

OPENING OF THE NEW PARLIAMEN

London, Nov. 23-The Royal Stanard and the Union Jack of old England tugged and tore in the brisk wind from the spires of the houses of parlament to-day, a silent token of the fact that the day designated for the assembling of the new parliament had arrived. 
