## PARISH NOTES.

OFFERTORY.—August 1st, \$23.35; 8th, \$25.65; 15th, \$27.48; 22nd, \$31.96; 29th, \$32.23. Total, \$140.67.

The Church Army Officers will sail *via* Dominion Line about the 10th of September. They will begin their work in our Parish about 1st October.

The Rev. J. D. Cayley, M.A., Rector of St. George's Church, Toronto, preached an able and effective Sermon at St. James's Church, last Sunday, from Romans vi. 23. It is to be regretted that owing to the wet weather a larger Congregation was not present.—*Orillia Packet*.

The Rector is at present on a visit at Mrs. Christopher Robinson's, at Orillia. He will return about the 4th of September, and then proceed to Montreal to attend the Provincial Synod, to which he is one of the Delegates from this Diocese.

During the absence of the Rector the following Clergymen have kindly taken Services:—The Revs. J. H. McCollum, C. E. Whitcombe, Canon Dumoulin.

The Rectory is at last undergoing the much needed repair. The furnace has been put in, and the carpenters and painters are busily at work.

The Annual Sunday School Picnic took place on the 3rd of last month, The day was all that could be desired. The children of the Mission Hall assembled shortly after one o'clock, and marched over to the Church, where they joined the children of the afternoon school, then all wended their way to the Union Station, and were soon aboard the train which was waiting for them. The grounds being reached, the children amused themselves, the boys with cricket and base ball; the girls with the swings. After tea the races took place, money being given instead of prizes. A start was made for home about 7.30, and the city reached about 8.

The Workingmen's Association still hold their meetings in the Mission Hall. The work is growing, for branches have been formed in the Parishes of St. Mark, St. Barnabas, and St. Stephen, and applications received for the formation of branches from the Parishes of St. John and St. Thomas. It is the intention of the members of the Association to take a prominent part in the work of the Church Army, also if possible to bring before the workingmen of Toronto the aims and objects of the "White Cross" movement.

The question of the Alms House will shortly come before us, and it is hoped will meet with success. There is no doubt that a place for deserving old people, for whom the public charities may not be suitable or available, is sorely needed. There will be no difficulty in our way as to the management of such a home, the Mother Superior having kindly placed at our disposal one of the Sisters.

Mr. Crashley, our Sexton, having opened a provision store, a few doors west of John street, on Queen street, we commend him to the subscribers of this paper and the members of our Church. His past record has indeed been a most faithful one, and the best guarantee for the future.

We take the following items from S. Matthias' Church Magazine, which many will read with great pleasure:

"The Sisters' Hospital has been full for some time, so much so that outside work is impossible. Over seventy cases have been nursed since the inauguration of the work last Autumn."

"We notice that the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society has published a very attractive and able monthly Magazine. It costs \$1 per annum, and is worthy of the support of all Church people. It is called our 'Mission News,' and is edited by Dr. Mockridge, of Hamilton."

The Revenue of this Parish is derived from the Offertory and Pew Rents, of which the former is relied upon as the principal source of income.

Offertory Envelopes will be supplied to those who are willing to contribute in this way to the maintenance of the Church and Ministry.

**PAROCHIAL NEEDS.**—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

1. Debt, \$3,500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
2. The completion of improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. The amount wanted for this would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
3. \$650 to pay for the new roof of the Church. The School House roof must also soon be renewed.
4. \$400 for the Phœbe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
5. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$312 only.
