A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homesteak) in cortain tricts. Price \$3.00 per scre. Duties -Must reside six months in each 50 acres of three years, cultivate and erect a house worth \$300

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrub
