Loss of Schooner

"A. G. Eisnor." CREW HAD DESPERATE EXPER-

Capt. John Doodey, mate Hubert laing, Wm. Pike, M. Jones, M. Kavanigh, and G. Bonner of the schr. A. G. isnor, which was abandoned in midcean, arrived in the city yesterday om St. Lawrence, where they were nded by the Schr. Frank R. Forsey. The captain and crew, except Bonner, elong to Carbonear. According to mate Laing the Eisnor would have oundered, with the loss of all hands, but for the timely rescue of Capt. Rose of the Forsey. The mate's acount of the happening as told the relegram is as follows:"The Eisnor ish laden for St. John's left Red Island on the morning of Dec. 3rd. Towards evening they were off Cape St. Mary's and as it became dark an E.N. E. gale with blinding snow came on. Sail was shortened, but within a couple of hours the wind increased and the head gear including bowsprit was carried away. Great difficulty was experienced in keeping the vessel headed to sea. As daylight broke the wind increased to a hurricane and the oresail was carried away. A new sail was bent and the vessel still kept headed to sea. On the third evening the wind veered to N.W. blowing a stiff breeze. On the 5th inst. it was blowing a gale with a heavy sea running. All the sails were carried away during this storm, and to make matters worse the rudder head broke off, and about 30 feet of the bulwarks was carried away. Seas now began to break frequently over the vessel and every thing on deck except a small boat and a cask containing about 30 gallons of water were swept overboard. A length of chain was, after much difficulty, attached to the rudder and by it the vessel which was now leaking badly was before the sea. A sounding of the pumps, indicated that 450 strokes per minute failed to keep her free. It became a fight for life and every man was called to the pumps. Day and night for 12 days the men took turns. On the 17th inst. (Sunday) when in lat. 42.11, long, 48, 50 or about 400 miles south of Cape Race a vessel hove in sight. Signals were run up at 8 a.m., and at 11 oclock the Frank R. Forsey bore down on the sinking vessel. At the time the Forsey came alongside the wind was moderate but there was a heavy sea running. The Eirnor's boat was launched and after three trips all the crew reached the Forsey. Before quitting the vessel Capt. Doodey set the hull on fire and two hours afterwards it sank. Parliament's Rare Ceremony.

A ceremony which had not been performed since 1892, and will not he carried out again for another thirty years, was observed in the

House of Commons a short time ago. The Speaker and a group of Government officials gathered round a box and took from it a pound weight and a yard measure, and after examining them with the greatest reverence and care put them back again. The objects were the Parliamentary copies of the Standard British Pound and British Yard, on which all our weights and measures are based.

The standards were legally fivxed n 1824, and placed in the House of Commons, but were destroyed when the Houses of Parliament were burned down ten years later. New standards were made and handed over to the Board of Trade, but accurate copies were placed in the Commons. Pound That Grows.

It was the copies that were examined the other day. It was found that the Imperial Yard was shorter than it should be by a ten-thousandth part of an inch, and that the pound was heavier than it should be by 2.86 thousandths of a grain. Possibly the discrepancies were due to chemical changes in the standards themselves. The pound weight is a cylinder made of platinum. It is lifted, acording to law, by inserting an ivory fork in a groove running round it.

One of the strange effects of the poisoning called "botulism," which was the cause of the recent tragedy at a Scottish fishing resort, was the fact that all the sufferers went temporarily blind.

Why a poison takes internally should affect the eyesight is an ineresting point, and rather mysterous one, yet it is well known that certain foods, drugs, and fruits have a most injurious effect upon the

Some years ago a family in the Midlands were all poisoned by eating rabbit pie, and though happily none of them died, yet all went temporarily

Sour cream causes a curious weakening of the sight, technically known as "amblyopia." A similar form of lindness comes from eating tainted fish, and is not uncommon in Italy, where the peasants eat a good deal salt and dried fish

There are two different fruits hich cause blindness. One is the called "finger cherry" which ws wild in Queensland. The fruit a long red berry, not unpleasant to taste, and is common in the airns and Townsville district.

This "cherry" acts by destroying rtain nerves, and the blindness relting is incurable.

The other blinding fruit is a species melon, which appears in great antities after the breaking of a long

Horses and cattle eat it greedily, and as a result lose their sight. At one time the horse raisers of New South Wales insisted upon a Government inquiry into the matter.

The milky sap which exudes from n African tree called the Asclepias most dangerous to the eyes. A ingle drop coming in contact with he eyeball causes total blindness. This tree produces a beautiful, ilky vegetable down, excellent for stuffing pillows, yet so much are its poisonous properties dreaded that the natives rarely pick or use this

Russia Experimenting With New Currencies.

MOSCOW .-- As the gold ruble cannot at present be regarded as the real neasure in Russia, a new ruble of goods, is to be introduced as commercial currency. Wages will be fixed in "goods rubles." In addition to the "goods ruble" it is proposed to introduce into the market other varieties of the ruble, namely, agricultural. export, import and budget rubles. A Well informed Russian business man, Questioned as to the Soviets latest financial plans, said the intention was that paper issues should in theory be backed by supplies of goods. Regarding the export and import issues, he said that the paper would be backed for face value by all the trade entering and leaving Russia. The new financial measure is probably attributable to the fact that the supply of gold tubles is nearing extinction, and to a desire on the part of the Soviet officials to deal a blow at the people who are hoarding them. 



Why don't the mountains fall in? The centre of the earth is about ,000 miles beneath us. The deepest shaft ever bored reached a depth of ess than one and a half miles. What we know about the earth's

iterior, however, is not guess-work. Seismographs all over the world record earthquake tremor, and it has been possible to ascertain that the rocky mantle or crust of the earth extends down to about fifty miles. Below that there is a central core of guite different and denser metallic material.

It may be suggested that the earth would need to be composed of firm substances to hold up mountains and ontinents, and, indeed, rock would not seem to be strong enough. Why, then, do the mountains not fall? During these movements the crust is fractured, parts of it sink, and we have earthquakes. The pressure of the underlying rock forces the latter, in a heated state, through the fissures, thus causing volcanoes.


