During the present week and on Saturday of last week, one of the most disastrous forest fires of the most disastrous forest fires of the continent has taken place along the north, west and south shores of the west arm of Lake Supertor, and the fierce forest fires, which have left homeless thousands of people and have caused losses of millions of dollars, are in places still raging. The territory in which the desolution has taken place has for its centre the city of Duluth, but although that city is surrounded by burning forest, and the air is filled with smoke, there is little alarm among the people, who are amply protected by the open country which sur-rounds the city:






