From a depth of 1885 feet through a 2-incl From a depth of 1885 feet through a 2-inch pipe the gas registers a pressure of 125 pounds to the square inch. When first lighted the flame shoots up 40 feet high and will burn regularly 25 or 30 feet in the air. The last strike was made after drilling through a deep stratum of sand rock.

Mr. L. G. Harris, who has been chiefly instrumental in getting this preliminary well sunk, said to The World yesterday afternoon:

"Mr. Wright of Montreal, one of our promoters, and myself have been at New Toronto since this morning arranging about leasmoters, and myself have been at New Toronto since this morning arranging about leasing additional territory. We have a large tract of land under lease, including all of the property of the Mimico Real Estate Security Company, but we are still open for more, some of which we secured to-day. We will proceed now to sink other wells, and in the meantime connections will be made with the present well and the factories. The pipe will be put in T. McDonald's Queen City Galvanizing Works first. On Thursday we are going to "shoot" the well, that is split the reck at the various depths at which we have struk the gas in order to get the full effect of the pressure."




