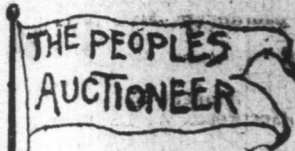

The Herring Fisheries on the West Coast of Europe.
(Gloucester Times.)
There are two seasons for catching Herring in Europe, one being from May to the East of June, and the Other in September—Where the Fish are Caught—French, Danish and German Fleets Competing With England.
There are two seasons for catching herring on the western coast of Europe. One begins late in May or early in June at the Orkney Islands and follows the shoals of herring down the east coast of Scotland and England until it reaches Yarmouth, where it ends late in September or early in October.
The fishermen go out in trawlers and land their catch at the numerous ports along the coast. The fish are sold in "crans," containing 1,000 herring each. In a good season the trawler owners and the fishermen and fisherwomen make good profits, but in a poor season the reverse happens.
The season of 1909 was an example of the former, as the following shows: Allowing the average of \$8 a cran for a total catch of 1,218,000 crans, the earnings of the fishermen in that year were \$7,411,679, and taking this estimate of \$1 for labor ashore on every cran landed we have \$1,479,416, chiefly for fish workers' wages. This sum of \$7,411,679 for the herrings at first landing is \$2,754,439 better than that realized from the catch of 1908 at the corresponding date, notwithstanding the catch in 1909 was 149,000 crans short of that landed in the 1908 season. The average price in 1908 was only \$2.40 a cran, or \$4,657,240 for the 1,967,000 crans landed. The foregoing figures, it must be understood, refer only to the herring trade between June and September on the east coast of Britain and at Orkney and Shetland.
Herring Business is Risky.
It is evident, however, that the herring fishing business is one of considerable risk with uncertain profits. The year 1910 is an example of a poor season. Had the fishery been moderately heavy owners and crews might have done fairly well, but the "inside fishing" (that is, fishing possible for small sailing vessels returning daily to port) has been the lightest of recent years. The herring shoal in its passage south from the Shetlands has kept so well to the eastward, and instead of as last year, boats daily returning with from 40 to 100 crans they have returned with from four to 30 crans. Here and there a boat has returned with 100 crans on board, but these instances have been very exceptional and, moreover, while last year such catches would have sold for \$1,216, this year \$778 has proved their top figure.
One feature of the herring season at the different ports on the east coast is the arrival of the "Scotch lassies," who follow the fishing fleets down and "gut" and "pickle" the fish on the piers as they are brought in by the trawlers. In a good season these "lassies" will earn from \$8 to \$10, but in a poor season, like the present one, they will receive little more than their board, which is guaranteed them on engagement.
Steam Trawlers Worked Great Change.
The introduction of steam trawlers worked a great change in the fishing business and so rapid has been the change from sail to steam that a

ular herring harbor will at one time during the season contain 200 steam trawlers, consuming 15 to 20 tons of coal a week each. This is a large item in the expense of the fishing business, as the coal costs \$3 to \$4.50 a ton. Another change is now impending in the substitution of steel motor lighters for the old-fashioned trawler.
What are sometimes called "smoked herrings" are known as kippers in England. They are herring split open and smoked from two hours to half a day in the smoke-house. These kippers will keep only three to five days. The smoked herring which are exported are known as "Yarmouth Reds" or "Digbys." These are herring which are smoked and salted whole. The time taken to smoke these is from one to three days. Herring salted this length of time will keep several months. This process of smoking is termed "redding." The "redding" is done almost wholly in Yarmouth.
In the past the British have been the fishers for Europe, but within the last couple of years the French, Dutch, German and Danish fleets have increased rapidly, and not only so in the number of their crafts but in the size of their vessels, the best of which outclass in tonnage and power anything which Scotland or England have engaged in the traffic. The more the foreigners land at their home ports the fewer fish will they require from England. The competition has had a direct effect upon English prices already, and it is bound to have an even greater and growing influence in the future.

The Second Season.
The second herring season, known generally as the Norwegian season, begins in November and ends in the following May. Sweden contributes a moderate quantity also. The cargoes arrive irregularly, as the North Sea is a stormy body of water, to navigate during the winter and spring months. A full cargo from Norway consists of about 2,500 cases, the price ranging from \$2.25 to \$2.50 per case. The herring coming from Sweden are known as "shot" herring, or herring with no roe or milt.

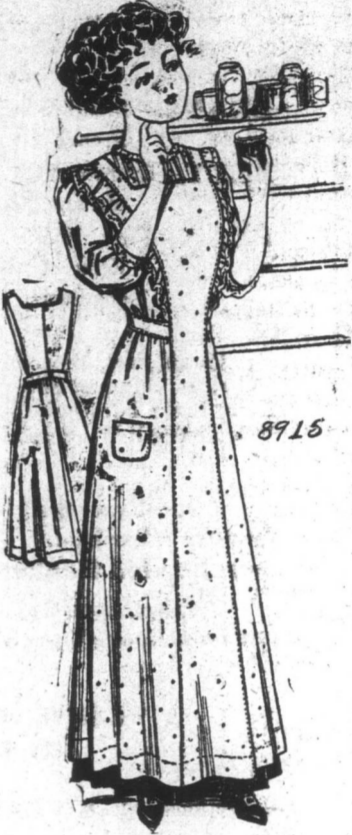

East End Flouted.

Yesterday we drew attention to the persistent report on the street that the new structure near Quidi Vidi Road was intended to be permanent, although both Government organs had announced it as a temporary building.

Yesterday the Evening Chronicle stated as a "fact" that it was to be a permanent hospital for observation of small-pox suspects, and complains that the Opposition organs have not taken its permanent character into consideration. This observation comes with poor grace from a Government organ, in the face of the fact that both organs had hitherto emphasized the temporary character of the structure. On Monday when dealing with the matter first, the Daily News stated categorically:—

"The Government decided to erect a temporary abode to shelter the men."

And again, "And it is expected that the temporary building will be ready to move into by to-morrow at noon."

The Chronicle, too, referred on

Monday to it, as but a "Small-pox shed."

Obviously, then on Monday, after the work had been under way almost two days, the Government's intention was that the structure should not be permanent, or at all events that was the view which the Government organs impressed on the public at that time.

It may be taken for granted that the Government was fully cognizant of the protests of the neighbourhood against the site chosen, for these protests were given publicity in the Evening Chronicle on Monday afternoon.

On Tuesday the Government organs used up half a page each in setting forth an apology and attempted justification of the course entered upon by the Government.

In the course of this apology, both used the sub-heading "Temporary Building" and referred to the structure as a "temporary hospital." Indeed so far were they from giving currency to the view that the building was to be permanent, that both of them declared in identical terms that "A lesson" had been "learned" from the present trouble, of what was needed. Here are the words used by both:—

"What is wanted is a hulk fitted up for the purpose and kept anchored, and let us hope, idle; but always ready when the occasion arises."

It is thus evident that for three days the idea was kept persistently before the public that the erection was to be but a temporary one, and that the

danger apprehended by the inhabitants of that neighbourhood was but of a fleeting nature, however risky it might be while it lasted. The protests made were therefore against the selection of this site even for a short time. This anxiety was naturally enough intensified by the announcement of the Chronicle last night. Instead of allaying the trouble, the Government after three days' deliberation flouts the East End, and tells them the present intention is that the hospital shall not be merely temporary but shall last as long as the building stands and whenever there are smallpox suspects to be housed.

It will be observed that we have put a charitable construction on the acts of the Government, and set forth that this change in announcements represents a change of policy, and in no way hinted at any deception on the part of the Government. We deliberately chose this interpretation as the least offensive that could be chosen, but we cannot ignore the fact that the people of the East End have been misled. We prefer to believe unintentionally, and not deliberately.

This naturally leads to the question as to what the Deputy Mayor gave his authorization. Was it a temporary structure or to a permanent observation hospital? This is a matter on which light should be thrown when the Council meets.

There is also another feature of the case to which we draw the attention of the editor of the Daily News, and it is this: The Daily News has been the chief organ in disseminating the idea that the smallpox observation hospital was to be temporary in character. Yesterday we asked the intention of the Government. The Evening Chronicle contemporaneously declared it. But the Daily News this morning is silent. Why? If the Chronicle is right, then the information conveyed by the Daily News is wrong. As the editor has misled the public, in good faith we are convinced,

is it not his duty to put right what he has unintentionally put wrong? The present state of affairs is perplexing, as there is a clear conflict between the latest announcement of the Daily News and the latest announcement of the Chronicle. The latter's latest is that the smallpox observation hospital is a permanent structure, the former's is that it is temporary. Are these conflicting statements to be read as a political parable with an inner meaning? Are they the outward and visible signs of internecine warfare between the Morris and the Morrison sections of the Picnic Party?

Still on Southside.

The 88 men from the Newfoundland are still on quarantine on the South Side, and if not removed soon will have completed their whole term, notwithstanding the fact that the "Economic Picnic Party" is erecting a shed for them which is as useless as it is expensive, and must ever be while left where it is a menace to the East End of the city, both as a means of imparting disease or causing a widespread conflagration. The Government has pretended great concern for the men now in the shed on the South Side, in which they suffer cold and discomfort, yet they are left there almost a week and no sign of their immediate removal. The men should have been snugly housed in some properly adapted building since Saturday or Sunday night last. We learn to-day that the men are kicking now against the quality of food given them by the Government and that they also want cooks to put it in order for them. The fumigating and disinfecting of the Newfoundland finished at 6 p.m. yesterday, and the idea was entertained to bring all the mattresses, bed clothing, &c., left on the ship to the waters outside the port and sink them, but this was later abandoned, as was a scheme to put all in a lighter, tow it outside and burn it. About 30 tons of refuse, including 40 barrels of seal, such as flippers, &c., old mattresses and bedding and about 1,500 lbs. of butter were taken to the ship's furnace and burned. Some thirty men of the ship, mostly residents of St. John's and Torbay, have taken the contract to discharge her seals, and she hauled in to Job's south side premises to-day to begin discharging.

Although the condition of the weather was anything but pleasant it did not interfere with the attendance, about two hundred being present. Mr. W. H. Ewing undertook the management and is to be congratulated on its success. The Rev. J. Brinton occupied the chair, and at 8.15 p.m. the following programme was rendered:
Instrumental Duet, Misses Reid and Ewing; Song, Miss Pippy; Song, Mr. W. D. Edwards; Recitation, Mr. P. Butler; Song, Mr. R. Andrews; Comic Reading, Mr. F. Grant; Recitation, Miss M. Quick; Recitation, Mr. E. V. Wylie; Instrumental, Miss Squires.
At the close of the programme Rev. J. Brinton thanked all the ladies and gentlemen, who so kindly assisted in making the affair so successful and especially Mrs. W. H. Ewing to whose untiring efforts its success was largely due; and at ten thirty the singing of the National Anthem brought a very enjoyable evening to a close.

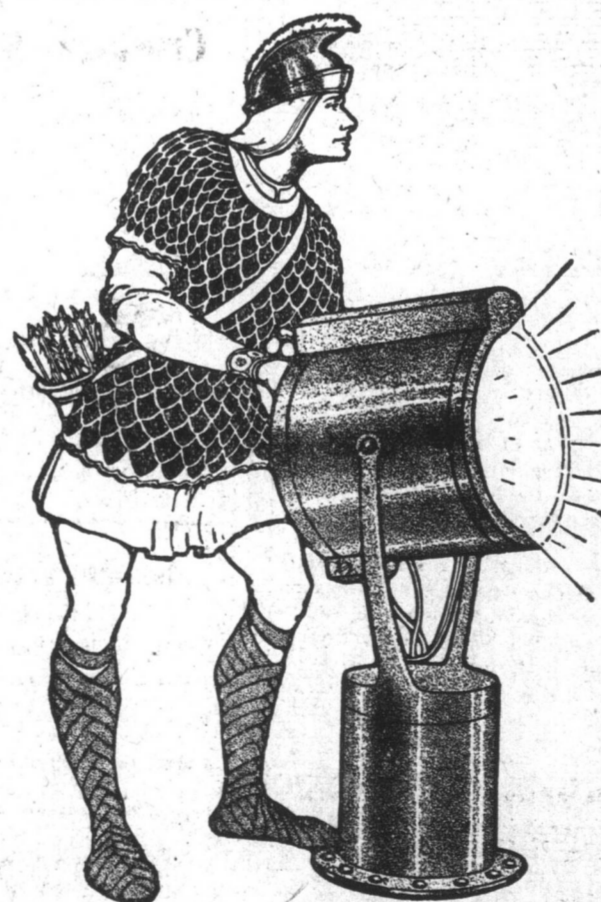

WASHINGTON, April 19.

In the House of Representatives today, former Speaker Cannon spoke in opposition to Reciprocity. He said, in part, that not since the War with Spain had so important a bill been considered. On the action of the House rests the well-being and prosperity of the States. It is proper, with slight consideration, to vitiate into law an agreement which affected every home in the land. He declared that the opening of new Canadian lands would depreciate American farm lands. They say that there is no danger for our wheat from the opening of our markets to Canada. President Taft says he will reduce the cost of living without impairing the farmers' market. I would like to see, he added, how he will not impair farmers' prices and at the same time reduce the cost of living.

WASHINGTON, April 19.

After months of negotiations, the American Government has decided to rescind the order, imposing countervailing duties on British spirits. The British Government made urgent requests that distillers of English whiskeys did not receive bounty within the meaning of the Payne-Aldrich law. In reaching their conclusion, the department was influenced by the fact that Britain has as its fiscal policy, not only Free Trade, but also the lack of artificial stimulus to trade. Imports amounting to several millions yearly are affected by the decision.

Decree of Separation.

Special to Evening Telegram. LISBON, To-Day. The Cabinet concluded a decree of separation regarding the Church and State. It concedes entire liberty to all creeds, the Catholic creed ceasing to be the State religion from the date of its promulgation. Henceforth all churches will be maintained by the faithful. Beneficed clergy will continue to receive stipends until July 1st, after which they will be paid pensions. The property necessary for the celebration of public worship will be ceded to the clergy free of cost. British and other foreign seminaries will be allowed to remain, but those connected with the seminaries will not be allowed in the streets in clerical garb. As the Catholic religion will no longer be the State religion, priests may marry so far as the Portuguese law is concerned, and in case of death the pensions will revert to parents, or widows and children.

Is Fez Pillaged?

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, To-Day. Despatches from Languier Rabat state that rumors are current that Fez has been pillaged as a result of the rising of residents. Recent despatches from Fez, which were delayed, indicate that much illness, misery and discontent prevails and have caused great alarm to the authorities a week ago. Fez is surrounded by adherents of various tribes and the city is threatened with famine.

Damaged by Storm.

The wind blew with hurricane force last night and this morning from the N.N.E. at Torbay, Flatrock, Outer Cove and Pouch Cove and other places north of St. John's. It was accompanied by heavy snow and sleet and the highest sea ran on the shore for many years. At Torbay, stages owned by Messrs. John and L. Thorn, the Messrs. Martin and other people on the north side were completely swept away and much other damage wrought and the same applies to the other places mentioned. Fences were blown down, chimneys and roofs damaged and general havoc wrought.

Causes Damage.

At nearly all the city wharves this morning and last night a big undertow ran, and to save vessels from being damaged they had to be given extra moorings. The s.s. Spica at Bowring's burst her after spring and others had to be bent to prevent her tearing up the premises. The same applied to the Hawk and Lady Napier moored there. The Adventure burst some of her lines and had to be hauled out into the stream from A. J. Harvey & Co's pier, and the schr. X 10 U 8 at Job's smashed her rails, bulwarks, etc., and was only secured after much difficulty. A big sea is running outside the port and is breaking across the Narrows.

The storm of N. N. E. wind kicked up a wild sea at Petty Harbor last night, and when the tide was at its height the sea swept away half the stages and damaged the rest very badly. Hundreds of dollars will be required to repair the havoc to the stages and bakers. The only property left intact is Monroe & Co's.

Painful Accident.

While Capt. Marshall of the Lady Napier was this forenoon putting a "service" on the lines which moored the Lady Napier at Bowring's wharf, the ship made a sudden lurch in the undertow, the line he was working at became suddenly taut, and his fingers were caught between it and the hawse checks. He narrowly escaped losing his hand, and as a matter of fact one of the fingers was almost completely severed, the upper joint being left in his glove. The captain had to go to Dr. Rendell for treatment.

The big new ore boat Tellus, built for the N. S. S. Co. to run in the ore trade, arrived at Bell Island yesterday morning from Philadelphia and sailed last evening for the same port with 12,430 tons of ore, which is about double the cargo that the largest of the boats running last year could carry.


