



HARTFORD, Conn., May 26. An explosion of a brass pipe bomb occurred in the basement kitchen of the State Armory here late to-night. The first battalion of the Connecticu State Guard numbering four hundred men was manoeuvering in the drillshed of the Armory at the time, and a number of officers of the State Guard were in their offices on the second floor. The explosion caused great excitement, but no one was injured. Seven windows were broken and the kitchen was damaged.

MEXICAN METHODS.

MEXICO CITY, May 26. (By Associated Press)-A formal investigation for the purpose of reclarifying the part taken in the death of President Carranza, both by Colherro and members of the Carranza party is recommended by a commission of four, named by Generals Ohregon Gonzales, to inquire into the tragedy. The commission submitted its report last night, and cited ten points which the members had agreed had been proved from stories of witnesses. The report indicates that Carranza was betrayed by men professing to be friendly, that he was shot to death in an attack on his hut, and that the men concerned were agreed to sign a statement that he had commit ted suicide.

MORE TROOPS FOR IRELAND.

LONDON, May 26. Aside from fresh troops, recently sent to Ireland, eight more battalions are held in reserve for transfer thither on short notice, according to the Daily Mail.

BEAT OFF ATTACK.

DUBLIN, May 26. Another hunger strike is on at Mountjoy prison. A visiting Justice, who saw the strikers yesterday, says two men are in a very grave condition. 9 Constables successfully withstood an attack by a considerable force of raiders, who exploded bombs under Lough George Barracks in Galway, and poured bullets into the building for more than an hour. The police responded with rifles and a few bombs. One policeman was slightly wounded.

DANIELS GETTING UNEASY.

WASHINGTON, May 26. Declaring that the steam roller was being used on him, United States Naval Secretary Daniels told the Senate Naval Investigating Committee to-day that he would appeal to the full Committee if Chairman Hale inisted in putting into record, "An unfair and unfounded" statement as to the condition of American warships, when the war began. Before the Secretary's announcement. Senator Pittman, democrat of Nevada, warned Chairman Hale that he would protest on the Senate floor against the character of questions which the Chairman was asking

THE AUTITUDE RECORD.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, May 27. What is said to be a worlds record for an altitude flight with an aeroplane carrying three passengers and pilot, was made at Kelly Field last Tuesday, when Lieut. Harry Weddington reached an altitude of 20,081 feet. The record was made in one hour and twenty five minutes of steady climbing. The return trip was made in 15 minutes. A De Haviland four model B. ship was used, equipped with a barograph to re-cord the altitude.

TAKING A LOT OF TROUBLE.

QUERETERO, Mexico, May 27. Roboleo Herrero, yesterday, sur-rendered to General Gardenas, and is being taken to Mexico City to tell all he knows about the death of President Carranza, according to a message received by General Calles. General Calles has ordered all per-sons accompanying Carranza at the time of his death to be detained and

CARGO SERVICE STOPPED.

LONDON, May 27. The executives of the National Union of Railwaymen discussed in London, yesterday, the refusal of the Dublin railwaymen and dockers to handle munitions for English troops in Ireland. The Transport Workers Federation also considered the matter, although the interest of this or-ganization is only indirect, as all the ganization is only indirect, as all the men up to the present involved, are members of the National Union of Railwaymen. It is uncertain how the discussion will affect the situation. In the meantime the determination of workers in Dublin, and some other Irish centres, not to handle munitions, is absolute and the munitions, is absolute and the munitions tangle has led to a complete stoppage of the cargo service of the London and Northwestern railway between Eng-land and Ireland.





Legislative Council.

The Council met at 4 o'clock. Hon. R. K. Bishop presented the petition for the women of St. John's asking for the franchise, which was signed by 1700 women. Mr. Bishor spoke favourably to the granting of the franchise, and eulogised the work of the women of Newfoundland, and of the Empire during the great world war. Hon. Mr. Anderson ably support ed the petition and quoted statistics proving that the women had justified their equality with men when it came to using the franchise. Hon. Mr. Mews also took occasion to support the movement, and strongly supported the petition. Hon. Sir P. T. McGrath very forcibly advocated Woman's rights, and hoped that the prayer of the petition would be granted.

The Bill entitled "An Act to Confirm a Contract between the Government and the St. Lawrence Timber, Pulp and Steamship Company Limited." Passed the third reading.

The Bill entitled "An Act to amend Chapter 172 of the Consolidated Statutes of Newfoundland (Third Series) entitled 'Of the Survey of Foreign-going and Labrador Vessels." was deferred.

The Bill entitled "An Act to amend the Judicature Act," passed without amendment.

The Bill to provide for the standardization of Codfish passed the Committee with amendments to Sec. 2, 3

The Bill to provide for better information respecting the codfishery was considered in Committee. Hon. W. E. Grieve opposing the Bill, and Hon. S. Milley while not opposing it, said he wished to have more time to consider it, as it was a very important Act. He

asked to have the Bill deferred. Hon, George Shea opposed the motion and some lively debate ensued. Hon. Mr. Milley declaring that it looked as if there was a desire to rush the measure unduly. This the Hon. Mr. Shea denied. Mr. Milley continued and said: He was sorry this action had been done on the part of the Hon. Member, and as far as he was aware it had not occurred for the past 16 years. This Bill is a very serious matter and we have not been given time to duly consider it. The further consideration of the Bill was deferred. Amendments being made to Sects. 1,
