I am sorry that what I say of the fire fighting machinery I cannot repeat regarding the station itself. It needs a cleaning and by cleaning I mean a painting-up. The smell in the station is anything but agreeable ,and cannot but be detrimental to the health of the firemen. This odour I believe is accounted for by the close proximity of the horses to the apartment where the men have to be all day; and considering that there is plenty room to the rear of the station on-which stables could be erected I feel sure that after the attention of the Inspector of Public Buildings is "drawn to the matter" this eyil will be attended to How, the physician attending the men allowed the present smell in the station to continue, is something I cannot understand. The sleeping apartments of the men is like—nothing. Cheerless from the word go. Bare walls, bare floor, dingy ceiling and uninviting beds for the men to sleep on. Whoever is Boss of this Department should take a trip to Boston even Halifax and "compare dates." It wouldn't cost the price of a good horse to put this Station in the pink of condition.
