Real Slayers Still at Large.

Threats have been received by Louis Creste, the waiter who yesterday identified "Bridle Webber," and Jack Sullivan, as having been in front of the Hotel Metropole, when the murder took place, and a guard of detectives have been given him, to prevent him from being harmed or spirited away.

For some reason or other, there is an attractiveness, both to women and men, about "getting things at the factory price," or "buying direct from factory," that surpasses any other pocket-book achievement we may attain to.

We all know that the high cost of most things is due to the high cost of distribution and not to the cost of production itself. And so the factory cost is usually our goal of economy.

We know that all this intricate machinery of business is necessary but naturally we dislike to pay the toll.

Now, if we only knew it, there is one month in the year when all of us can buy at "factory cost"—or at least so near to factory cost that the saving is immense.

And that month is this month of August.

We have been dealing with the clearance sales of retail stores. Now we come to the clearance of the factories themselves.

The manufacturer or wholesaler is no different from the retailer. Each of them has stocks that must be cleared. The retailer is the natural outlet for the manufacturer. Through his aisles and over his counters only can the maker clear his stocks.

In business every man looks out for himself first. So the retailer clears his surplus stocks before he allows the surplus stocks of the manufacturer to come through.

Up to the present time you have been buying from the clearance sales of retail stores alone. But now the stores have cleared themselves and allowed the manufacturers' surplus stocks to come through.

To-day when you walk into a retail store you are virtually walking into a factory to buy your goods. Where you paid three profits before, you are paying a little less than one right now.

That is the reason for this second big price cut that you see in most of the advertising to-day.

The wholesale surplus stocks are coming through at or a little above their factory cost. The channels of trade are being sluiced out and cleared from end to end, and if you do not get your share of all the good things that are pouring out, why that is your fault.

The advertising in this paper tells you all about these sales from day to day.

In this twentieth century you might as well not take the paper as to overlook the advertising it contains.

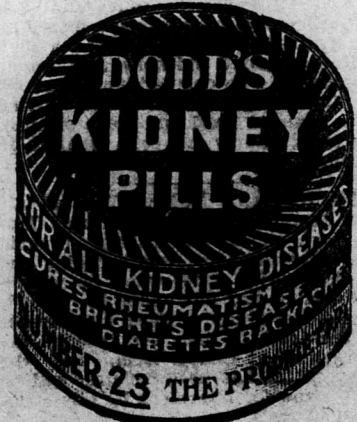

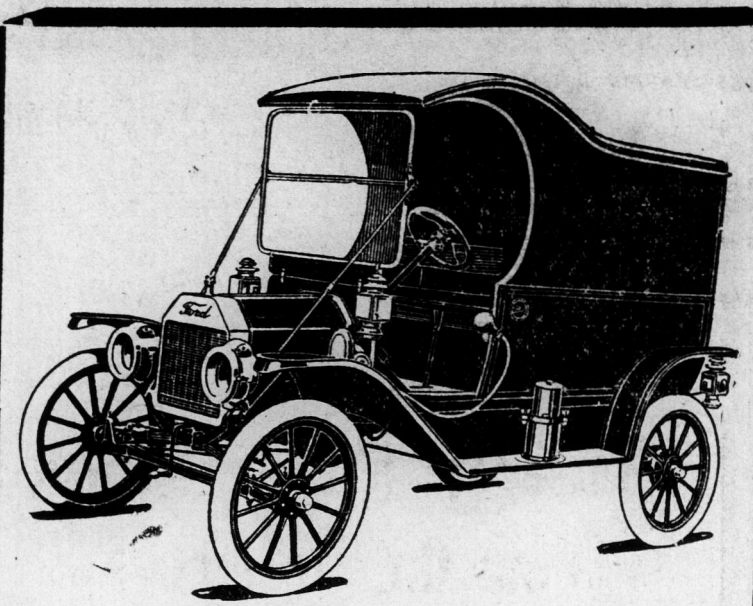

"Canada" on Morris's Latest Blunder.

We give an extract from "Canada," published on July 13th, last. It will be seen that outsiders have expressed much the same opinion of Morris's latest venture in the Money Market as we did. Here is what is said. The black type is used in republishing part of it to emphasize the points brought out.

A Sign of the Times.

"Before this copy of 'Canada' comes into the hands of our readers the prospect of another British North American issue will be before the public as underwriting is now in progress for a N. F. issue of 3 1/2 per cent. stock. We understand The Ancient Colony seeks a loan of £400,000 stg., the stock will be issued at 93 per cent. We have repeatedly alluded to the growing difficulty experienced in underwriting new Canadian issues and the terms upon which the N. F. issue is being arranged is pregnant with meaning. The underwriters are to receive one and a half per cent commission, a rate which has not been paid for many years on a Government Stock which comes within the category of Trustee Investments. The market for N. F. stock has never been a good one and it is doubtful whether it will be applied for very freely by the public although we understand that a bait representing about a £1, 0s. 0d. in interest will be thrown in, with the relatively low price of 93 making the yield a very attractive, a 3 1/2 investment without allowing for profit or redemption."

To-day's News.

Special Evening Telegram.

NEW YORK, To-day.
A Constantinople cable says fierce fighting occurred between Turkish troops and rebels at Sentalri. Thirty Turks were killed, and the tribesmen lost heavily.

PEKIN, To-day.
Dr. Morrison has been appointed political adviser to the President of the Chinese Republic for five years. Morrison was correspondent at Peking for the London Times.

MONTREAL, To-day.
A party of five men were overcome by the fumes and smoke of burning lard and meat during a fire on the premises of the Montreal Abattoirs Limited. All will recover. The damages are estimated at \$200,000.

LONDON, To-day.
Asked in the Commons whether the resignation of Bryce, British Ambassador to the States, was impending, Sir Edward Grey replied: "Bryce is returning to Washington early in September to resume work there as Ambassador."

LONDON, To-day.
A despatch from Constantinople states that a force of Bulgarians have determined to march on the Turkish capital, at the moment blood is shed in the conflicts between the rival political and military parties. It is expected here that the threat will aid the Turks in settling their internal affairs.

LONDON, To-day.
Winston Churchill will make a visit to Canada. It is expected that he will proceed to the Dominion on a warship. Premier Borden at a meeting of the committee of Imperial Defence, attended by Prime Minister Asquith and most of the members of the cabinet, extended an invitation to the English ministers to visit Canada. Asquith said he would not be able to go, but Churchill accepted.

OTTAWA, To-day.
In Government circles, there are strong hopes that Churchill will find it convenient to accept Canada's invitation to visit the Dominion during the period when the sailing programme is being formulated this fall or winter. The suggestion that he should come over in a Dreadnought with some members of the French cabinet is hailed with delight as it would strikingly exemplify the Entente Cordiale between Britain and France.

LONDON, To-day.
The Daily Mail dealing editorially with Canada's naval offers says there is serious risk that the Little Navy Race may use the gift of Dreadnoughts by the Canadian people to reduce the outlay on British shipping. If the noble gift is made an excuse for refusing to build ships which ought to be laid down this year, the whole object of the Canadian offer will be nullified. The Mail is taking for granted its own suggestion that the Dominion will tender three Dreadnoughts.

LONDON, To-day.
Sir Edward Grey, speaking in the Commons in connection with the rubber industry in the Putumayo District of Peru, said the Government did not desire to rest content with making the facts public. They had done all possible through diplomatic means to impress on Peru the undesirability of permitting such a state of affairs to continue. The British Government is keeping in close touch with the States in this matter. It is arranged for the British and the American consuls to ease together on August 27th for the Putumayo district, and their presence in the district will be a guarantee the horrors will not be repeated without the world knowing it.

Danish Explorers Had a Terrible Experience.

Copenhagen, July 27.—Captain Ejnar Mikkelsen, the Danish explorer, and Engineer Sverdrup, both of whom started in 1910 to cross Greenland, have arrived at Aalesund.

Capt. Mikkelsen and his companion reached Denmark Firth on May 29, 1910, where they found records left by Eriksson. They began their return journey nine days later and encountered terrible hardships. Several of the dogs died and the explorers were compelled to shoot those that remained for food. They reached Shannon Island, opposite King William Land, on Nov. 29 and remained there throughout the winter and the following summer, hoping to be picked up by a whaler.

No vessels came and they proceeded to Shamrock Island, where they spent the following winter. In the spring of 1912 they endeavoured to make a sledge journey to Cape Dalton, but had to give it up owing to weakness. They had abandoned all hope of rescue when they were picked up by a Norwegian fishing vessel on July 17 last and brought to Aalesund. They will start shortly for Copenhagen.

The schr. E. C. Hocken was towed here this morning, and will load off for Murray & Crawford.

A cargo of coal arrived on Monday to Mr. Andrew Rutherford, Housekeepers can now breathe easy for a time at least. It is likely that a big load will arrive shortly from which those who have the "dough" will get their winter's supply.

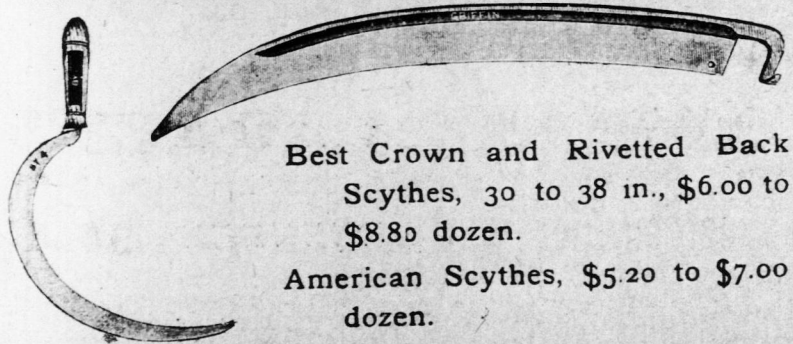

Stars Are the Champions.

The postponed and much talked of Star-Collegian football match, was pulled off last evening before a large, enthusiastic and exciting gathering of onlookers. It was probably the hardest fought and wildest exhibition ever witnessed on St. George's Field and resulted in the Stars coming off victorious by a score of three goals to one.

As the result of the game decided the championship holders, conjecture was rife as to the outcome, and long before the appointed time for the match to commence hundreds of people had gathered round the boards, while the grand stand was well filled with football enthusiasts. Throughout the contest the keenest rivalry and excitement was manifested by the footballers and spectators alike and as either player distinguished himself the 'fans' would be in their element.

Precisely at 6.45 the teams entered the arena, lining up as follows:—
Collegians — Butler, goal; Ayre, Thomas, backs; E. Barnes, H. Barnes, Pike, halves; Bastow, Penny, Quick, Hutchings, Pike, forwards.

Star — Walsh, goal; Hart, Dunn, backs; Duggan, L. Kavanagh, Jackman, halves; Power, Brophy, J. Kavanagh, Jackman, Brien, forwards.

FIRST HALF.

The coin was tossed and the Stars won, deciding to defend the western goal. At 6.50 the ball was put in play with each team using their best endeavours to gain the advantage. For the first fifteen minutes of play honors were in favor of the Collegians. They confined play to their opponents' territory. Some excellent combination was exhibited. Quick and Hutchings figuring prominently. From a pass from Pike Hutchings controlled the ball in his own inimitable way and was about to try for a goal when Duggan 'dug in' and saved the situation by giving a corner to the Collegians. After the kick off play became fast and furious; the Star forwards worked better but did not seem to be able to keep abreast with the pace of their opponents. Hutchings captured the leather at mid-field and taking a zig-zag course centred to Quick who in turn passed to Bastow, the latter shot erratic and the result was fruitless. From this stage of the game until the half time whistle sounded play was of a give and take nature, but no scoring was done by either side.

SECOND HALF.

After partaking of lemons a pretty hot dish was served out to the spectators by the players of both sides. The Collegians forward line showed up well and worked their way westward, but the dogged defence of the Stars back division prevented any scoring being done; at this juncture rough play was witnessed, some of which was not very edifying to the onlookers. Following this Hutchings took possession of the ball, he combined with Penny who essayed a splendid shot but the Star goal keeper proved equal to the occasion and drove the leather to mid-field where E. Power secured it and passed to Brophy who sent the ball across the mouth of the Collegian goal. Power was on the spot and headed the leather into the twines scoring the first goal for the Stars.

On resuming the Stars became aggressive and in a few minutes Brophy and Power repeated the trick. About five minutes before the close of the game the Star scored again through a penalty kick, and two minutes before the final solo Quick notched up the one and only goal for the Collegians. Thus the Stars are the champions and League Cup holders for the season of 1912.

NOTES.

The game on the whole was not a brilliant one. The 'man' on the grand stand played the game best.

There was general criticism over the old ball that was in use last evening. However the big gate receipts will enable the League to supply a new ball for the next match.

NEW YORK, August 1.
A London cable says, the article printed in the Daily Express yesterday, affirming that Germany was secretly building nine new battleships is regarded seriously by Admiral Beresford as is evidenced by a letter to that paper from him, printed this morning. Beresford says: "Our position is much more serious than the First Lord of the Admiralty dare confess. He cannot find crews for eight additional battleships—there is not enough men for active service in the fleet. The First Lord's statement on the subject is as inconsistent as another made June 18th last when he informed me in answer to a question that there was deficiency in the Navy personnel on March 31st last of 2,400 men and on July 2, 2,200, following then were 2,000 short. He is now trying to recruit 5,000 men this year. It is exceedingly doubtful if he can get them, but if he does, and if he was telling the truth July 22 last and another thing June 11th, the actual increase would be only 3,000. These cannot be sent to the fleet until they are trained. It is useless to build ships without entering men, but that is what exactly has been done for the past seven years. The result of colossal expenditure, and the large collection of empty ships and the immediate menace and real increasing danger. The present voyage should be augmented by using every available man for the fleet, which should be done right now."

LONDON, August 1.
The naval defence negotiations were resumed to-day with the Canadian ministers. This will probably be the last meeting until after the Parliamentary recess which begins on Tuesday.

"It is not improbable," says the Post, "that the negotiations may be continued in Ottawa next month, official representation having been made to Asquith and Churchill to this effect, and if Borden, it adds, is assured the proposal will be viewed with favour, an official invitation will be extended.

The Canadian Ministers are experiencing great difficulty in securing accommodation for their return journey owing to a rush of passengers, and the Admiralty may solve the difficulty by placing a warship at their disposal.

WASHINGTON, August 1.
The Senate to-day ratified the North Atlantic fishery treaty with Great Britain, which settles the questions involving the Newfoundland fisheries which has been in controversy for several years. The treaty was signed by the representatives of Britain and the United States, June 20th, and carries out the decision of the Hague rendered on Sept. 1910. It will become effective as soon as the ratification is complete.

PERCIE JOHNSON

The Anecdote Bore.

To be able to tell an interesting anecdote in a clear way, or better still, to know how to make a commonplace happening interesting by one's manner of telling it, is one of the greatest of conversational gifts.

But to crowd one's conversation with anecdotes is as great a conversational mistake—especially when one does not have a knack of telling them.

Anecdotes ought to be the trimming of conversation, not its warp and woof. And just as we like to see a gown garnished and embroidered here and there, but do not like to see it over-ornamented, so we tire of the talker whose conversation is all trimming.

Furthermore, there are certain kinds of anecdotes which never ought to be inflicted on a long-suffering public. For instance, there is the narrative whose chief element of interest lies in a knowledge of the people involved: to tell such an anecdote to someone who does not know these people is like taking a stranger to a neighborhood minstrel show or some very amateur theatrical, and expecting him to enjoy himself.

And yet, there are people who think to divert their friends by telling them such anecdotes in which every other word is either the name of some unknown person or an explanation in regard to one.

Similar to these narratives are anecdotes requiring for their comprehension a knowledge of some trade,

profession or condition. The newspaper man, for instance, tells a group of his lay friends some story which would be howlingly funny to a group of newspaper men, and then thinks them stupid because they evidently miss all the points. He might just as well have told the story in an unknown language and accused them of lacking a sense of humor for not laughing. Unfamiliar terms and technicalities spoil the best story. Explained, they break the march of the story; unexplained, they make it incomprehensible.

The worst bore of all in the story-telling line is the person who has read an interesting story or attended an absorbing play and tries to tell you about it.

Perhaps one man in ten thousand can give a fairly clear synopsis of a story. And at best it is rather pale and warmed-over thing to hear the story of a story. But to hear it turned upside down, distorted, criss-crossed with explanations and re-explanations like an old-fashioned letter, as the average man does it, is—well, it's the kind of thing that makes you retire into the recesses of your own mind, to commune with yourself and come back to the surface only when the flow of language ceases and you know it is time for you to say: "Isn't that interesting?"

As the man or woman who will really listen and try to understand a thing like this is about as rare as the man or woman who can tell it well, on the whole it's better not to attempt it. For that makes nine thousand nine hundred and ninety-nine chances that you are not the gifted " raconteur" and the same number that he is not the gifted listener. Rather heavy odds, don't you think?

I half believe that Tom split his vote last time, giving one to a supposed friend of his on the People's Party side. If I can find out he did I will wash no more shirts for him until we get a change of Government.
