As we are forced by the tenor of the reyly of the Cardinal Secretary of State in his note of July 26 to recognize that the Holy See defends these acts done without the knowledge of the Civil Power with which it had negotiated the Concordat, the Government of the Republic has decided to sever official relations which, through the voluntary actions of the Holy Soe, can no longer serve any purpose. After delivering this note you will add that we consider the mission of the Apostolic Nancio as terminated.


