

OPENING OF NEW ARMORY

A LARGE GATHERING, SOME INTER-ESTING SPEECHES AND EXCEL-LENT MUSIC

Watford's new \$10,000 armory build-

Watford's new \$10,000 armory building was thrown open to the public on Friday evening last and the event was attended by a large number of people. After due time had been allowed tor visitors to inspect the building, the gathering was called to order by Reeve S. Stapleford, who, as chairman of the meeting, welcomed the visitors.

A number of short congratulatory speeches were given. Among the speakers were Colonel W. E. Hodgins, of London, commanding No. 1 division; J. E. Armstrong, M. P., East Lambton; R. J. McCormick, M. P. P., East Lambton; Mr. John Farrell, Forest; Lieutenant Colonel D. A. Bentley, A. M. C., Sarnia; Neil McDougal, I. P. S., Rev. Mr. Connolly, of Japan; Rev. Mr. Currie, and others.

others.

Colonel Hodgins explained that the armory was, of course, for military purposes first of all, and he hoped that the placing of the building here would be the means of strengthening the two companies of the 27th now stationed here. He also kneed that the military men and the

imeans of strengthening the two companies of the 27th now stationed here. He also hoped that the military men and the people of Watford generally would spend many happy hours in the building. He cited the many advantages of a military training, both physically and morally. It was necessary to use all reasonable precautions for the defence of the country and to be prepared at any time for war.

J. E. Armstrong, M. P., emphasized that the armory was a public building for the use of the people regardless of political leanings. There was no better town armory in Canada. Liberals were as welcome as Conservatives to take part in the benefits accruing from the building. It was for the use of the whole commulty and he hoped that all would do what they could for the development of the militia. While all wished for peace there was no better way to ensure it than being adequately prepared for war. What he had done towards securing the armory could not have been accomplished without the backing up of Capt. Kelly and brother officers. The interest taken by the people of Watford in military matters also helped to bring such a buildand brother officers. The interest taken by the people of Watford in military matters also helped to bring such a building to town. He hoped that the men and women would use it to entertain and be entertained, and that all such meetings would help to stimulate a military spirit in the community.

DESCRIPTION OF THE ARMORY

The building is a substantial structure 92x42 feet, built of white brick with manufactured stone tacings. The walls are 16 inches thick. There are eight oblong windows on each side near the roof, six at the rear and three in front. Large double doors open into the drill hall, a room 39x68 feet. At the rear of this are three rooms 24x12 for arms, clothing, etc. Over these are three more rooms for the use of the officers. These are approached by stairs and a gallery the enfor the use of the officers. These are approached by stairs and a gallery the entire width of the building. Solid purloins, 6x12 inches, support the roof which is covered with Art metal shingles. The interior woodwork is white pine with hard maple floof set in cement. The smaller rooms are heated by a Kelsey hot air generator and the drill hall by a large coal stove. In the basement is a rifle-practice range the entire length of the building. This is equipped with two sub-target Ross rifles, adjustable to three positions. These rifles register the shots on a small card adjusted on the rifle as well as on the larger target at the end of the range. The basement is lighted in the day time by luxfer prisms and has eight six inch ventilators. Up and down-stairs rooms are brilliantly illuminated at night by electric lights, controlled by a number of switches. The a large coal stove. In the basement trolled by a number of switches. The building is a very substantial structure and is furnished with every convenience. The contractor, Mr. R. C. McLeay, may justly feel proud of the structure, and his work has been highly commended by the government it specters, who took it

off his hands last week. Mr. McLeay did the work in a conscientious manner and in the best way possible. The brick work was done by W. Marwick and the carpenter work by Stevenson and McWaters, the painting by F. J. Hughes, the heating and tinwork by the Howden Est., and the electric lighting by Geo. Chambers.

INTERESTING facts regarding the results of a decade's warfare against the ravages of consumption are contained in a circular which has just been issued by the National Sanitarium Association in order that Clergymen taking part in Tuberculosis Sunday, on Nov. 30th, may be possessed of the latest statistics. The most striking result of the analysis of vital record for the Province of Ontario is that, compared with cleven years ago, and despite the large increase in the population during that time, there is a total decrease of 990 in the annual number of deaths. In 1911 there were 3240 victums of consumption; in the death statistics last year the total was 2250. This is the more remarkable, too, in view of the large increase in the population of urban centres, where the overcrowding contributes largely to the spread of the disease. In 1st history of fifteen years work the National Sanitarium Association has had under treatment 70.0 patients, many of whom were in advanced and hopeless stages. Of these over 4000 have been sent back to their homes either cured or in much improved heaith.

This bulletin, which is No. 17 of the Dairy and Cold Storage series, concludes with the following recom-mendations:— "Keep good cows, feed them liberally, keep them com-fortable and clean when in the stable, skim a rich cream and keep it cool, churn at a temperature that will give a flaky granule in the butter; use clean, pure water for washing butter not more than three degrees colder dollar

The New Carnegie Library

The New Carnegie Library was thrown open to the public on Friday evening last and was visited by a goodly number of people. Precisely at 7.30 o'clock, Rev. S. P. Irwin, Chairman of the Library Board, inserted the key in the door, entered and switched on the lights, and on behalf of the Board, declared the Library open to the public

penalt of the Board, declared the Library open to the public. The building is a very substantial structure and is handsomely furnished. Going in at the main entrance a vestibule is entered with five or six steps leading up to the main floor. On this floor the books are arranged in racks forming three sides of a square, the fourth side forming the Librarians business counter for the recording of books lent or returned and recording of books lent or returned and the transaction of other business. To the left is the reading room, and at the right the reference room. These rooms

are furnished with quarter cut oak tables and chairs of comfortable design.

There are two entrances to the basement, one by stairs in the vestibule and the other by a door on the south side of the building. This basement contains two good-sized furnished rooms suitable for board or committee meetings, and several smaller ones for lavatory storage,

coal, etc.

The building is finished throughout in white pine in the natural color, and the walls are artistically decorated. The walls are artistically decorated. The electric light fixtures are handsome and are controlled by eight switches inside the vestibule door. The building is heated by a Pease Economy furnace. Both building and equipment are up-to-date in every particular and a valuable asset to the town. The \$6000 donated by the Carnegie Corporation covered all expenses in connection with the new building, even to the remoral of the books and paying the insurance premium for three years. The Library Board is to be coning the insurance premium for three years. The Library Board is to be congratulated on the management of the cent of expence in the management of the fund, as the town was not put to one cent of expence in the matter, except the purchase of the site. Mrs. Reid, the painstaking and efficient Librarian is in charge of affairs in the Library, doing her utmost for the accomodation of its patrons, and finds the work a pleasure under the new conditions.

They are built solely for breaking records, and only first-class pilots dare by them. Engines of enormous power are placed in such aeropianes, which are generally of the monopiane or two-winged type, and the constructional details are cut down to the minimum of strength and safety in order to abolish extra weight.

A trick of constructors who seek speed records is to cut big pieces of the ends of the wings until the supporting surface is nearly half thet of a normal aeroplane. Not only does this knock off weight, but wings clipped in this fashion offer little resistance to the air and cut quickly the weight. through it. An aeroplane doctored in this fashion at present holds the speed record of 108 miles an hour.

The Stewarton bonnet makers held themselves and their goods superior to those of Kilmarnock, and a fine of \$250 was imposed for the offense of selling Kilmarnock bonnets as Stewarton ones

In 1750 a law was passed enforcing the use of indigo only as the dyestuff. In the early days of the industry the bonnets were knitted in the open air. when the weather was favorable. Argonaut,

Dismal Outlook For Workers

Agents, scrutineers or solicitors who work at election time for candidates will have to either turn the cold shoulder to any offer of financial reward or suffer the penalty of going without the satisfaction of recording their own vote.

This new turn in affairs, which will undoubtedly reduce either the number of workers or the number of voters, is caused by a change in the election act of this year.

Should one candidate be flush and another willing to retire if offered sufficient inducement, no money must be used in persuading him to take his name off the list of aspirants. This is another offence under the new law. This latter would apply more to municipal elections than to elections for provincial or dominion representation.

The clause which will cause the greatest consternation in the ranks of the scrutineers is that which says any person acting for pay for a candidate, may not vote. It is a very specific clause, and disqualifies any agent, counsel, solicitor or person who acts in any capacity whatever for pay for any candidate. Inside or outside scrutineers are included in the category. It simply means that candidates' "workers" must hereafter give their services gratis unless they desire to be disqualified.

Another change in the act prevents distribution of cards, "respectthe distribution of cards, fully soliciting your vote and influence" on election day. It is apparently lawful to distribute such cards or reminders previous to election day, but on polling day that practice in future will be banned. The penalty is a twenty dollar fine.

A city clerk, who is also returning officer cannot vote at municipal elections, except for bylaws, because of his position. He could vote for a candidate only where there is a tie. His position in such a case would not be an enviable one.

Last year's confusion in the minds of Canadians, caused by the order of the Post Office officials at first prohibiting Christmas Seals on letters and later permitting their use on the backs of mail matter, has been cleared up this year by the issue of a timely statement from Ottawa, explicitly stating the Department's regulations.
