ONDON, Aug. 21. - The death of the elephant poacher and Hicit ivory trader, James Ward Rogers, a mative of Wayland, Allehan county, Michl-gan, while being pursited by Captain C. V. Fox, an officer of the British army in the Egyptian service in Central Africa, is not likely to result in international complica has not so far received any com munication from the United States government and the incident is considered closed so far as Great Britain and Belgium are con-

It is stated that the foreign office today that Rogers' compan ions, whose names are Pierce and Lane, are British subjects and not Americans. Rogers' death occurred on Belgian trerritory and when Capt. Fox became aware of that fact, he promptly sent a re-port to the nearest Belgium fort and apologized for his mistake.

A Belgian force escorted Capt Fox to boundary and took charge of the prisoners, who included two men, Pierce and Lane. Officials of the foreign office believe that these were afterwards released, but have no official information to that effect. Pierce was the man who was given the title of

RAILROAD CONTRACTORS MUST KEEP RECORD OF ALL MEN THEY EMPLOY

Ottawa, Aug. 21.-A circular has been issued recently by the department of labor and sent to various railway contractors on government work. The circular contains certain regulations calculated to protect men employed on such work, and it requires that all contractors, sub-contractors, and other employers of labor shall keep a comriete record of names, nationalities, place of birth, and latest address in Canada, together with home addresses and name and local address of nearest relative of employes. In the past such record has not been kept, and as a result many foreign laborers with families at home, in case of death by explosions or other accidents, have een buried unidentified. Inquiry from waiting relatives at home in many cases has been futile. Under the new regulations the names, addresses, etc will be forwarded to the department of labor for reference in case of death







Messages of Condolence Are Received From King George and Many Other Notables

ONDON, Aug. 21.—In the pre-sence of all the Salvation Arms commissioners and the principal officers in London, at the international headquarters on Queen Vic nent entrusted to the army's solicito late commander-in-cihef's son, Bram ell Booth, to succeed him, was opened today and read.

Bramwell Booth, who has been chief staff of the Salvation Army since 1880, accepted the succession formall with much feeling. His speech was a prayer, and the scriptural reading was followed by an impressive service Mrs Bramwell Booth and Mrs. Booth Helberd, and other well-known arm

leaders, were among the participants. General Booth's funeral will be hel the afternoon of August 29, at Abney Park cemetery, in Stok ngton, where his wife is buried. The funeral procession from the inter national headquarters, which will pass through some of the principal thorough fares of the city, will start at noon. Many thousands of persons are expected to participate in the funeral service for the army, which will be held on the preceding night at th great hall of Olympia, the scene of the international horse show and various

pageants and exhibitions, which has been chosen for its spaciousness. Several newspapers suggest that th general's work entitles him to lie in Westminster or St. Paul's, where many other of the nations greatest heroes of war and peace are entombed, but hi wish was to be buried beside his wife, and it is doubtful if the church authorities will make the offer to place the body in the cathdral.

Bramwell Booth presided at the meeting held in the international head-quarters. After calling on Commissioner McKle for a prayer, the chief of staff announced that he had called the officers together to hear the reading of the document appointing General Booth's successor. 


