World's Rifle Record.

Washington, March 20.—A new world's record for indoor rifie shooting, of 998 out of a possible 1,000, was made by the Park Club of Bridgeport, Conn., in this week's matches of the National Shooting Competition. This record means that five men placed 98 shots inside of a circle the size of a dime at 75 feet, using 22-calibre rifles.

patch of seals were between the ship and the shore, but the men returned without either boughs or seals, as we were too far from the shore for any man to reach it in one day. We would not have admired our captain's judgment and determination so much if they had brought a tow of seals, as we did when without the least sign of seals apparent to any

other person on board except himself, he forced the 'Commodore' in the same direction as the men were sent, and where we all thought we were going to be jammed for the remainder of the spring, which proved to be the case. We well remember some of the strong language used by some of those who were then the veteran sealers. such as "the d—n old mad-man" and "the cursed old fool," but before 12 hours from our getting clear their opinion of the old mad-man was very much altered, for about an hour before sun set that evening, we were in the white coats as thick as they ever have been since, and by dark we had the deck piled to the rail with whoppers averaging 52 lbs. The next day we panned about 9,000, but it was almost impossible to work for it was a day which will be remembered by day which will be remembered by many as the Sheelah Blizzard, and the

many as the Sheelah Blizzard, and the most awful blizzard for many years. Several people in this country lost their lives. We sailed from Harbor Grace that year on February 27th, and steamed north nearly to the Groais Islands, where we got jammed as after events proved, not far from our goal, but with no sign of anything encouraging From St. Patrick's Day, when we irst started the slaughter, we were

27 days in succession on the ice without a break, not even Surday for rest. This was caused by the ship not moving during that time, so we had to haul all our seals from the pans. We finished loading about three miles off King's Cove, Bonavista Bay, and in the afternoon previous to the day we got clear, three women came along-side. The old captain gave them a ow of seals each and sent them on

neir way rejoicing. They appeared to be quite capable of taking care of themselves and were able to get along over the rough ice fairly well, as that was before the invention of the hobble skirt.

We got clear and bore up for ome on April 13th, with 1,500 seals in tow, but when getting near home we got these on board also, which put the 'Commodore' when upright, first deck on a level with the surface of we arrived at Harbor Grace at 8 a.m. on April 15th. We then commence discharging our cargo and made a bill of \$160 or £40 it was at that



It consists of a sub-cutaneous injection o secret serum composed of two ele ments, the nature of which has not been divulged. It is said experiments on animals with the serum have achieved wonderful results.

Mr. Nurgis is now treating seven patients, all of whom are in the last stages of consumption. He refuses to divulge the secret of his treatment and will not allow it to be tried at the hospitals. The doctor who attended the present patients admits that a decided improvement followed the first injection of the serum, and the most alarming symptoms completely disappeared.

Mr. Nurgis has secured medical certificates to the effect that his unknown remedy certainly has a bene-ficial effect. He hopes to effect several cures before patenting the ser-um and announcing his discovery.


