TRAVELLERS' GUIDE. BUILDING OPERATIONS IN GUELPH IN 1867

DAVIDSON'S WOOLLEN FACTORY

Although the Guelph Woollen Factory has been some five years in operation, yet as it has been enlarged this season, and as Messra. Davidson have lately made large additions to the machinery, and made some changes in thier business; a short notice of it will not be out of place. Until this summer Messra. Davidson confined their attention mainly to customer wool carding and weaving of fiannel and cloth. They have, however, been gradually getting out of this kind of business, and are now engaged almost said yarn for the wholesale market. They have recently procured and fitted up the necessary machinery for this purpose, and we hope profitable, business.

The factory being close to the Speed it is supplied with power from that river.—The building is large and commodious, but all the available room is required for the proper working of the machinery. In the upper flat are two large spinning jacks of 200 spindles each. On this floor also are two large blanket looms and asmall one, besides spooling machines, warping mills, reeling machines, &c.—These warping mills are a great improvement on the old method of preparing the warp for the looms. The threads when being wound off the cylinder on to the roller are kept separate, and being again wound round the beam of the loom all the trouble and annoyance of their being twisted and sticking together is avoided. On the ground floor are a couple of power looms, which, when in operation, and in conjunction with the other hand looms, will turn out a large amount of work.—Here also we have another spinning jack with 180 spindles, besides two sets of broad manufacturing machinea consisting of what is termed the first and second breakers and the condensers. The mode of working these is of course similar to what we described when giving an account of Messrs. Armstrong, McCrae & Co's Factory. On the basement floor we have quite a miscellaneous collection of machines. Here is the picker for eleaning the wool, abroad gig armed with teazles—a plant which grows in France and South Ameri

machines—one for yarn and wool, and another for cloth and blankets—and a fulling mill.

Hitherto Messrs. Davidson have been at a great disadvantage in not having sufficient accommodation, nor the proper apparatus, for dyeing. But an addition has been built to the factory this summer, which is to serve the purpose of a dye house, and which will give them greater facilities for doing better work and in much shorter time. In this building a boiler, made by Messrs. Adam Robertson & Sons, has been put in for supplying steam for the dyeing vats. Having procured the services of a first-class dyer, they are now in a position not only to dye their own yarn and cloths, but also to do all kinds of customer dyeing, whether in silk, cotton or any other fabric, scarlet, black, brown or any fancy colors. The want of a good dyer has hitherto been a great drawback in Guelph, and now that they have secured one, we hope he will be well patronized. Adjoining the dye house is an apartment which is to be fitted up with pipes for drying the yarn, wool or fabrics which have been dyed by steam.

When in full operation the factory will

In the early part of the season Mr. Geo. Balkwill purchased the building on the Waterloo Road known as the "Red Mill" together with the land and water privilege belonging to it. He immediately set to work to strengthen and make such alterations as were necessary on the old building, and to put in the machinery for a grist mill. The mill has now been running for over two weeks. The iron and millwright work was done by Messrs. Mills & Melvin, under the superintendence of Mr. John Watt, than whom there is not a better millwright in the country. There are two run of stones, one for chopping and one for gristing. The bolt is what is called a country one, and may be used either for gristing or in making bag flour. The mill is admirably planned so as to do the largest amount of work with the least possible manual labor. Mr. Balkwill has procured a patent grain separator, which is attached to the hopper, and through which the wheat passes before it is ground. What dirt or refuse is left in the grain after passing through the smut machine is here removed. The whole machinery is driven by an overshot water wheel, twenty feet in diameter, and five feet broad. Provision is made for adding another run of stones at any time. Mr. Balkwill has shown great energy and perseverance in gesting everything to rights about the mill, and we doubt not he will be amply rewarded by a large and profitable business.

since last winter, and has been found of great convenience to farmers requiring gristing or chopping. Mr. Ferguson is now putting in another water wheel and otherwise improving the mill, by which means he will, be in a still better position to do the work of his customers.

The power hom is worked by a small water wheel, which is driven by the water which leaves the Red Mill. Mr. Mitchell was engaged at the time of our visit in weaving some check flannel of a very nice pattern. He is prepared to do all kinds of custom weaving, and seeing he has been at so much expense in putting up a power loom, he ought to be well patronized by our farmers and others who require custom weaving.

Marriott again violently renewed his attack, this time kicking him, when the latter told him "he would stick him with the knife." Marriott struck him in the face, when the other fulfilled his threat, and stabbed his assallant in the left side about the lower rib. This put an end to the quarrel. Marriott was rather badly wounded, and the blood flowed profusely from the cut. The wound was dressed at Highhotdham's drug store, he was after wards taken to Dr. Howitt's and finally carried home. He is not considered to be in a dangerous condition. The little boy was arrested and had to stay in gaol over Sunday; this morning the case was post-poned until Wednesday, and he was released on ball.
