A COSTLY DIET.—The enterprise of the

Mr. W. H. Smith, First Lord of the Admiralty, recently laid before Parliament th composite gun boats, 4 iron gun boats, 2 steel gun boats, and 4 other craft. A noticeable feature in the building of these vessels is the rapid development in the employment of steel. Deck-plating is now in all instances made of steel, and the ribs and the beams of the ships are to a large extent being co-structed of the same material. Steel is also making its appearance in the form of armour, iron plates faced with steel having been lately adonted for the turner of the Lord. lately adopted for the turrets of the Inflexi-ble, thereby reducing the requisite thickness of the plates from sixteen to eighteen inches thus affecting a very useful dimination of weight. A singular fact in connection with the navies of the world, and one not gener-ally known, is that while the British have by long odds the largest and most powerful fleet, the Italians are a step in advance in the matter of guns. 


