defeat.

NEVER YIELD TO DISCOURAGEMENT IN A GOOD CAUSE.

The writer remembers the case of a pastor of a church in one of our county towns. He had started on a crusade against the saloon that he saw was directly opposed to the work of his church. He had a few to sympathize with him in his endeavor, but because he did not see results such as he expected he became discouraged and ceased to give his active influence in favor of the cause of temperance.

This was in a community where the liquor power had long held sway, and consequently where much patient labor was needed before the results desired could reasonably be expected. The reformer has need of patience. Rome was not built in a day. The great and venerable piles of architecture required many years for their completion. Great reforms have been accomplished in the face of fiercest opposition. Only the craven spirit abandons the field when the struggle against iniquity is going on. The men of iron are moved by opposition to greater effort.

John Howard, in the work of prison reform; Wilberforce, using his influence for the destruction of slavery throughout the British Empire; Cromwell, in the fight for freedom; afford examples of the indomitable spirit that can never look backward when once they have put their hands to the plow. This has been the characteristic of the Temperance reformers of these modern times. They have many forces to contend against. The monster of intemperance is hydra-headed. It assumes many guises. It is even appearing in the role of reformer, disguising itself in the robes of an angel of light. It has the sanction of legislatures. It has its bloated capitalists, with their vested rights, and powers of darkness innumerable, and has hitherto believed itself to be invulnerable. But the forces arrayed for its conquest do not doubt the ultimate triumph of their cause. They see already the beginning of the end. Let every one who has entered into this conflict know that he is working in harmony with an eternal law that assures him of success. There are eddies along the shore, but the river still flows on.

We have in our county a body of men of whom every true citizen may well be proud, men who have won the respect and approbation of the best class of citizens throughout the wide Dominion—men who stand for civic righteousness and Temperance men who vote as they pray. These have broken away from their party affiliations to stand against all corruption in political life. This has not been without much self-denial and sacrifice. Although they have not yet accomplished all their desire they are not disheartened. President Newcomb well expresses the sentiments of the Alliance when he thus writes: "There is an unseen influence going with every truth uttered which is need to a greater and bring forth fruit according as the soil of the heart of the listener receives what is given."

Dr. Eaton Wants no Church Drones.

A congregation that thronged the Madison Avenue Baptist church to the doors, gathered yesterday morning to hear the initial sermon of the new minister, the Rev. Dr. Charles A. Eaton, famous for some years as the pastor of John D. Rockefeller's Euclid Avenue church in Cleveland. It was thought by many that Mr. Rockefeller would desert his own church for one service to hear his favorite preacher, but he failed to appear.

The new minister made it clear that he intended to begin aggressive parish work at once. He emphasized this when he asked for a record breaking collection. He declared he needed money in his business of doing church work in the neighborhood. The pledge-up appearance of the contribution plates, indicated that he had impressed his hearers.

"We don't want any drones in this hive," said Dr. Eaton. "We're going to get right down to business. Madison Avenue Baptist church is going to become a power in this community. We will become a power by fighting."

Talking some time ago with an aged clergyman about this he said such had been his experience through a ministry of sixty years. And I wish to add that no criminal in society, not even the murderer, should be more severely dealt with. Indeed, they are 'murderers in chief'!

There have been times and countries where convicted slanderers had their tongues slit, or cut out, to make them silent. It is a pity that law does not see universal—or the old Jewish law of DEATH. What a fine quiet time we would have with the town as quiet as the cemetery.
