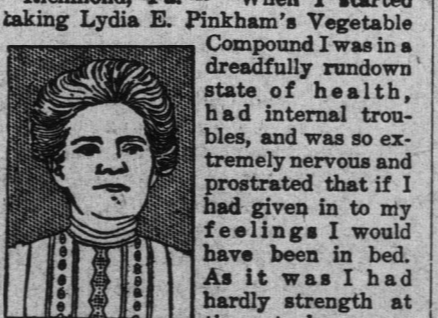

Do you use the comparison of yourself with other people as a means of self-justification or as spur?

Comparisons are odious (to misquote Mrs. Malaprop) only when you use them for self-justification or justification.

When you use them for a spur they are the exact opposite of odious, whatever that may be (the dictionary of antonyms gives "charming," "delightful," "felicitous" and "lovely" but somehow none of these seems to be just the right word).

The temptation to justify one's self for any falling by mentally comparing one's self with others who are even more deficient is a temptation to a most insidious and dangerous moral drug habit.

Justifying Yourself For Tightening Your Purse Strings.

For instance, take the question of giving. Suppose you have made up your mind to give to charity a certain portion of your income. In these days of the high cost of living you find this most inconvenient. You consider lessening this proportion, and when your conscience becomes active, you find yourself trying to drug it by saying to it, "But even if I do give less, that will be as much as So-and-so and more than So-and-so."

Of course that is true, but what of it?

What you ought to give is a matter to be decided between yourself and your conscience. Or, if you are to call in other witnesses, let them be those who will spur you on rather than justify you in slumping.

And there are always plenty of such. To take a personal instance, I sometimes find myself justifying the fact that I do not respond to all the calls that are made upon me to help in this or that good work, by telling my conscience that I do more than Mrs. So-and-So and that I have more cares than many of the women who are so active.

And then my conscience retorts by calling to my mind a comparison that is a spur rather than a justification. "What about the little woman with no maid and three children," it says, "who manages to keep both her home and her children in beautiful trim and to help in almost every good work that is going on in this town?"

Or again, I excuse myself for not accomplishing more on the ground of interruptions. "Just think of So-and-so," I tell my accusing conscience. "He can't write unless he has a small, bare room with nothing in it to distract his attention. He can't even live near the ocean because the sound of the waves disturbs him. And think of all the interruptions I have."

And then my conscience put in the spurs and says, "What was that you read about Jane Austen—that she wrote those wonderful books sitting in the parsonage living room with all the life of a very busy house going on about her? Doesn't that shame you into doing your little work in spite of interruptions?"

We can all find justification in comparison for almost any failing. However little we do, there are always people who do less. And we can just as easily find spurs. Which shall it be?

Roosevelt.

MENDELSSOHN died 1847, aged 36. German musical composer who appeared in public as a pianist before his twelfth year and composed the "Midsummer Night's Dream" overture when only seventeen. Unlike Beethoven, Schubert, Schumann and others, he never sounded the depths of human emotion, but seemed to regard music chiefly as a means of solace and pure enjoyment.

GEORGE PEABODY died 1869, aged 74. American philanthropist, who settled in London as a Banker in 1837. His benefactions amounted to nearly two and a half million pounds sterling.

SIEGE OF LADYSMITH commenced 1899.

ADMIRAL BENBOW died 1702, aged 49. One of the old type of seamen, who first saw active service in merchant vessels at the age of thirty. He was master of his own vessel. His exploits brought him to the notice of the Admiralty and he quickly rose in the service.

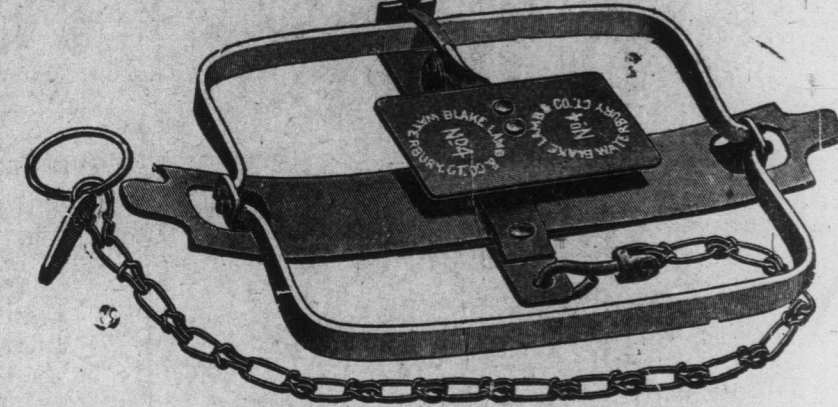

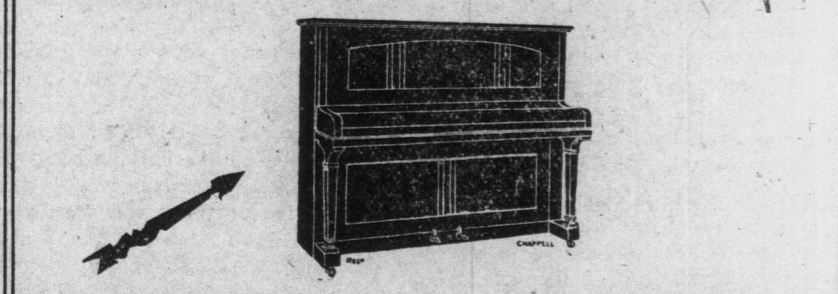

57th Day of the War TO-DAY'S Messages. 10.45 A.M.

BULGARIAN CHECK. SALONIKI, Nov. 3. The Bulgarians who are invading Southern Serbia, appear to have encountered a check at Yodelite, north-west of Kriwelak, where the Serbians are strengthening their trenches.

CAPTURE SERBIAN TOWN. BERLIN, To-day. The City of Ustie in northwestern Serbia has been captured by Germans. This announcement was made by the War Office to-day.

GERMAN STEAMER SUNK. LONDON, To-day. A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from Copenhagen says the German steamer Souz was sunk by a British submarine yesterday off Karlskrona, Sweden, in the Baltic. The crew landed at Sweden to-day, and one man was wounded by a shell splinter.

CONFIDENCE IN BRIANT. PARIS, To-day. A ministerial declaration made by Briant, the new Premier, to-day was most favorably received both in the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate, and a vote of confidence of 515 to one was given the Government amid great applause.

TREACHEROUS AND SELFISH. PARIS, To-day. The Athens despatch to Havas, News Agency says King Constantine and the Greek Government, considering the situation from a strictly military viewpoint, are firmly resolved not to launch out on an adventure, the result of which is far from clear.

THE STATES ELECTION RETURNS. MASSACHUSETTS, Nov. 3. Suffrage defeated, Samuel W. McCall, Republican, elected Governor over David I. Walsh, The Legislature returned with decided gains.

OHIO, Nov. 3. Prohibition overwhelmingly defeated. MISSISSIPPI, Nov. 3. The full Democratic ticket headed by Theo G. Bilbe, as Governor, elected.

VIRGINIA, Nov. 3. Democratic Assembly elected. The "drays" will have heavy majority for the enactment of a prohibition amendment, effective on Nov. 1, 1916.

THE LONDON PRESS AND ASQUITH'S SPEECH. LONDON, To-day. Among the morning papers which have been most severe critics of the Government, the Post is to-day its strongest antagonist. The Post in an editorial says, we find little ground for hope from Asquith's speech and find little consolation in his rhetoric.

1.10 P. M. AUSTRIAN COUNTER ATTACKS FAIL.

ROME, To-day. Austrian counter-attacks undertaken with augmented forces in an effort to retake positions lost by them have failed, according to an official statement issued to-day at the headquarters of the Italian general staff.

MORE TROUBLE FOR SERBIA. ROME, To-day. The Albanians living in Sotocera and Kruovo district of Serbia, have revolted, according to a despatch to the National Agency. A desperate battle between the Serbian troops and rebels have been fought north of Terna.

THREAT OF DRASTIC CENSORSHIP. LONDON, To-day. The London morning papers see a threat of drastic extension of press censorship by Sir Stanley Buckmaster, former head of the Press Bureau.

GREEK GOVERNMENT DEFEATED. PARIS, To-day. The Government was defeated in a discussion of foreign politics in Parliament to-day, and is expected to resign, says a Havas despatch from Athens.

STEAMER SUNK. LONDON, To-day. The British steamer Friargate, 234 tons gross, has been sunk; 5 survivors have been landed.

BRITISH FORCES IN SERBIA. PARIS, To-day. The first British contingent arrived on Friday at Guevgueli in the Serbian theatre, according to despatches filed on Saturday at Saloniki, but delayed. The British forces will act as a separate unit, but in collaboration with the French troops.

NO SEPARATE PEACE FOR ITALY. ROME To-day. Italy adheres to the agreement signed by the Allies at London not to make separate peace, says the Messenger.

2.00 P. M. TRYING TO CUT OFF SERBIAN RETREAT. LONDON, To-day. The gradual enveloping movement whereby the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians hope to surround the retreating Serbian army and cut off its line of retreat into Montenegro, is brought into clearer view by despatches, printed in the morning papers. If Berlin telegrams received by way of Amsterdam are correct the Bulgarians now are threatening Pristina which provides the opening into Montenegro, probably less than 70 miles wide for the Serbian retreat.

CALM ON RUSSIAN FRONT. PETROGRAD, To-day. Col. Shumsky, military critic of the Bourne, telegraphing from the Russian headquarters, says: A strategic calm has set in along the entire Russian front and that the Teutons are compelled to suspend their aggressive operations and are everywhere preparing for a positional campaign on their present line.

VENIZELOS DEFEATS GREEK GOVERNMENT. LONDON, To-day. The Petrograd correspondent of the Mail says Russia has imposed a war tax of from 5 to 50 cents on every theatre ticket. A discussion of proposed military laws, a correspondent says, raised a question between the Minister of War and a majority party of former Premier Venizelos. On this issue Premier Zalmis decided to ask a vote of confidence. The discussion then turned to the foreign policy of the Government. M. Venizelos declared it was impossible for his party longer to sustain the Government, whose policy he considered harmful to the interests of the country.

Here and There. SAILING POSTPONED.—The sailing of the S. S. Durango from Liverpool for this port has been postponed until Tuesday next.

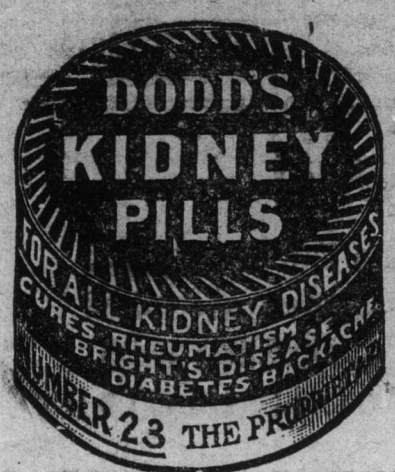
Endorses 18 Year Old Vote.

Wholemeal vs. White Bread.
There is no greater waste and no more unfortunate practice than the total exclusion of the bran or fibre of the wheat grain from our national loaf. The mineral salts in our foods have been placed in the husk or the skin for a wise purpose, and we are careful to exclude them as far as we can in almost all that we eat. They are responsible for the production of the bones and the teeth, and they are vital to the blood, which, when reduced to a condition of poverty, affects the happiness, health, and life of the man. A child fed on milk from which the minerals had been removed could not live, for it would obtain no bone-making material, while its blood would be unable to nourish it. White bread consists almost wholly of starch and gluten, and, when consumed, leaves no residue in the digestive system, for practically all is absorbed. It is this fact which accounts for the pernicious habit of the Englishman as a consumer of wholemeal bread is almost an absolute stranger.—Professor Long, in Pearson's Magazine.

YOUR BOYS AND GIRLS
Babies should live in a room full of sunshine and air. It must be well ventilated but never draughty, and the thermometer during the day, should register from sixty-eight to seventy. At night it should run as low as forty.
Of course the baby must be kept warmly covered, but by no means with covers of any weight. Soft, lightweight blankets and, if possible, a down puff, as the latter gives a sense of warmth without the weight. Fresh air is necessary, quantities of it, and a regular diet for the baby, and the same for the older children.
When the kiddies are old enough to run out by themselves, care must be taken that they are warmly dressed, but not as warm as the child who does not get exercise by playing. Quite often a severe cold is caught by getting too warm and cooling off too quickly, plain but wholesome food, air, sunshine, and plenty of sleep will start any youngster on the road to health.
