## THE ENGINEERS.

The following is the continuation, from last issue, of Inspector Mayne's annual report upon the Canadian Engineer corps:

To meet this question of promotion and to overcome some of the difficulties connected with the city corps, I beg to offer the following proposal. But before doing so, I must point out that militia troops can never hope to become "trained Engineers," in the full sense of the word, with only a few days training annually. Consequently, the term "Pioneer" companies would be far more appropriate than "Engineer" companies. The Engineer militia battalions in England, though called Engineers, are only trained in pioneer duties and elementary field engineering works. The same is the case with the Pioneer battalions in India, and the so-called "Sapper and Miner" companies there have civilian artisans attached to them for executing technical work, but otherwise they are only highly trained Pioneers. Consequently I hope that the "Pioneer" idea of the Canadian Militia Engineers will be fully kept in view in the consideration of the following proposal which practically suggests a complete reorganization of the Canadian Militia Engineers:—

### PROPOSED REORGANIZATION.

That the city companies be abolished and that a rural battalion be converted into a Pioneer battalion, which will go into camp for training every year as a battalion. This is the system in vogue with the English Militia Engineers, and works very well. These English Militia Engineer battalions were obtained by the conversion of Infantry battalions into Engineer battalions. But I would recommend this difference from the English practice, based on my experience on active service in Afghanistan, namely, that the number of companies in the battalion be halved and strength of each company doubled, and that each company be commanded by a major, having under him a captain and four subalterns. And further, the organization of the battalion as regards interior economy and discipline should be based on the company being the executive and administrative unit, in order to enable the com-

panies to be freely detached without dislocating the battalion as a whole and upsetting its internal administration. The Afghan campaign affords admirable illustrations of the use and abuse of the Engineer arm, and from my experience I am of opinion that the above recommendation will give the best results.

The Major in command of each company would be generally responsible for the training, administration and discipline of his company; the Captain of each company would be specially responsible for the care and provision of the equipment and stores and transport of the company, while each of the four subalterns would be responsible for the supervision and work of one of the four sections into which the company would be divided. It is very important that a Pioneer company should be capable of being thus broken up into small fractions, in order to enable it to be made use of in a systematic and orderly manner, in several places at the same time. The company equipment and transport should be similarly organized for the same reasons.

If I may suggest a particular rural battalion as being well fitted for the objects and purposes of a Pioneer battalion, I would name the 67th Battalion, Carleton Light Infantry. The special reasons why I have suggested this battalion are given below, but I may say here, that the men obtainable in the district lying around Woodstock, N.B., are the very men required for "pioneer" work, being skilful with the axe and equally well at home on land and on water.

With the addition of 40 or 50 men, the present 9 companies of the 67th Battalion could be re-organized into 5 companies of 90 men each, and officered as stated above. If the Brighton Engineers were then doubled in strength, they could be added to the battalion as a sixth company, with Major Vince in command of it, and Lieut. Tompkins being promoted to captain under him.

Of the various suggestions that might be put forward to remedy the existing defects in the Militia Engineer arm, the one I have made above is, in my opinion, not only the most practical, but also the one best suited for any possible military

operations in Canada. I have mentioned the 67th Battalion simply from its being composed of men well fitted for the purpose in view. These men, who are recruited from the Brighton district, have a natural aptitude for field engineering (as shown by their good work in previous years), and are accustomed to hard, continuous and heavy labour. Assuming that they are trained every year (without which they would be useless, as Engineers, or rather Pioneers, as there is so much purely technical work to be learnt) they would get about ten or twelve days a year of continuous practical work—all working together and all being instructed together on a regular system, with the different companies competing with one another under the same conditions for excellence. And if 400 or 500 men are thus got together, much really valuable and instructive work can be done which it is now impossible to do with a few weak, isolated companies, working and competing under entirely different conditions and surroundings. Their work would be actually done in the field and would not be confined to playing with models; materials having to be prepared as wanted, they would have an opportunity of seeing how long it takes to complete work (a most serious consideration) and how men can be most usefully employed; i. e., they would learn how to direct and apply labour. They would also learn the requirements of camp life, and have all the disciplinary advantages of being in camp and of being associated with other troops. Further, the conditions of agricultural life in this part of the Dominion are such that there is no difficulty in the men getting away for a fortnight's instruction in camp in the autumn. Another advantage of having a large number of men in camp together, is that engineering works can be carried on and finished by some squads, while others are at drill, and those employed on one kind of work can see the other kinds of work that have been finished by other squads of working parties, and thus they would receive a wider and fuller instruction in field engineering.

As regards the proposal to abolish the city corps, there is always a difficulty for city men (mechanics and clerks)

getting away for 14 days; besides which their ordinary occupations unfit them for the heavy work of digging and of handling heavy spars and ropes. Men accustomed to city life are notoriously unfitted for hard, continuous and heavy labour. And as the city Engineer companies have Infantry battalions and other arms of the service competing with them in the recruiting field, the attractions of hard work and digging are not a sufficient inducement to procure recruits, and the consequence is that the digging and hard work have to give way to enable recruits to be obtained. Further, such city men as are required to form "Engineers" proper are the very men who cannot get away to attend a camp of instruction, besides which, highly skilled mechanics cannot afford to lose their good wages for so long a time as 12 to 14 days.

Thus in every way I beg to recommend the adoption of the proposed reorganization, as the best means of securing an effective Engineer arm for the Canadian Militia. But I must add that the above proposal dealing chiefly with organization also demands the instructional requirements, already referred to, to be carried out to secure an effective field engineer service for the Dominion.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

In a country like Canada it must be of very great importance to have a numerous and properly trained body of "Pioneers" capable of wielding the axe efficiently, of bridging streams, of throwing up earthworks, and of handling timber logs for constructing stockades and defensible posts. Ordinary Infantry can supply working parties for rough digging and hauling, but trained men are required to direct the useful application of this labour and to properly fit and place the materials thus obtained. Unless some steps be taken to improve the condition and training of the Engineer arm of the Dominion Militia, the present semblance of an Engineer force will only be continued and consequently be a continual source of weakness.

In experiments carried on by night in India with musketry fire by the light of luminous life, star shells and other illuminants, the Sussex Regiment made 22.6 per cent and a Punjab Regiment 16 per cent. THE NEW INFANTRY DRILL BOOK.

(Continued.—From Volunteer Service Gazette.)

A battalion in line forms forward into column as laid down in Company Drill. "Forming back into column will only be performed on occasions of ceremony." The words of command for forming back are: COLUMN TO THE RIGHT; ABOUT TURN; COMPANIES RIGHT (LEFT) FORM; DOUBLE (QUICK) MARCH. "The Major will cover the left guides, give the word *Steady*, and re-sume his post. On the word TURN, the Colour party will turn to the right, and on the word MARCH will wheel to the right and take post in column."

Forming into line on the march by a battalion in company column is performed as prescribed in Company Drill. The directions for forming into line on the march from quarter column are as follows:—

A quarter column on the march may form into line by successive companies from the rear (on the rear company); on the caution line to the right (or left) on the rear company, the Captain of the named company will at once order it to form to the named flank, sections (or sub-sections) opening to two paces interval as the company forms, and then halt. The guide will dress the company as the men form into line, and give the word *Eyes—Front*. Each of the other captains will form his company into line in like manner, as it gains its proper interval. Section, (or sub-section) intervals will be gained while forming.

A battalion in line changes front exactly as in the book of 1889, except that no markers come out. The extremities of the new line are, however, marked by mounted officers. The following are the details:—

CHANGE FRONT, RIGHT (OR LEFT) ON No. —, No. —, Right (Left) &c. REMAINDER, FOURS RIGHT (OR LEFT) (OR INWARDS) DOUBLE — MARCH.

On the caution the company named will be formed in the required direction as described in Part II., S. 8, and the remainder will receive the command, FORM — FOURS. RIGHT (OR LEFT) OR INWARDS — DOUBLE — MARCH, on which each company will move direct on the point where its inner flank will rest in the new alignment —i.e., six paces beyond the outer flank of the company formed before it. It will then be ordered to form into the new alignment. The adjutant will mark the distinct flank of the battalion, and the major, moving up to the flank of formation, will see that the companies form correctly in the alignment. If the change is on a central company, the major will mark the right and the adjutant the left of the line. The commanding officer will superintend the formation of the companies.

A change of position may be affected on similar principles.

When a line advancing or retiring is to form into company column on the march, the companies proceed as in company drill. The words of command are FORM COLUMN, RIGHT (OR LEFT), FORM, AND FORWARD BY THE — (OR HALT). The words "or retiring" in the first and second lines of this paragraph appear to be redundant.

The following are the very succinct directions for the formation of column from line:—

All formations of column from line will be in rear of the named company or companies on the command—COLUMN ON NO. —, REMAINDER FORM—FOURS—RIGHT (LEFT OR INWARDS) DOUBLE—MARCH; the remaining companies moving in fours by the shortest line, and passing left arm to left arm if moving in from both flanks. Section (or sub-section) intervals will be closed on the march, and as each company arrives in its place in company column, the Captains will give the word *No. — Halt — Form — Right (or Left) — Dress*.

The next section is on the advance in company column or column of half battalions from line. It is as follows:—

No. —, OR Nos. —, TO THE FRONT, REMAINDER, FORM—FOURS RIGHT (LEFT OR INWARDS)—BY THE LEFT (OR RIGHT) QUICK — MARCH.

I Advancing in company column.—On the word MARCH, the named company will advance, closing the section (or sub-section) intervals on the march by inclining towards the direction flank.

The companies in fours will step off at the same time, and each in succession will be ordered by the Captain to make a half turn towards the front, when its leading four is in rear of the centre of the preceding company, and to turn to the front as it arrives in column.

No. —, Half Left or (Right) — Turn, Front — Turn. By the —.

If companies move into column from both flanks, they will pass each other left arm to left arm.

When a column is on the march, the mounted officer of the leading half battalion will place himself in rear of the directing flank of the second company from the front and superintend the direction of the advance.

The mounted officer of the half battalion ordered to direct will superintend the movement, the mounted officer of the other half battalion will look to its dressing and interval.

It appears as if a paragraph which should have been numbered 2 in this section had been omitted. We notice also that BY THE RIGHT (OR LEFT) is now given as part of the Commanding officer's word of command—i.e., is given to the whole battalion. Now, unless the

advance is from a flank, one or more of the other companies must, when in form, be marching by a different hand to that of the leading company. The old arrangement by which the directing flank was named by the Captains as they come into column appears to be preferable.

The subject of "Deployments" occupies barely a page, which may be printed in full.

THE LATE CAPTAIN WILLIAM HENRY ROBINSON, R.E.

Quebec, 26th April.—In a recent issue of the CANADIAN MILITIA GAZETTE reference was made to Capt Wm. H. Robinson, R.E., at which time particulars of the manner in which he had met his death had not been received. Since which, however, details of the unfortunate engagement have come to hand and no better account can be given than by publishing a letter written by Major A. McDonnell Moore, who was in command of the expedition, who writes from Kukuna, under date 16th March last, as follows:—

"It is with deepest regret that I write to tell you of the great loss we have all sustained in the death of poor Robinson. He had been so hard-working all the way up that everyone was full of admiration for his soldier-like qualities, but our just appreciation of him was heightened, if possible, when we saw his magnificent conduct under fire. He was as cool as on parade, fired his rockets, and watched their effect with interest, and when at last he was asked to blow in the gate agreed at once.

"He ran back a good distance for his explosives and then with an 'All right, Major, I'll be back in a minute,' was through the first fence and up to the gate. The man carrying the gun cotton did not follow him past the fence; so Robinson returned and himself carried up and fixed the charge. It was a beautiful thing to see him calmly lying down amidst the rattle of firearms at the gate and fixing the detonator as if he were at practice in the school.

"He came back safely and he, Lundy, Cockburn and their men charged twice for the gate, but failed to effect an entrance. Robinson, who had been in each time with his men, was, at the end of the second charge, shot straight through the heart and lungs and fell dead.

"I ran to him at once, but as I lifted him to bear him off I saw that he was dead. My God! My heart was sad; such a good fellow, such a soldier, and just slain at the moment when we were all full of admiration for him, at the moment when

he had so distinguished himself and gained without a doubt such a recognition as a soldier covets. I would that he had lived to wear it.

"We brought the body back and buried him yesterday at nine o'clock beside the grave of a Frontier policeman who was killed the last time I was at this ill-fated spot. Everybody was present except Major Browne, who was badly wounded, and Capt. Doyle, who was sick. We fired three times, blew a flourish and came away with very heavy hearts."

The name of the late Capt. Robinson, an able, efficient and thorough soldier, must be added to the already too great number contained in the Club's death roll. May many years elapse before the necessity arises of adding another.

48TH HIGHLANDERS' CHURCH PARADE.

The Kilties own this town, and the fulness thereof. Certainly never in the history of the oldest inhabitant, save when the troops returned from the North-West, did so many people turn out, as turned out last Sunday afternoon (24th instant) to witness the initial church parade, and we might say the first appearance of the 48th Highlanders. The parade was called for 3.15 in the Queen's Park, immediately north of the guns, but long before that time every available inch of ground was occupied by sightseers. At last, however, the efforts of Inspector Hall and his assistants were successful in forming a hollow square, and into this under the direction of Capt. Macdougall, of No. 2 Company, I.S.C., who is acting as Adjutant of the Corps, and Sergeant-

Major Robertson, the Battalion was at length paraded, and under command of Lt.-Col. Davidson, led off in column of fours for College street. The column was headed by the brass band and buglers of the Queen's Own Rifles, the brass band of the Grenadiers and their own pipes and drums to the number of twenty-three. The route was to St. Andrew's Church via College, Yonge and King streets, and to say the least of it, although the day was cold, cold enough for fur wraps, the Highlanders did not get room enough to feel it, and the rush to get a front rank position among the spectators merged into a struggle out of which the fittest became the victors, and at one point the irrepressible wag noticing some ladies getting worsted in such an encounter, called out, "Stand back there you fellows in front, and let the ladies have a show. What do you want to see the Kilties for?"

The bands played alternately, and it was remarked that the bands of the Queen's Own and Grenadiers played better on escort duty than they do when they take their own regiments out. The struggle at the church was awful, and quite a few hats suffered from too close contact with the police under Inspector Stephen, who was detailed to keep the space in front of the church clear.

The service was short, but very interesting, and Chaplain McDonnell delivered a very able and eloquent address to the regiment, of which he is a member.

At the conclusion the parade reassembled and marched via York, Queen and John streets to the Upper Canada College buildings, where Lt.-Col. Davidson briefly addressed the regiment, thanking one and all for their appearance and numbers.

Col. Cochrane, of the Argyle and Sutherland Highlanders, was an interested spectator of the parade.

QUEEN'S OWN.
