China Seeks Restoration of Shantung.

Bolsheviks Make Gains in Russia and Persia -- Geddes Presents Ambassadorial Credentials -- Ottawa Will Have Big Conference Monday -- Sinn Fein Controlling Lands in Ireland.

CHINA'S REPLY.
 PEKIN, May 26. The Foreign Office has replied to Japan's proposal to enter into negotiations concerning a settlement of the Shantung question, saying that China's position had not changed since China's refusal to sign the Peace Treaty. The reply added that China would welcome the restitution of the territory and always stood ready to accept responsibility for guarding territory which the Japanese vacate.

WILL STICK BY FEDERATION.
 PARIS, May 26. Adherence to the General Labor Federation was decided upon by a congress of a federation of petty officials including customs' officers, tax collectors, primary school teachers and others here to-day.

BOLSHEVIK OFFICIAL.
 LONDON, May 26. Retohitza, a village on the right bank of the Dnieper River, approximately 125 miles north of Kiev, has been occupied by Russian Bolsheviki forces, which also are advancing on the fortified outskirts of Bobruisk, on the Beresina River, according to an official statement issued in Moscow yesterday and received here by wireless.

NOT WANTED.
 PARIS, May 26. Official announcement was made by the Peace Conference here to-day that it had sent a note to Germany advising the Berlin Government to replace Col. Zylander, who is one of the Ger-

man representatives on the Sarre commission.
BUT NOT HERE.
 CHICAGO, May 26. Prices of vegetables dropped from five to thirty-five per cent. on the Chicago market in the last ten days. Commission Merchants said to-day. Market exports said to decline in prices was due to increased receipts.

IN FULL HARNESS.
 WASHINGTON, May 26. Sir Auckland Geddes, new British Ambassador, formally presented his credentials to President Wilson at the White House to-day and exchanged with the Executive assurances of good will and amity. He is the second Ambassador to be sent here by Great Britain since the President became ill. Sir Auckland had been waiting since April 21st to be formally received. His predecessor, Viscount Grey, departed again without laying his credentials before the President. None of the diplomatic questions pending between Great Britain and the United States were touched on specifically in the addresses exchanged between the President and Sir Auckland.

TO ATTEND CONFERENCE.
 OTTAWA, Ont., May 26. Representatives from Great Britain, Canada, Bermuda, Bahamas, Jamaica, Demerara, Grenada, Barbados and the Leeward Islands will attend the West Indies and Canada Conference which will open in Ottawa on Monday.

Delegates from Demerara, Grenada, Barbados, and the Leeward Islands are already in Ottawa. The remainder are expected to arrive in course of the present week.

POURING INTO PERSIA.
 LONDON, May 26. Bolshevik forces continue to pour into Persia and have occupied Resht, from which British troops have retired toward Teheran, says the Daily Sketch, which disputes the accuracy of information received here yesterday regarding the situation in the middle East. Notwithstanding denials, the newspaper declares Indian reinforcements have been landed at Batum to be followed by other troops as soon as transports are available.

DOINGS IN IRELAND.
 DUBLIN, May 26. Control of Irish lands by Sinn Fein is very attractive as is instanced by an occurrence at Carrick on Shannon, which was reported here yesterday. A farmer named Morrison was summoned before Sein Fein Land Committee to show why he had attempted to buy land over the heads of young men of the District who did not own property. He had just purchased a grazing farm for 3,500 pounds and told the Committee he had bought it for his two brothers in the United States. The Committee warned him to surrender it immediately, which he agreed to do with reluctance. Unknown persons have seized and sunk Lord Kingston's yacht Maelah, at Carrick on Shannon, apparently because Lord Kingston entered a claim for two thousand pounds for destruction of police barracks on his property. The claim was subsequently withdrawn, but no announcement of this step had been made.

POLICE AND STRIKERS CLASH.
 ROME, May 26. Clashes between strikers and police have occurred in Palermo, where one person has been killed and seven wounded, according to newspaper despatches.

Making Roads Into Modern Highways.

Graded, Straightened and Prepared for Surfacing Which Consists of Six Inches of Broken Stone, Rolled Smooth and Hard.

Halifax, May 26.—What can be done in road building in Nova Scotia, when it is attempted with organization, energy and intelligence, and experience, is being shown these days on the Margaret's Bay road, from the head of the Bay, beyond French Village, and in towards Halifax, and also at this end of that important outlet from the city. The operations in progress are a revelation and manifest what a captain of industry is able to accomplish. It is exactly one month since Mr. V. J. Cavicchi began work on the Margaret's Bay road, but already miles of the old road have been advanced a long way towards completion and with no "surfacing" yet put on, the new road forms an infinitely better highway than the old road. By the late summer the stretch will have been completed and there will then be a road such as none in Nova Scotia ever before enjoyed—smooth, solid, well graded, thoroughly drained, surfaced with six inches of broken stone, bound and rolled so that hardly a jolt or jar will be perceptible to motorist or carriage driver. Two things are being observed in this transformation—speed of construction and thoroughness of work. St. Margaret's Bay road will hereafter not be the narrow, crooked and boulder-strewn track it hitherto was, but will be a highway 24 feet wide, with 16 feet of that width surfaced in broken stone—to all intents macadamized. Beneath, every culvert is of concrete, and in the drainage every precaution has been taken to prevent the ravages of water, the great enemy of any road.

The amount of hand labor in road building has been reduced to a minimum on this contract. Mr. Cavicchi has steam shovels, concrete mixers, air compressors, pumps and everything from a "stone-boat" to a steam-roller. A water tank such as we see along the railway line is a part of the equipment and it, too, moves along when the progress of the road demands.

There is a mighty lot for the air compressor to do. The Margaret's Bay road is a perfect mass of boulders. Sometimes these may show only slightly thru the ground, but even if only they obtrude but a little they give a big jolt to the driver of a vehicle. These have all to be removed and the serried lines of great stones along the roadside, of what has been cleaned out, show the vast proportion of the old road-way bottom that was "boulder," and is evidence also of the toll there is in removing them. For all have to be dug or blasted out. It is the drilling of these boulders for blasting that gives opportunity for the air compressor. These boulders are hard things to dig out sure enough, but after they are brought to the surface, and rolled to one side or other, they find later a new field of usefulness, for they are put in the stone crusher and broken into the required size and used for the six inches of "surface" placed on top of the rolled material below and them-

NOTES OF TRAVEL:

And Reminiscences of a Pleasant Tour.

CHAPTER VIII.

SOME SPECIAL POINTS OF INTEREST.

The average reader or traveller is well aware of the places which attract the attention of visitors to large cities. These places are usually of historic interest, and have figured in some important celebration, or they commemorate the memory of the nation's leaders. Hence it was, that among the many monuments of New York, we were drawn towards that one known the world over, as "Grant's Tomb." The Tomb is a building of the architecture, and is erected upon one of the most prominent sites of the city. The building proper is surrounded by large columns, which look very imposing, and which add pleasing relief to the structure itself. The columns number forty-four, the purpose being, a column for each state within the union at the time of Grant's presidency. Our party entered the building as hundreds of thousands of others had done before, and for a few minutes we looked down into the great circular vault, where lies in solemn silence the casket of the brave man, and also that of the woman who bore life's struggles with him. Around and near by are to be seen the wreaths, and emblems of affection, which the world add at his feet. Flags, banners and mottoes, perpetrate the daring of the man, while richly engrossed addresses tell of the devotion of the people. Grant, no doubt, did his duty, and certain it is, that the people did not forget theirs at the right time, and at the right place.

America, and especially New York, can justly feel proud of the monument which stands to Grant's memory. It is worthy the man, and worthy the nation, and will long continue; for generations yet unborn will pay tribute to the spot. We were not had expected to record our names in the places, but in this we were disappointed, as there is not any register at the tomb. There is a sort of an office in one of the corners of the building, near the entry, but nothing all like one would expect. We enquired of an elderly man who was there at the time of our visit, as to the registry, but he did not know anything about it, nor did he think that

there ever had been one kept. Perhaps a registry at such a place may not be desirable, and the nation in its wisdom decided against it; it cannot be that it was forgotten. But Grant's Tomb is such a splendid piece of architecture, and it stands so much by itself, and is so hygienic in every way, that it is very different from other similar monuments. It is more like a court-room than a tomb, and the beautiful approach and attractive surroundings, all harmonize with the purpose. Daily it has its visitors, some from afar, and some from nearer places. Crowned heads and humble peasants have in turn paid their respects to this shrine, and we think it would be a worthy perpetuation of their respect if their names were registered.

The many other objects of interest which are in view from this spot well repay the time of the tourist. They tell the tale of enterprise and independence, and reveal that dominant spirit which has made the U.S.A. the great Republic it is to-day. The busy crowds of people which meet the eye in every direction are a living proof of the alertness and push of the city itself. Such a scene is almost bewildering, but amid it all there still exists the rules of law and order; thus it is that every person finds and keeps their proper place. The view of the water-front of New York is immense, but the great bridges which span the river, are the wonder of all. We had seen pictures of these bridges, and had heard much about them, but to properly understand their magnitude or to appreciate their engineering skill, they should be visited and examined. Only by the best skill of the most expert engineers could such structures have been planned, and only by lavish expenditure could the work have been completed. All these requisites and qualifications were provided; and thus it is that these great bridges are to-day, among the best assets of the state; for they have been largely instrumental in developing the trade of the past half century. Neither New York, New Jersey, nor Brooklyn, ever could have become the great centres of industry which they are, were it not for the means of transit which these bridges afford; verily they are highways of traffic, and as the country advances their commercial value will advance also. It was our privilege to pass under and over these bridges, but from whatever position we beheld them, their strength and their design appealed to us, and drew forth our highest admiration, and we found ourselves saying more than once—"Well done New York."

However, he was promptly pounced upon by the inspectors, walked off to the private sanctum, his carte confiscated, and the Casino knew him no more, for he was very properly expelled.

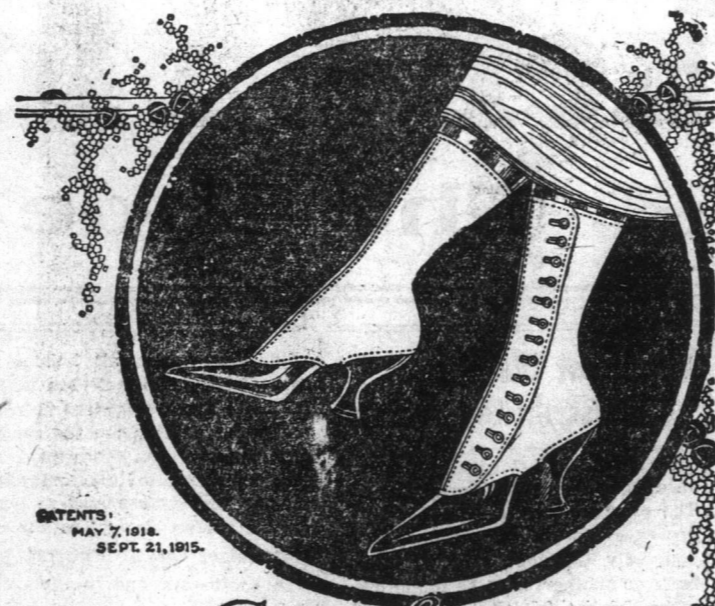
