



We to not see. it is not a part of our case and it is not a part of the defendants' case, that we were not entitled to take options on the Reid properties, or to participate in an option which was given to another party. The whole question becomes one of bona fides. Did we disclose the facts at the time that we are going to be option-holders, or did we deceive the Reids? Now, in fact, there is really nothing that we can go upon in regard to this particular matter, because it never went any further; the thing died a natural death; we took up with Rothermere almost immediately and the Walker transaction fell to the ground and was never taken up again; but if the matter had proceeded, and the Trust had participated in an option, we will say to Colonel Walker, with the knowledge of the Reids, would there be anything wrong about that? but, as a matter of actual fact, the position was fully disclosed to Reid. Apparently there had been some talk about this matter before MacDonald left London for Newfoundland. On the 9th of Augst he sends a wire to the Trust from 8t. 





Investigation of Salmon Industry Resources

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir .- Having had Mr. Cham bers reveal to us the fact that, taking Salmonier River as a sample, our rivers are the resort of very large schools of salmon, and that this is a natural resource for an exceedingly great industry for Newfoundland it behoves us to proceed in the proper scientific way to take specific surveys of our salmon rivers having due regard for their widths, depths and heights of falls; and their general adaptibility to the encouragement of the largest possible salmon run. The spawning grounds should be inves-tigated and charted and a fair and proper estimate made by an expert or experts such as Mr. Chambers of the quantities of salmon frequenting all

It is the proper time just now to start this working going, and we principle that the most effective service that Mr. Chambers, a salmon expert, can render to Newfoundland is in the direction of his expert knowledge. Here is a willing helper who we believe would not be attracted by fees and whose sterling qualities and expert knowledge are away above what may be bought in the usual condition

Mr. Munn's idea is that he should be allowed to carry out the work started, that is to visit the salmon canning factories and assist canners by his special knowledge. This would be immensely valuable, but we feel that having discovered the much greater fact of the industrial possibilities of our salmon rivers, Mr. Chambers could render us a much greater service if he could visit as many as possible of our principal rivers and make such report as he can and recommendations for the more exact survey and other points that would seem important to him, so that we would have some definite data on which to

base some programme of development. Here is a definite direction in which it is the bounden duty of the Government to proceed with real development work in collecting definite information and data of which proper records should be made and kept so that they may be available to the gen-

eral public on demand. Here is a great industry, as can be seen from the fact that Mr. Chambers estimates (it is reported and we hope truly) that Salmonier River can support an industry of forty thousand cases without depleting the supply. We surely have ten such rivers. Now this is not like road work or rebuilding the Dock which is only work for one season and is entirely on capital account for which the taxpayers have to find the money. This salmon industry will go on employing thousands of people for the next half century or more without having cost the taxpayers one cent except the obtaining of sufficient information upon which o base the industry. It will do more, n that it will supply an earning power from which the taxpayers can derive the incomes to pay the high

It is upon the knowledge of our industrial possibilities in a great many other directions that we base our estimate that at this very moment we have employment enough in home manufacturing industries to the extent of at least ten thousand workers more than at present employed.

Where are our Municipal Child Telfare centres, our public amuseents, libraries, reading room, gymasiums, etc.? Where are our educanal utilities to help the rising genration in Technical Instruction, in Arts and Crafts, Domestic Science, tc.? Where are our Public Lavatories wash houses, baths, etc., which we see other cities? Where are our housing hemes to improve our city and ake it a better and brighter place in which to live, and where are our mar-

The St. John's of to-day is a small irab town with an almost total absence of local pride, lack of helpful eighbourliness and no corporate life. n my opinion the owning by the citiens themselves of the utilities essenial to up-to-date comfort, would lead a more wholesome public opinion and more uplifting forms of communal enterprise

money-making utilities

When some great catastrophe occurs such as war, or fire or flood our community can find without undue efort sufficient funds for carrying on. In many cities the local authorities nave seen the folly of allowing dividend-hunting companies to monopolize city in order to secure maximum profits for minimum service, and so electric cars were put on the rails by the public bodies. This has resulted in mproved and cheaper service—the public is admirably served and a margin of profit remains. What is true of street cars is practically repeated in the case of gas and electric light, etc. Indeed the wider and survey of public utilities, the greater is the justification for extending them, and the nore insistent is the call for the local

authorities to be up and doing. It is high time that our Municipal authorities paid some attention to the insistent demands of the public for mproved and more up-to-date methods of milk production and handling, for more modern and efficient methods of disposal of sewage and refuse, for better housing conditions for the working man and his family and the various other details asked for, which will tend to improve our surroundings and give us pride in our city. The citizen of to-morrow depends upon

the outlook and vision of to-day. The citizens of to-day and in the past are to blame for mixing Municipal matters with politics. They should never allow politics (with its accompanying Sectarianism, etc.) to sway them in their choice of suitable men who have the special knowledge and ability to raise our city from its pitiable rut of unprogressiveness and apathy in which it has for so long





Now, what could be clearer Mr. R. G.
